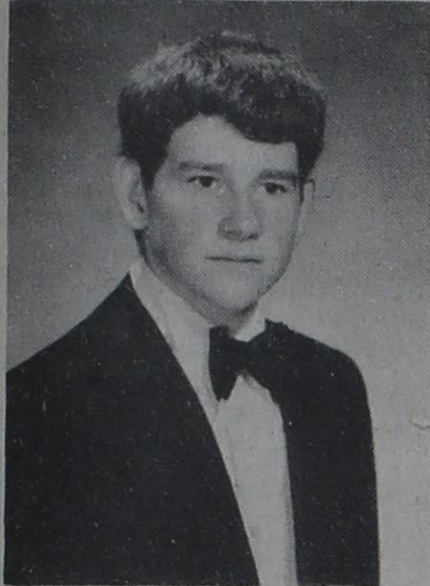

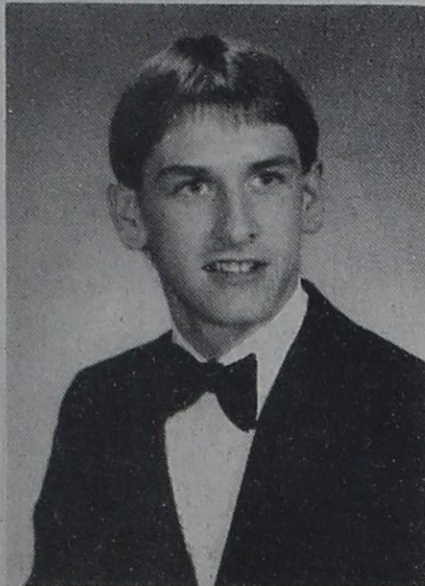

## Munday Sweeps Regional Track Meet

Talent, numbers and determined relay teams were the catalysts that spurred Munday track teams to championships in both boys' and girls' divisions of the Region II-A track meet held Friday and Saturday at McMurry Indian Stadium in Abilene. Six Moguls and six Mogulettes qualified for the state track meet, which will be held in Austin May 15-16.

Point totals at the regional competition weren't even close. The Mogulettes got revenge over Knox City, the district champs, by compiling 108 points at Abilene to the Houndettes' 66. Crowell, Irion County, Loraine and Aspermont rounded out the top six teams. In the boys' division, Munday racked up 96 points to Irion County's 68. They were followed by Rotan, Bronte, Rochester and Chillicothe.

Traveling to the state meet will be the Mogulette 400 and 800 meter relay teams and the Mogul 400 and 1600 relay teams. In addition, Munday athletes will be entered in 11 individual events.

It was the first time the Mogulettes had ever won a regional meet. "I thought the girls showed a lot of determination," commented coach Gina Farmer. "We are real optimistic about our chances at state. If our girls run as hard as they did at regional, we've got a good shot at placing high in every one of our events."

Personal best efforts for the girls included Robin Reneau in the two-mile run, Kathy Wilde in the triple jump, Mindy Myers in the high jump and the two relay teams. Outstanding efforts for the Moguls included those of Anthony Stinnett in the 400 meter dash, Trey Thompson in the 800 meter run and Lowell Hutchens in the discus.

The Mogulette mile relay team came in sixth, but Coach Farmer said if Munday was in another region, the team would probably have qualified for state.

Coach Ron Steele, while excited about his team's unexpected victory, said, "That was last weekend. We've got to put that behind us and concentrate on Austin."

But he admitted to being very pleased with the team's performance at the regional meet. "The boys did some things we weren't sure were possible. Going into the meet I felt it would be us or Irion County, but I thought they had the edge. Our boys just reached down and gave everything they had, and it wasn't even very close."

Karnack is the team to beat at Austin, Steele said. "We match up pretty well with them, and I think we have the capacity to win. On paper they look real talented, but you can't go by previous times or records - it all comes down to what happens on the track on that particular day."

Both state-qualifying teams will run in a qualifiers meet at Abilene Christian University on Friday, May 8. Field events start at 5:30 and run (Continued on page 2)

### AT MARCH MEETING

## Commissioners Deal With Full Agenda

The Knox County Commissioners Court met in regular session on March 9, with Commissioners Billy G. Johnston, Precinct 1, Bobby J. Roberson, Precinct 2, Philip F. Homer, Precinct 3, and Lee G. Patterson, Precinct 4, present. County Judge David N. Perdue presided and called the meeting to order.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved on a motion by Homer and second by Johnston. All accounts were examined, and Johnston moved to pay approved bills. Roberson seconded. A financial report from the county treasurer was received and approved.

