Munday Demolishes Rotan In Downpour

With only 13 seconds lapsed on the clock, Mogul Anthony Stinnett had returned the opening kickoff for a 91-yard touchdown, and from there the rout was on as the Munday Moguls pounded Rotan 59-6 on a muddy field Friday night. Rotan, a Class AA team, is 0-3 in 1985, while the Moguls have a 19-game winning streak.

A large crowd of fans brought blankets, raincoats and umbrellas - and got plenty of use out of them - to watch their team live up to its

number one state ranking. A number of Goree residents were among the audience that was treated to not only a winning football game but also a sharply executed halftime performance by the MHS Purple Cloud band, which shows improvement every time it steps out onto the field.

Showers during the afternoon had made the ground a little damp, but the conditions didn't seem to hamper the Moguls, as they scampered to a 20-0 lead in the first quarter on touchdowns by Stinnett, Tim

Collier and Todd Thompson. The Yellowhammers forced Munday to punt early in the quarter, but Rotan fumbled it back to the Moguls, who promptly scored on a 17-yard run by Collier. After the Hammers had to punt on their next possession, Thompson and Dent Offutt ran the 53 yards to the goal line in four plays, with Thompson rambling the final 24 yards.

Rotan's second pass attempt was intercepted by J.B. Jones for the last play of the quarter, and Munday quickly turned it into six points on two runs by Ronny Lowrance and a 24-yard scoring pass from Offutt to Stinnett. Lowrance kicked his third of four extra points, and Munday was up 27-0 with 11:33 left in the half. The Yellowhammers were able to make a first down on their next possession, but were shut down by a swarming Mogul defense, and Munday got the ball back on the Rotan 42. Five running plays took the team to the 12, and Offutt passed to Gregg Sanders for the score.

Twenty-five seconds later, Munday was on the scoreboard again. Rotan fumbled the kickoff, and David Hertel jumped on the ball, setting the stage for a 22-yard run by Thompson to make the score 40-0. A demoralized Rotan team netted one yard in three plays, punted, and Munday's Jerry Shields broke away for a 58-yard scoring run, giving the Moguls a 46-0 lead when the gun sounded to end the half.

Early in the second half, pouring rain had many of the fans running for shelter, but the game continued. Munday's first possession of the third quarter resulted in a 33-yard touchdown by Isias Dena, and Todd Thompson plunged across the goal five minutes later for his third score of the evening. The TD left the Moguls ahead 59-0.

Rotan finally got on the scoreboard late in the game. A Yellowhammer recovered a Mogul fumble at the 44, and Rotan stayed on the ground for 13 plays, ending with a one-yard gain by Jerry Carter for the touchdown. Another scoring opportunity set up by a blocked punt was foiled by a determined Mogul goal line stand.

Another Class AA team, the Anson Tigers, will be in Munday Friday, September 27. The Anson "Black Attack" is coming off a hard-fought 9-7 loss to Knox City last week after defeating Jim Ned and Albany, and will be looking to get back on the winning track in Munday. Local fans are urged to come out and support the Moguls in what should be an exciting ballgame.

