## SCHOOL BOARD MET OCTOBER 3

Considerable Business is Transacted in Regular Session Held Tuesday Night.

At the regular business meeting of the School Board Tuesday night the following business was transacted, all of which we believe looks toward making this the best year of the school's history and toward putting the school on a more permanent and progressive basis:

The course of study was officially broadened to include Commercial Law and a course in Vocations, both of which courses should prove exceedingly practical to students who are to enter any field of work. The graduation requirements were also modified to give recognition to work in public speaking and athletics. The board feels that students who represent the school should be given the opportunity to carry the prescribed course of study. Accordingly a student who has represented the school a sufficient number of times in debate or declamation may offer that work in lieu of a unit of regular school work. Likewise athletic work carried consistently for three years will entitle a student to offer his athletic work in lieu of 1/2 unit toward graduation. However, the same student may not count both athletics and public speaking toward graduation.

A recent ruling of the State Department of Education was brought to the attention of the board to the effect that in all schools of the second class or of a higher rating, the grade teachers must be paid a yearly salary of at least \$720. Knox City now has a first class school and is anxious to maintain that standing and if possible to increase the amount of affiliation that we hold. Hence the board felt that there was nothing left but to comply with the ruling of the Department and to pay the teachers the amount designated. The board well realized that these teachers are all worth much more than they had been receiving, but a shortage of funds had prevented their receiving the salaries the board would have liked to pay them. 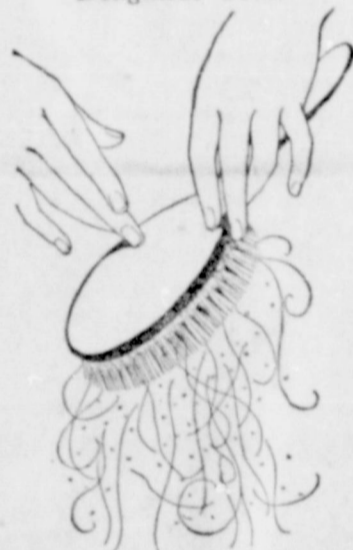

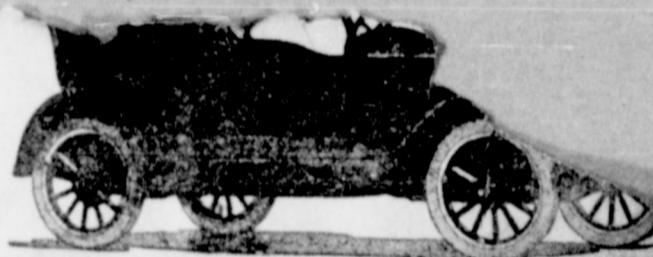

Buttons are used chiefly as ornaments. They are very large, in brilliant colors and are elaborately carved. Many lacquered buttons ornamented with gilt figures in Chinese designs are shown.

Braid buttons, fabric covered embroidered buttons and small, cut jet and steel buttons, are the chief types used for jackets.

Black Moire Most Satisfactory All Around Material; Beaded Models Have Passed Away.

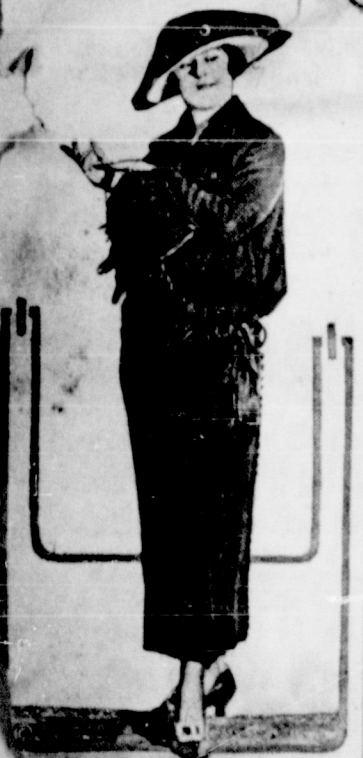

**GREEK OFFICIALS TO FACE TREASON TRIAL**

FORMER OFFICIALS HELD RESPONSIBLE FOR ASIA MINOR CAMPAIGN.

**ZAIMIS NOW NEW PREMIER**

Cabinet of Men Both for and Against Venizelos, but All Must be Pro-Ally.

Athens.—Several high personages connected with former Greek Governments have been arrested, the allegation being made that they were responsible for the campaign in Asia Minor, and for political acts against the interests of Greece. The officials now in power say these persons will be tried in the regular courts on the charge of treason.

The foreign diplomats, including the representatives of Great Britain, France, Sweden and Holland, as a body were received by the revolutionary committee and expressed satisfaction that rumors to the effect that these personages were to be executed after a summary military trial had proved untrue. The diplomats were assured that the prisoners would have regular trials.

The newspapers report that former King Constantine will leave Athens on a vessel to be provided by the Government and that all conveniences will be arranged for the former royal family. The former King is not imprisoned.

The Greek army in Tharce has definitely joined the revolution. The army corps in the Epirus also has thrown its lot with the revolutionists.