Ray Lynn Hardin of Munday and Bill Baker of Knox City were reappointed to the Knox County Hospital board of directors. Patterson moved to appoint Judge Perdue as loss control coordinator, with Homer seconding. Perdue advised the court about proposed funding by the Legislature to zero-fund the Judiciary Section Appropriation, At. 3912e, Sec. 6A, VTCS.

Judge Perdue was asked to contact the proper officials of Texas Department of Highways and

Public Transportation off-system bridges division and the Texas Department of Community Affairs grant programs to inquire as to what assistance they can provide for Knox County. An air-monitoring report from Hartford Steam Boiler Company on the amount of asbestos still in the courthouse was received.

The court asked the judge to check into optional coverages for life and AD&D from the Texas Association of Counties. Two bids were received on a tax sale on lots in Goree. Bids on lots 6 and 7, Block 99, were for \$120 from Alvin Adams of Munday and \$30 from Sam W. Roberts of Goree. Patterson moved to accept the bid of Alvin Adams and Roberson seconded.

The court advised the county clerk to obtain a price list in regard to micro-filing records and present it to the court at a later date. The commissioners discussed the sheriff's gas tanks and logs; no action was necessary at this time. Sheriff Nix reported on personnel, automobile usage and other matters pertaining to his department. Homer moved to sell the old patrol car at the Young Farmers sale, and Johnston seconded.

The foregoing minutes were read and approved on April 13.

The annual spring Musicade has been set for 7 p.m. Tuesday, May 12, at the Munday High School auditorium, according to band director Rodney Bennett. Performing groups will include fifth grade, junior high and high school bands.

The director's award and the John Phillip Sousa recognition go to the most outstanding junior high and high school musicians, and the U.S. Marine Corps Semper Fidelis award will also be announced. A vocal solo by a senior bandsman will be another highlight of the evening.

Tickets will be available at the door, and the public is invited to attend the Musicade, which is traditionally one of the final events of the school year in Munday.

## Farm-To-Market Road Program Approved

Knox County Judge David N. Perdue has announced that the state highway commission has approved a two-year, \$41.9 million program for development of 71 construction and reconstruction projects on the state's secondary road system.

In the past, the farm-to-market road construction programs have been partially funded from the state's general fund. Because of severe problems in financing state government, the legislature discontinued the annual transfer of general fund monies for FM roads. Nevertheless, the highway department

staff recommended an ongoing program for the development of farm-and-ranch-to-market roads.

"This program is another step forward in the highway department's effort to provide rural Texans the best possible system of FM roads," engineer-director R.E. Stotzer, Jr. said.

"This is a rural-based construction and reconstruction program aimed at improving accessibility, serviceability, and safety," he said.

Construction in Knox County will consist of a new FM road from Texas 222 southward and eastward to US 277 and a new FM road from FM 267, 1.8 miles north of Texas 222, eastward to FM 2811.

Students to be recognized are those who have reached a high degree of excellence in various areas of academic endeavor, according to elementary principal A.B. Martin.

### Reception To Honor Retiring Principal

Directors of the Munday Independent School District will host a reception honoring A.B. Martin, retiring elementary school principal, from 2 to 4 p.m. Sunday, May 10, in the elementary cafeteria. Friends, students and parents are urged to join Martin's school associates in thanking him for his 33 years of service to Knox County schools.

Martin is retiring at the end of the current year after spending more than 20 years as elementary principal, prior to which he taught at the Gilliland and Sunset schools.

## 20th Annual Farmers Grain Co-op Meeting Held Monday

Farmers Grain Co-op of Munday celebrated 20 years of service to area farmers at the annual stockholders meeting held Monday night at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Rhineland. The Shamrock Cafe catered the meal, which featured chicken-fried steak, roast beef and the trimmings.

When the co-op first began operation in 1967, directors were Joe Patterson, J.H. Amerson, U.J. Bellinghausen, Gerald Brown, J.T. Murdock and Vernal Zeissel. Zeissel was recognized at the meeting as also being a member of the current board of directors.

Directors through the years have included W.R. Moore Sr., Philip Homer, Don Bowman, Earl McNeill and J.G. Hawkins. Others presently on the board are Kenneth Baker, W.R. Moore Jr., B.M. Brown, John Reneau III and David Key.

Co-op manager Maynard Moore said the fledgling business' assets in 1967 were little more than \$14,000. Assets at the close of the fiscal year

ending March 31, 1987, were \$641,867. More than \$515,000 in dividends has been paid during the twenty years, with 40 percent of these dividends being paid during the last five years at an average of \$41,328.64 per year. Sixty-eight percent of the dividends have been paid since 1977.

David Key was re-elected to the board at the meeting, and Jimmy Albus was also voted into a directorship.

## Social Security Rules For Summer Workers

Young people planning to work during the summer should note that special rules affect the reporting of earnings from many typical summer jobs for Social Security purposes. Becoming familiar with the rules can assure that the earnings are reported for important Social Security protection.

