A&M researchers initiated the oject a year ago with a \$60,000 ant from the U.S. Army Corps Engineers office in Tulsa, Oklaoma. Also taking part are the Soil onservation Service Plant Mateal Center in Knox City, the A&M xperiment Station in Munday, nd the Corps of Engineers.

The idea behind the project - the rainchild of retired Corps of Enineers hydrologist J. L. Matthews is that some salt-tolerant plants ould be used in brine lakes to relove a greater amount of water arough transpiration, or evaporaon through the plants' leaves. evels in many brine lakes are igher than normal due to greater nan average rainfall in the past ew years.

"It's unusual, looking for plants vith a high-water requirement,' lox said. "Usually we're looking or just the opposite - plants that equire little water."


#### Enchilada Dinner fund raiser to benefit cancer patient

"This legislation has taken thousands of hours of hard work, but the results are well worth the effort. Schools will have a lot more flexibility while maintaining high accountability standrads to local taxpayers." Counts expressed his support for portions of the new Education Code dealing with facilities issues and the small and mid size school funding allotments, which should prove beneficial formost West Texas schools.

The Legislature also provided a significant increase in education while passing another state budget without tax increases. The \$2.2 billion increase in education funding will help fund the state approved increase in the teacher pay scale, as well as an increase in the

basic student allotment. The new budget for the coming biennium also provides additional funding in the area of criminal justice, much of which has been designated to fund the state's juvenile justice reform package.

Although the session has been a hard one he felt good about the results. "No one is going to like every piece of legislation that has come out of the session," said Counts, "But they should be pleased with the majority of this session's work and the effects it will have for their homes, families, and businesses.'

#### Preventing shin splints

Shin splints, a common leg injury among joggers and other weekend athletes, can be prevented with proper stretching and cross training.

Shin splints are caused when the muscle along the long bone in the leg does not expand enough to absorb the shock of a workout. "The shin bone absorbs that shock," said Dr. Donald Baxter an orthopedic surgeon at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Cross training -- varying the type of workout activity -- works different muscle groups and may help prevent shin splints.

Baxter suggests stretching the shin muscles by leaning against a wall with the palms of the hand flat, the arms at full extension. Then slowly fall forward so the chest moves to the wall. Hold and repeat this 10 to 20 times before running.

Whenever you feel pain during a workout, that activity should be stopped, Baxter said.

12 days last year traveling to Arkansas, along the Gulf Coast and up to Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, visiting plant material centers and companies that specialize in saltwater plants. "They also helped us screen out some of the things that we thought might work," he added.

"When you talk about salt tolerance, it means different things to different people," Bordovsky said. "To some it means salt in the soil, and to others it might mean salt spray from the ocean.'

Some of the plants were started from seeds, but the majority of the materials used was grown to size at the Munday facility from small plants.

"Now that they're in the ground,

we'll get them soaked with freshwater to get them a good start," said Cox. "Then we'll open up the pipes and bring in the salt water" where needed.

Both saltwater and freshwater tanks are being used, said Bordovsky, because, "If plants die you want to know the effect of other environmental factors like heat and cold.'

"The ideal plant would be able to tolerate temperature extremes, to keep the process going yearround," said Cox.

Two one-acre "test" tanks were dug last year just east of the current site, and one was surrounded with plants, Robinson said, in a controlled effort "to see how effective the plants were in soaking up water."

Researchers will continually

check the salinity of the soil Bordovsky said, and take growth measurements. "A lot of these plants spread through rhizomes (horizontal roots) and not seeds," he added. Also once or twice; year the tanks will be drained.

"We'll be checking to see that the plants are thriving, not jus surviving," said Bordovsky. "It's going to be interesting. But if we can find four or five or six that will work, then it will have been successful."

Those "surviving" plants will then be further evaluated by Dr Jim Ansley, A&M assistant professor and transpiration specialist

"I believe we'll get some good results out of this," Cox said. "I'm proud of the work the Corps and David (Bordovsky) have done in making this happen."



#### METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:

(1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device

(2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device

(3) Unauthorized activation of electric service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies, the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.



DIRECTORS

SECTION 4.01. NUMBER AND GENERAL POWERS. The business and affairs of the Sarah Elizabeth weighed six Cooperative shall be managed by a Board of seven (7) directors. Any director who shall miss three (3) Board of Directors' meetings in a row, without an excuse duly whom we converse. Whoever accepted and noted by the Board, shall lack eligibility to further serve and it shall be the duty of the Board of makes the fewest persons uneasy, Directors to remove him from the Board. No former employee whose employment has been terminated by the Cooperative may be eligible to serve as director. Any employee who resigns or retires from employment by the Cooperative shall not be eligible to serve as a director for a period of ten (10) years following such resignation or retirement. Nothing contained in this Section shall, or shall be construed to, affect in any manner whatsoever the validity of any action taken at any meeting of the Board of Directors, unless such action is taken with respect to a matter which is affected by the provisions of this Section and in which one or more of the directors have an interest adverse to that of the Cooperative.