The troops of the revolution bivouacked on the grounds of the royal palace, and a few hours later the revolutionary committee disembarked from the battleship Lemos (formerly the U. S. S. Idaho) at Phaleron and marched into Athens triumphantly at the head of a section of the army.

Extraordinary scenes marked the arrival of the committee. Colonel Gonatas and Colonel Plastiras, the leaders, had difficulty in advancing through the dense crowds filling the streets. Flowers were tossed before them and garlands forcibly placed around their necks amid wild cheers from the multitude. The troops were given the same reception.

**MEXICO APPROVES THE NEW FINANCE AGREEMENT**

Presidential Decree To Be Published in Official Organ at Early Date.

Mexico City.—A presidential decree promulgating as the law of the land the financial agreement reached between Finance Minister De La Huerta and the bankers in New York is now in the hands of the Federal printer and will be published in the official Diario at once. The agreement already has been ratified without opposition by both houses of Congress.

With the agreement made effective by President Obregon's signature there is general belief here that an important step has been taken toward a resumption of the diplomatic relations of Mexico with the United States and the other powers.

The favorable action by Congress has not excited much editorial comment, it having been taken for granted that the Government was strong enough in Congress to bring about such action. There is much pride expressed editorially, however, over the fact that the first interest payment already has been deposited in New York, and the Excelsior tells of a movement started by a group of rich men in Northern Mexico to take up a popular subscription all over the Republic for funds to be applied on the interest payments for next year.

**Walnut Logs Shipped.**

Camp Wood, Texas.—We'ch Bros. shipped two carloads of walnut logs and stumps out of Camp Wood, Tuesday. There was 6,100 feet of lumber in this shipment. Some of the stumps measured five feet in diameter. The shipment was billed to Minneapolis, Minn. Four cars of cedar timber were also shipped from this place Tuesday.

**Steel Merger Will Not Be Effected.**

New York.—The proposed merger of the Inland Steel Company, the Midvale Steel and Ordnance Company and the Republic Iron and Steel Company will not be effected, it was announced. The situation arising from the action of the Federal Trade Commission in declaring that such a merger would be illegal was declared responsible for the decision.

**Texas Items**

The cotton crop in the Alvin (Texas) section has been practically all gathered, and a number of pickers have gone to other sections.

The citizens of Kenedy have determined to plant shade trees along the streets and the committee has selected pecan trees every 35 feet with an evergreen ash between.

The number of cars of citrus fruit that is estimated will be shipped from the Rio Grande Valley in the next 60 days is conservatively placed at 100, and the value of the fruit, based on prices paid California growers, is estimated to be \$200,000.

During the month of August, 121,000 head of cattle were dipped in Jefferson County, according to Dr. P. M. James of the federal department of agriculture. An injunction has impeded the work of dipping cattle in the county, according to Dr. James.

A tax on all forms of tobacco as a means of raising revenue for educational purposes will be proposed in a measure to be introduced in the next legislature, State Representative J. P. Rogers of Houston, author of the proposed measure announced this week.

A contract for surfacing about two miles of the road between Orchard and the Brazos River in the direction of Simonton will be awarded by the county commissioners within the next few days. The matter is being held up pending a decision relative to the use of gravel or shell.

There were 18,518 bales of cotton counting round as half bales ginned in Williamson County from the crop of 1922 to September 1, 1922, as compared with the 18,541 bales ginned to September 1, 1921, according to P. S. Ford, cotton agent for Williamson County.

The work of surfacing thirteen miles of state highway No. 36 between Rosenberg and the Austin County line via Orchard is now well under way. Most of the six-inch shell base has been laid and work of placing the four-inch gravel top is now in progress, after which it will be finished with a one-inch macadam topping.

The state railroad commission has set a number of freight rate hearings of interest to Houston for October 19. The docket includes cases proposing the adjustment of rates on lumber and articles of similar classifications, staves, flavoring syrups, coffee, floor sweeping compounds, grain reconignment charges and other rules and regulations.

Governor Pat M. Neff is going to Beeville on October 17, the opening day of the eleventh annual Bee County fair. He will open formally the fair in a brief address at the auditorium at the fair grounds, after which he will address the Confederate Veterans, their wives and the widows of Confederate Veterans.

Hearing on an application of the Southern Pacific Gulf Colorado and Santa Fe and Texarkana and Fort Smith railways, or revision of lumber rates from points on these lines to other Texas points, has been set for October 16, by the railroad commission. Application for revision of rates on kalsomine was set for the same date.

Thirty-two sworn statements from striking coal miners at Thurber and Mingus have been filed with United States District Attorney Zweifel at Ft. Worth regarding treatment of miners by Texas rangers. Filing of these statements follows a sensational charge of mistreatment of miners by District President John Wilkerson of the United Mine Workers of America and a counter denial by Ranger Captain Aldreca who investigated the charges.

A special rate of 80 per cent of the class A rates on orchard heaters shipped from San Antonio and Houston to the orchard section of Southwest Texas has been ordered by the state railroad commission. The commission also ordered that Fort Worth, Dallas, Sherman and Denison be considered in direct line of transit on cotton seed and other oils shipped over the Frisco lines.