With most jobs, Social Security taxes are automatically deducted from the paycheck, and the employer pays a matching amount,

reports the total to Social Security, and sends the taxes to the Internal Revenue Service. Many of the jobs generally available to summer workers are service jobs (restaurant and hotel work, for example), farm work, or self-employment (sales work, for example). A person needs to know how to report tips, which is a major part of many service jobs, when farm work counts for Social Security, and how to report self-employment income.

Most service jobs involve tips. The employee must report cash tips amounting to \$20 or more in a month to his or her employer. The employer gives the employee a report of tips he or she earned during the month by the 10th of the following month, along with the tax due on the tips. The employer reports the tips to Social Security along with other regular wage reports and sends the tax to the Internal Revenue Service.

People who become involved in any of the above types of summer employment can call any Social Security office for more details on the rules involved for reporting their earnings. The telephone number at the Vernon Social Security office is 817-552-9346.

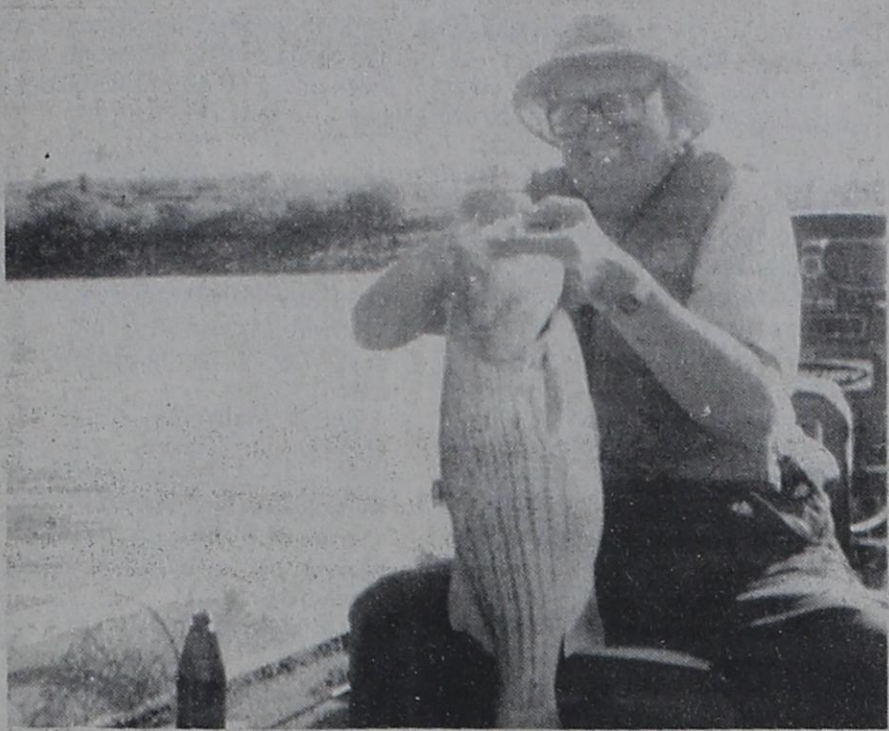

**EARLY SEASON CONTROL OF BOLL WEEVILS**

Large numbers of boll weevils are being captured in pheromone traps in Knox County. On April 27, 928 boll weevils were caught in eight traps, compared to 234 caught at the same time in 1986. Two traps captured over 200 weevils.

The Knox County Boll Weevil Association is sponsoring an early season boll weevil trapping program for cotton producers in Knox County. Interested producers may pick up boll weevil traps and pheromone

at the Farmers Grain Co-op in Munday during business hours.

Participating producers will be asked to keep weekly records of boll weevils caught in each trap and any early season control measures used. These records will be turned in to David Tunnire, county Extension Agent-Agriculture, for evaluation. For more information contact Maynard Moore at 422-4822 or Tunnire at 454-2651.

The boll weevil trap index to indicate need for early season control was developed by Dr. D.R. Rummell, professor of entomology at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock. The index is based on the number of boll weevils captured the week prior to the development of the first 1/3 grown squares. Usually this week begins 28 days after plant emergence.

Four traps are used per field. The average number of weevils captured per trap is used to determine the need for control measures. Control measures are needed if an average of 2.5 or more overwintered boll weevils are captured per trap. If an average of 1 to 2.49 weevils are captured, the field should be inspected to determine if all or part of it should be treated. If less than one weevil per trap is captured, control measures are not suggested.

With a uniform planting date of May 25, an insecticide applied just prior to the 1/3 grown square stage should be sufficient to suppress the weevil population until mid to late August. Two applications may be needed if weevil populations continue to emerge into early July.

Use of this trap index has been about 80% accurate in determining the need for overwintered boll weevil control. The timing of insecticide application is critical to the success or failure of an early season boll weevil control program.