In the event an incumbent director, having served on the Board of Directors a minimum of six years, ceases to meet the requirement of receiving service from the Cooperative at his primary residential abode, such incumbent director shall nevertheless be qualified to continue to serve as director so long as he remains a member of the Cooperative and his primary residential abode is located within the area served by the Cooperative, or in close

SECTION 4.03. ELECTION. At each annual meeting of the members, directors shall be elected by secret written ballot by the members and from among those members who are natural persons; provided however, that when the number of nominces does not exceed the number of directors to be elected, and if there is no objection, secret written balloting may be dispensed with and voting may be conducted in any other proper manner. Directors shall be elected by a plurality of the votes cast unless the members in advance of any balloting resolve that a majority of the votes cast shall be required to elect, and this Bylaw provision shall be drawn to the attention of the members and explained to them prior to any balloting. Drawing by lot shall resolve, where necessary, any tie vote.

SECTION 4.04. TENURE. The business and affairs of the Cooperative shall be managed by a Board of seven (7) directors which shall exercise all of the powers of the Cooperative except such that are by law, or by the Articles of Incorporation of the Cooperative, or by these Bylaws conferred upon or reserved to the members Beginning with the Annual Meeting of the members of the Cooperative held on August 21, 1954, two (2) members of the Board of Directors shall serve for a period of one year, two (2) members shall serve for two years, and three (3) members shall serve for three years, and that lots be cast as to the length of time each director shall serve; and beginning with the Annual Meeting of the members held in 1954, those directors whose terms expire, such vacancy shall be filled for a period of three years.

SECTION 4.05. NOMINATIONS. It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to appoint, not less than sixty (60) nor more than ninety (90) days prior to the date of a meeting of the members at which directors are to be elected, a Committee on Nominations, consisting of not less than five (5) nor more than eleven (11) members of the Cooperative who are not existing Cooperative employees, agents, officers. directors or known candidates for director, who are not close relatives (as hereinafter defined) or members of the same household of such existing employees, agents, officers, directors or known candidates for director, and who are so selected so as to give equitable representation on the committee to the geographical areas served or to be served by the Cooperative. The Committee shall prepare and post at the principal office of the Cooperative at least thirty (30) days prior to the meeting a list of nominations for directors to be elected. Any fifteen (15) or more members of the Cooperative, acting together, may make additional nominations in writing over their signatures, listing their nominee(s) in like manner, not less than twenty (20) days prior to the meeting, and the Secretary shall post such nominations at the same place where the list of nominations made by the Committee is posted. The Secretary shall mail to the members with the notice of the meeting, or separately, but at least ten (10) days prior to the date of the meeting, a statement of the names and addresses of all nominee(s) showing clearly those nominated by the Committee and those nominated by petition, if any. The chairman at such meeting, after all nominations so made have been duly announced, shall call for additional nominations from the floor. Notwithstanding the provisions contained in this Section, failure to comply with any of such provisions shall not affect in any manner whatsoever the validity of any action taken by the Board of Directors after the election of directors.





The fourteen year average catch of cotton bollworm moths has been approximately 130-140 per trap during the month of May. This number rises to about 200 moths per trap for the month of June. The 1995 catch for May has been considerably lower than the average, with a high of 14 on May 12 and a low of 22 on May 26.

Weekly fourteen year average for tobacco budworms range from four o seven moths caught per cage. So far the month of May has produced 10 more than three moths per cage.



Research at TAMU has shown that a certain amount of body fat is needed to achieve optimum reproductive function in mares as well as top performance in riding horses. How fat a horse is can be a matter of opinion depending on (and ranging between) whether a poloplayeroranexhibitorofhalter horses.

A standardized condition (degree of fatness) system; therefore, is needed. This system was developed in the early 1980's by Dr. Don Henneke and Dr. Gary Potter in the Equine Science Section of the Department of Animal Science at Texas A&M University.

A user friendly TAMU Condition (Degree of Fatness) Scorecard adopted from the 1989 publication, "NRC Nutrient Requirements For Horses" is available. Condtion scores, ranging from 1 (thinnest) to 9 (fattest), are listed on the far left column of the scorecard. Across the top of the scorecard are five anatomical sites (back, ribs (mid barrell), neck, shoulder (forerib), and withers). The quantity of fat at these five sites is listed in the body of the scorecard.

To condition score horses, observe the fat present at the five designated anatomical sites on the horse. Palpatate or feel those sites as long hair can be deceptive. Don't confuse toned muscle with fat cover. Appraise the fat content at the anatomical sites to determine the score. Use full unit or half unit scores. Use a compostie of all sites, not just one. This is necessary as conformation differences, pregnancy status, etc. may bias one anatomical site. For example, a pregnant mare in late gestation.

Homeowners own broodmares may appear thinner over her ribs (due to the weight of the fetus and subsequent stretching), than is indicated at the other anatomical condition score sites.

Research has shown that broodmares must be a condition score 5 (or higher) to maximize reproductive efficiency. The stored fat above a condition score of 5 is readily available energy. Research has shown that performance horses should be maintained at a condition score of between 5 and 6. Maintaining this level of condition will require appropriate and timely adjustments in feed intakes as horses are worked more Barry Stevens of Bremerton, or less.



#### Rotator cuff injuries A sore shoulder in athletes may

signal more than just tired muscles. It could be a rotator cuff injury.

The rotator cuff is a tendon that forms a circular joint where four muscles support and move the arm bone. If the cuff is damaged or lom, the top of the arm bone may press into the shoulder.

"People in their 50's and beyond are susceptible to this because of a lifetime of wear and tear on the shoulder," said Dr. Gerard Gabel, an orthopedic surgeon at Baylor College of Medicine.


Physical therapy can usually correct the problem, but sometimes surgery may be required to rebuild the cuff.