Within the next few weeks the citrus fruit crop will begin to move from the lower Rio Grande Valley in commercial quantities. The value of the oranges, lemons and grapefruit expected to be shipped is estimated roughly at approximately \$500,000. At least 125 cars will be marketed this season, although some figures place the probable amount at nearly 200 cars. As citrus fruit is packed about 100 boxes to a car, it will be seen that the crop of 1922 will run between 25,000 and 200,000 boxes.

The Texas State convention of the D-C-D Highway association will be held at Huntsville, October 26 and 27, according to an announcement received from the association headquarters in Canadian.

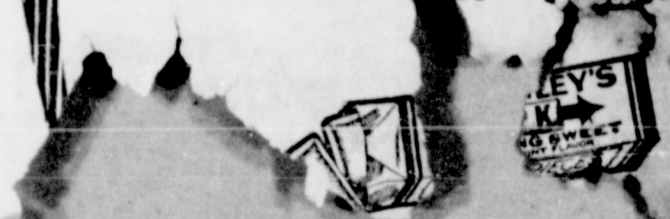

**NEW HONOR FOR ST. PATRICK**

**Irish Hero Has Now Been Officially Made the "Patron Saint of the Engineers."**

St. Patrick has been adopted as the official "patron saint of the engineers" in leading universities of the Middle West, and engineer students now wear the insignia of the Knights of the Guard of St. Patrick—a green shamrock crossed diagonally by a gold slide rule.

The adoption of St. Patrick, according to an announcement made by the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, originated at the University of Missouri, where March 17 is regularly a holiday for the students of the engineering school and homecoming day for its alumni. The day's program includes a torchlight parade and a grand ball in honor of the saint, and this year Governor Hyde gave his sanction to the tradition by attending the celebration.

The custom, which is rapidly spreading to other schools, originated in 1903, when, during the excavations for the new engineering annex, the workmen uncovered an ancient marble slab bearing a faded inscription. A committee of engineering students appointed to investigate it reported that the inscription was undoubtedly "Erin Go Bragh," which, freely translated, they said, meant, "St. Patrick was an engineer!"

**HERON A SKILLED FISHERMAN**

The heron is an exceedingly grave and serious bird given to standing in a contemplative attitude by the water side, a model of calm respectability. 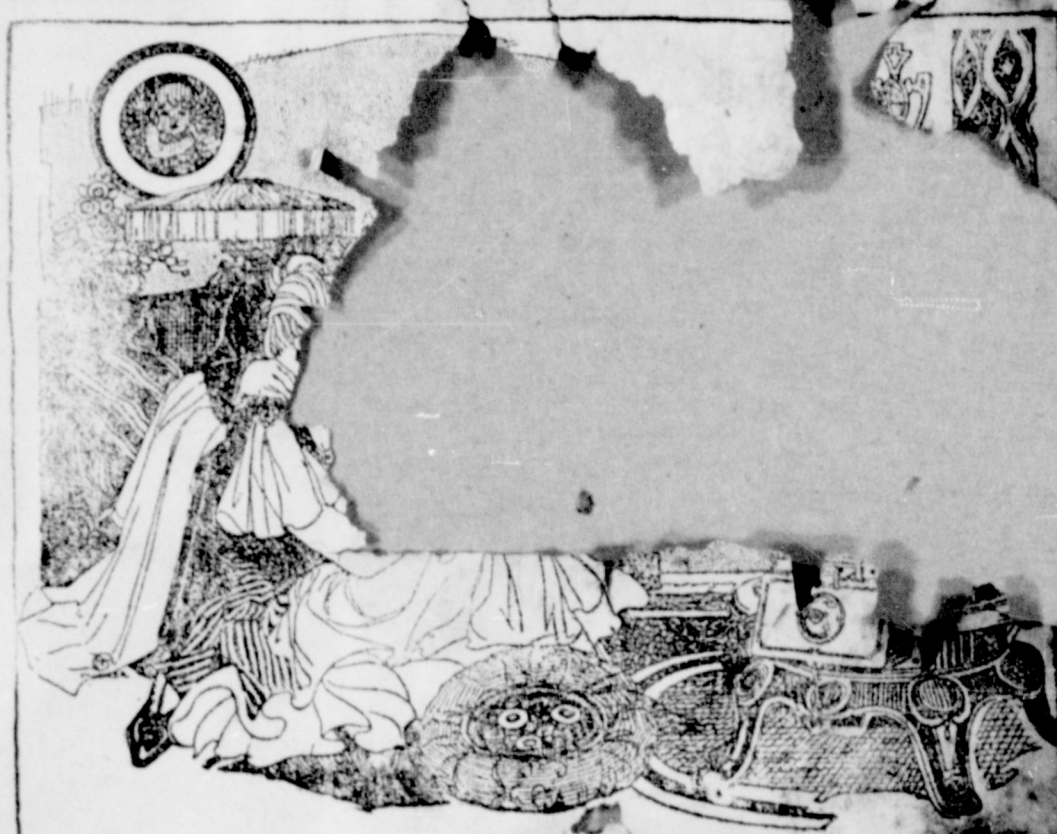