## Boulter Testifies On Peer Review Due Process Hearing

Congressman Beau Boulter has testified before a congressional subcommittee hearing on due process problems with the peer review process used in Texas. Boulter and 17th District Congressman Charles Stenholm recently introduced legislation to restore due process and fairness to the peer review process, which is used to evaluate doctors who treat Medicare patients.

Boulter and Stenholm appeared before the Subcommittee on Health and the Environment of the Energy and Commerce Committee last week at the request of Chairman Henry Waxman (D-California) to discuss due process problems in Texas that have resulted in 23 largely rural family doctors being prevented from treating Medicare patients. In many small towns, elderly and Medicare patients make up 50 to 75% of the rural doctors' practices.

Bob King, president of the Texas Medical Foundation, and Jim Bob Brame, director of the Texas Medical Association, will also be in Washington to testify before the subcommittee.

The legislation offered by Boulter and Stenholm last week would specifically require that peer review organizations (PRO) give doctors opportunities to respond to sanctions before those sanctions go into effect, an opportunity doctors in Texas and other states do not presently enjoy.

The legislation would also require

a greater emphasis on educating doctors.

According to Boulter, two doctors in Canadian have decided to stop treating Medicare patients for fear of sanction by the Texas Medical Foundation after a third doctor in that town was sanctioned by the TMF.

Boulter will call attention to the disproportionate number of rural doctors under sanction. Of the 23 doctors in Texas sanctioned by the TMF, none reside in towns larger than Wichita Falls, and the bulk of these doctors live in towns under 5,000 people.

Phi Alpha Theta is an international history honor society. To be eligible for membership, a student must have achieved a grade point average above 3.0 in at least 12 semester hours of history and at least a 3.0 GPA in the remainder of his or her college work.

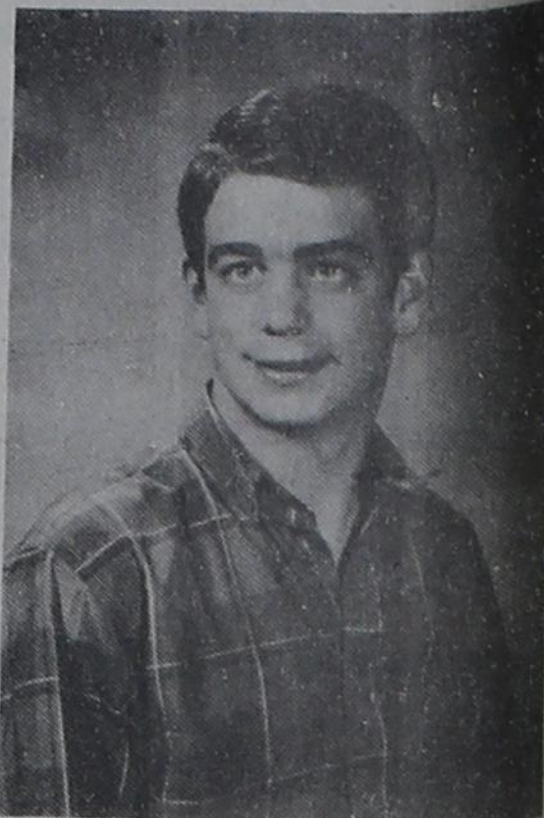

## Corn, Sorghum Mix Boosts Feed Value Animal Performance

The best feed for livestock is a combination of high moisture corn and dry rolled grain sorghum, according to a recent study conducted by researchers at the University of Nebraska.

Animal Science assistant professor Dr. R.A. Stock and associates at the university recently completed a study suggesting that a mixture of corn and sorghum improves animal performance.

According to Stock, four trials were conducted to determine the effects of grain mixtures. Trials one and two proved steers fed a mixture of high moisture corn and dry rolled grain sorghum gained faster and more efficiently than those fed only corn or only sorghum. Feeding a combination of corn and sorghum improved feed efficiency 5.5 to 7.4 percent compared to feeding each grain individually.

He added, "The third trial showed that gains were similar for

steers fed only high moisture corn or high moisture corn combined with dry rolled corn or dry rolled grain sorghum."

In the last trial, researchers determined the efficiency of starch digestion. Animals fed a mixture of high moisture corn and dry rolled sorghum digested starch as well as animals fed only corn.

Stock said that the combination of corn and sorghum improves the feeding value of both grains and should make sorghum a more attractive product.

"In the past, sorghum was always priced about ten percent lower than corn because its feeding value was thought to be lower," he explained. "But these tests prove that a combination of high moisture corn and dry rolled grain sorghum improves animal performance and is utilized as well or better than a corn diet. From these results, the sorghum producer should expect to sell more grain and at a better price."