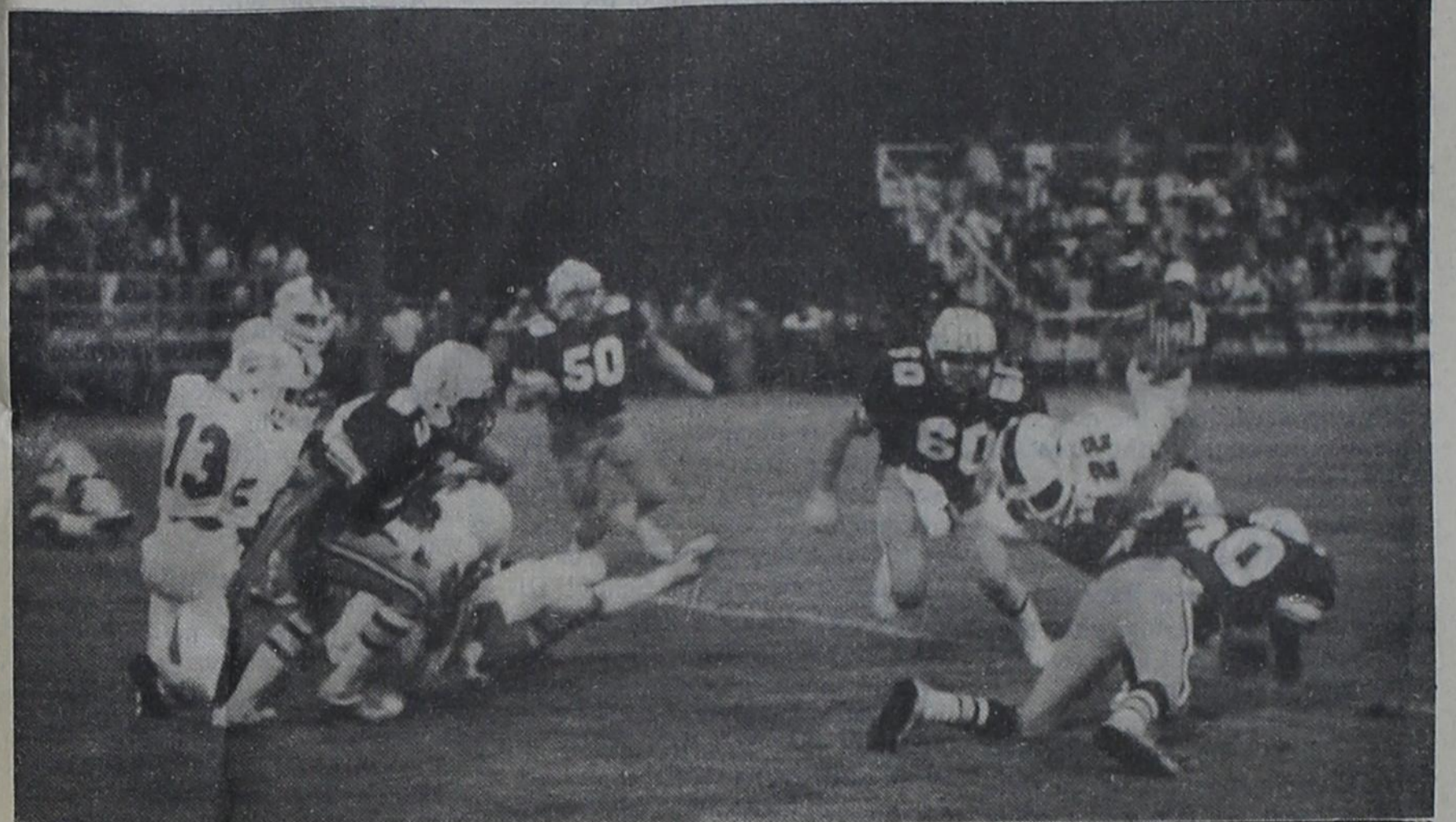
Coach Edwards Comments

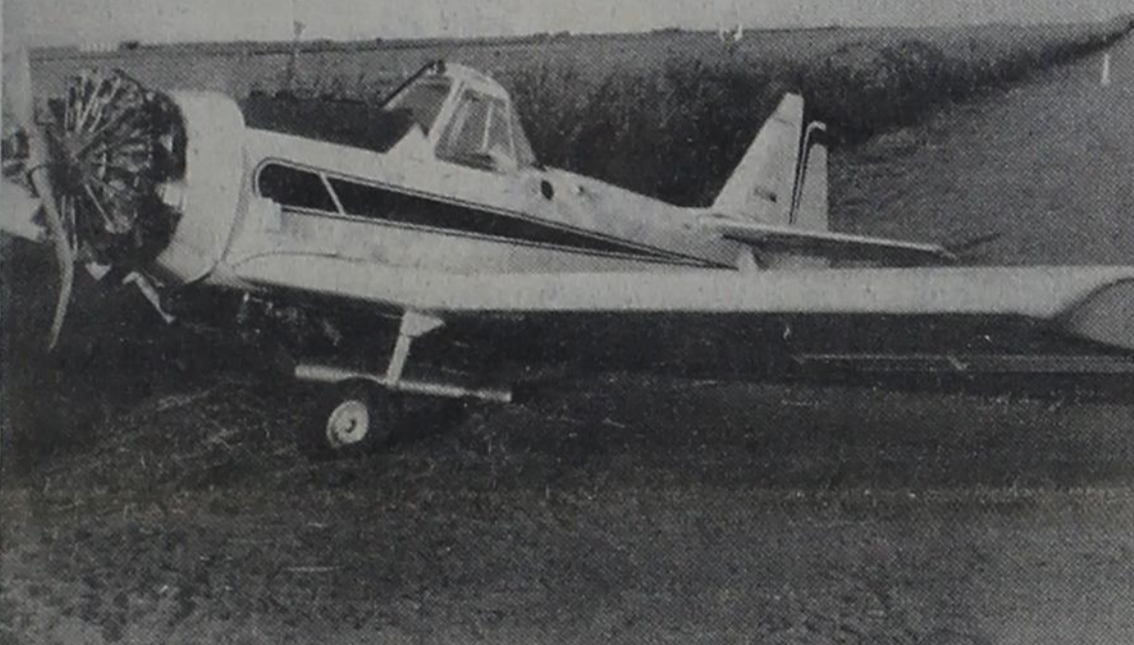

British Pilot Lands Plane On Rural Road Near Munday

A spray plane owned by Peterson Aviation of Minden, Nebraska, made a forced landing on a dirt road north of the Munday airport during the afternoon of Thursday, September 19. The plane was enroute to Artesia, New Mexico.

The pilot of the Weatherly 201B said he experienced engine trouble and tried to land on the county road. A wing tip caught on a terrace and spun the aircraft around as it landed. The pilot, who was from London, England, was uninjured,

and damage to the plane was estimated at \$15,000. Engine malfunction was listed as the cause for the mishap.

The plane was removed Friday, according to Knox County Sheriff Gene Nix, who investigated the accident.

County Receives State Road Funds

State Treasurer Ann Richards recently sent checks totaling \$7.3 million to Texas' 254 counties for road construction and maintenance. Knox County received \$16,730.30 of this sum.

Each year the treasurer disburses money appropriated by the Legislature for the Lateral Road Program. The grants may be used by counties for the purchase of right-of-way and for construction and maintenance of lateral roads, farm-to-market roads or state highways.

The money is allocated to each county under a formula based on the county's area, rural population and lateral road mileage.

Rules Changed For Applying Pesticides

The pesticide application regulations issued by the Texas Department of Agriculture last January have been revised effective August 6, 1985.

Leo Beason, president of the Knox County Farm Bureau, says area farmers and ranchers should make an effort to familiarize themselves with the newly revised rules.

"There has been some confusion as to who must comply with the regulations," Beason said. "No crops are specifically exempted, although pesticide applications made to livestock are exempt. Even herbicide treatments on pasture land could be affected by the regulations."

Texas law provides for severe penalties for individuals who intentionally misuse pesticides. Penalties range from misdemeanors for lesser violations to a maximum fine of \$5,000 and a prison sentence of up to ten years for intentionally abusing pesticides.

"We have pamphlets which summarize the regulations available at our Farm Bureau office located in Munday," Beason said. "We feel a duty to our membership to provide them with adequate information so they can avoid a violation of the regulations."

Local Research Station Makes Field Day Plans

A Crops Field Day will be held Thursday, October 3, at the Texas A&M University Vegetable Research Station in Munday. The program will begin at 9 a.m., with coffee and doughnuts to be served at the station, which is located east of Munday on Highway 277.

According to Dr. David Nagel, assistant professor and station superintendent, the field tour will include hot pepper production; cropping systems utilizing wheat, cotton, guar and grain sorghum; ef-

fect of tillage levels on cotton; cotton insect monitoring; controlled droplet applicators compared to conventional nozzles for pesticide application; and cotton variety trials. Transportation will be available for the tour.

Speaking in the field with Dr. Nagel will be David Bordovsky, research scientist, Paul Redwine, research associate, Gary Puterka, assistant research scientist, and John Robinson, research technician, along with Emory Boring, Extension Service entomologist, and Al Alexander, Extension Service agronomist.

The field day is being jointly sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, Munday Independent School District and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Adult Education Classes Scheduled

Four adult education classes will begin at 6 p.m. Monday, October 7, at the high school building in Munday.

Subjects to be taught include English as a Second Language (ESL) for persons who wish to learn to speak English; Adult Basic Education for adults who function below the ninth grade level in reading, writing, speaking, general mathematics and other generally required school subjects; General Education Development (GED) for adults who wish to receive certification of high school equivalency; and bookkeeping.

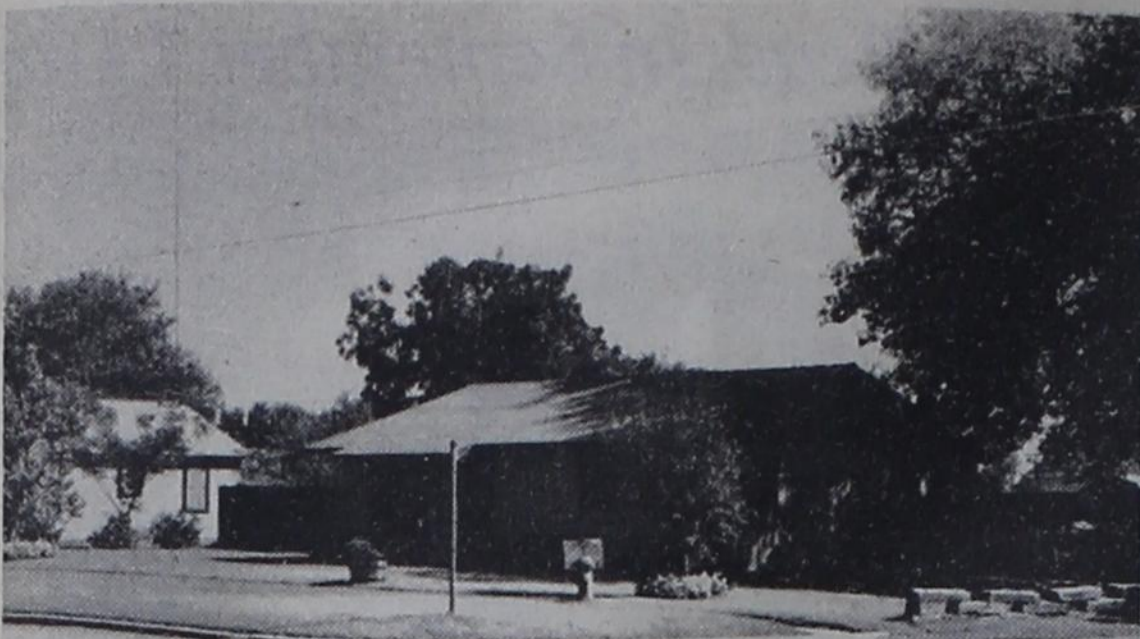

ORDINANCE

An ordinance regulating the storing of cotton burrs or any other combustible material in any quantity within the City Limits of the City of Munday, Knox County, Texas. Also making the violation of said regulation a misdemeanor, and fixing the penalty for violation in the sum of \$200.00, with each day of said violation constituting a separate offense.

Article 1. As used herein, the term "person" means an individual, corporation, association or any other legal entity.

Article 2. The purpose of this ordinance is to control the storage of cotton burrs or other combustible materials within the city limits of Munday, Knox County, Texas.

WHEREAS, members of the Munday Fire Department and other citizens have called attention to a potential fire hazard, and offensive odors created by cotton burrs stored within the Munday City Limits;

AND WHEREAS, said cotton burrs and other combustible material stored within the Munday City Limits creates a hazard to persons and property by possibly catching fire and also creating offensive odors;

AND WHEREAS, in order to protect persons and property within the City Limits of Munday, Texas, it is deemed necessary that the storing, piling or other accumulation of cotton burrs and other combustibles be controlled within the Munday City Limits, now therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MUNDAY, TEXAS: THAT it is unlawful for any person to place, store or pile cotton burrs or any other combustible material within the corporate limits of the City of Munday, Knox County, Texas.

BE IT FURTHER ENACTED that any persons violating this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and be subject to a fine not to exceed the sum of \$200.00 for each offense.

BE IT FURTHER ENACTED that enforcement powers are hereby granted to the Mayor, City Administrator, or any member of the Munday Police Department AND THAT each day of each violation shall constitute a separate offense;

AND WHEREAS, it is found by the Munday City Council that an emergency exists, and further, that it is necessary for the immediate preservation of public health and safety that this ordinance take effect immediately, an emergency is hereby declared and this ordinance shall become effective as of its first reading and adoption and publication as required.

READ, PASSED AND ADOPTED, this the 10th day of September, A.D. 1985.
