Thompson Ranch Rodeo team takes 4th place at World Championships

Members of the Thompson Ranch Rodeo team of Munday traveled to Amarillo, Texas this past week-end to participate in the 8th annual World Championship Ranch Rodeo. The Thompson team had qualified for the event by winning the Ranch Rodeo held in Colorado Springs, Colorado in July of this year.

The events in Ranch Rodeo mirror the jobs that these cowboys do every day back home on the ranch. That doesn't make it any less hair-raising, though. In ranch bronc riding, for instance, cowboys mimic the task of breaking an untamed colt to ride. They must saddle the horse -- who wants to do anything but cooperate -- and then mount up and ride for a bucking, snorting 8 seconds.

Another spectator favorite, wild cow milking, requires a cowboy to rope an angry 1,000-pound cow. Other team members grab her gyrating head and tail, and one "lucky" cowboy is chosen to milk the cow, funneling the milk into a longneck bottle. It's not as easy as it sounds -- and it doesn't sound very easy! Cowboys might have to perform a real-life cow milking if they found an orphaned range calf who needed nourishment.

In the competition last week-end the Thompson team joined twenty other teams from across the country who had won sanctioned events during the year. The Thompsons finished in 4th place with Ray Bradley finishing with the highest average

Andrade thrives on Special Olympics and a variety of sporting opportunities



Faith Andrade

Faith Andrade is an 18 year old Special Olympic athlete who was born with Spina Bifida which has left her paralyzed from the waist down. She is also hydrocephalic which has caused brain damage and mental retardation. Faith was a long time patient at the Scottish Rites Hospital in Dallas, TX. She also went through years of therapy at the North Texas Rehabilitation Center and has been in the Wichita Falls I.S.D. Special Education program since the age of three. Faith lives with her parents, Jesse and Nancy Andrade, in Wichita Falls. She attends the Wichita Falls High School and is a member of the W.F.I.S.D. Bandits Special Olympic team in Area 9.

Faith began her association with Special Olympics at the age of six. She started in the aquatics program. The swim coach quickly realized that Aquatics was not a proper place for her. Faith had, and still has, an intense dislike of getting splashed in the face. If she accidentally got splashed in the face while working with a coach in the pool, she retaliated by putting a stranglehold on the coach with the intention of drowning the coach. She was moved on to the Athletics team.

When Faith began participating in Athletics she could just barely wheel her wheelchair by herself. The Athletics coach was made of sterner stuff than the Aquatics coach and began a program of strengthening

Faith's arm muscles. To this end the coach insisted to Faith's parents and teachers that she accomplish at least 40% of her wheeling during the day. The 40% increased to 60% by the end of her second season of Athletics. Faith struggled for 2 years to finish a 25 meter wheelchair race. Thirteen years later Faith is competing in the 100 meter wheelchair race and winning gold medals at the Chapter Summer Games. She is also now able to throw both a softball and a tennis ball farther than 5 meters. Faith and her coach's hope is that one day she will no longer be eligible to throw the tennis ball because she exceeds the distance allowed. The year that Faith was 8 and finally old enough to go to Area nine's Spring Games there wasn't a dry eye on the field when she was awarded her first medals for the 24 meter wheelchair race and Ball Throw for Distance.

After conquering Athletics Faith took on Basketball. She was terrified of being hit by the ball and could not dribble the ball at all. Through several years of hard work and sheer determination she now can compete in stationary dribbling, passing, and spot shots. The smile on her face every time she catches the basketball as it bounces off the wall brings a little more light into everybody's life.

Faith took to Bowling like a duck takes to water. She has gotten so proficient that she can now tell her coach when the ramp is set up slightly off kilter. Bowling led to Bocce Ball and to more accomplishments. Faith plays halfcourt Bocce Ball without the use of a ramp. She likes to throw the Pallino ball short because she has figured out that the athletes who have the use of their legs don't like playing short. However, she has built up her strength to

the point where she can throw the Bocce Ball close enough to make points off a long Pallino throw. In fact she has become so good at the game that it is hard to find adequate competition for her among the Area 9 athletes.

Although Faith enjoys doing all the afore-mentioned sports, she has fallen totally in love with the new sport she was introduced to last year. Above all others, Faith loves Equestrian. She quickly learned how to sit up straight in the saddle and not be slumped over the saddle horn. She is mastering the technique of reining a horse and has finally remembered that she can't wave at the spectators or talk to her sidewalkers. Faith competed at the Chapter Equestrian event for the first time in May of 2003. She brought home both a gold and silver medal. Equestrian has given Faith a sense of freedom that is enjoyed by all those who have the use of their legs.

There is no doubt that the Special Olympic program has had a tremendous impact on Faith's life. All those who have coached her in various sports have watched her change from a self-centered, whining child with a negative attitude about doing anything for herself into a self-confident, independent young lady with a most positive outlook on life of anyone on her team. If you should happen to ask Faith about Special Olympics, be prepared to listen for a long while. It is a good thing that he is a Global Messenger, because Faith does love to tell about her experiences with Special Olympics.

Faith has a sister Trisha of Wichita Falls. Grandparents are Jessie and Martha Andrade of Munday. The late John and Geneva Fetsch of Munday. Great-grandparents are Sam Alcalá of Munday and Lupe Andrade of Dallas.

Capitol Highlight

Redistricting lands in hands of 3-judge panel

AUSTIN—What took four legislative sessions (one regular, three special) for 181 men and women to agree on will be decided by three people — or possibly nine.

On Dec. 11, a federal three-judge panel made up of Patrick Higginbotham of the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals and federal district judges Lee Rosenthal and T. John Ward will begin hearing in Austin a combined version of the various lawsuits challenging the state's legislative redistricting plan. Higginbotham and Rosenthal are Republicans, Ward a Democrat. If the panel does not rule the way the state's Democratic Party would like, the matter is likely to be appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Now known as Session v. Perry (Walter Session is a city councilman from Rusk), the lawsuit basically seeks a default back to the 2001 redistricting map, a plan drafted by a similar federal panel. Higginbotham and Ward, in fact, were on that panel. The current panel has three basic options — anoint the '01 plan, require yet another remapping or uphold this year's legislative effort. Whatever happens, however, will be soon. The 2004 elections are approaching as fast as the holidays.

Declaring your independence...

So, you're tired of the political status quo? Think you can get things done better than the Republicans or Democrats? If you, like singer-novelist Kinky Friedman, are contemplating running for state office as an independent, it's not quite as easy as it was in California earlier this fall. In fact, it's just plain hard to do. Anyone wanting to run as an independent must declare that status by Jan. 2, 2006.

The next step comes after the spring primary, or runoffs if there are any. An independent candidate must apply for a spot on the ballot within 30 days of the runoff. But simply applying is not enough. A candidate needs the signatures of 1 percent of the votes cast for governor in the previous general election. Oh, and the candidates must not have voted in any of the primaries. That means

Friedman and any other gubernatorial contender opting to run as an independent needs to collect 45,540 names. Difficult as that process is, Friedman does not have to do it for more than two years. Meanwhile, he's already got bumper stickers out.

\$130 million partnership in schools

The state is partnering with three private foundations in a \$130 million education initiative to increase high school graduation and college attendance rates in school districts statewide.

Gov. Rick Perry said the initiative Texas High School Project (THSP), which includes \$65 million in state funds along with roughly \$65 million in private funds, is one of the largest public-private efforts of its kind to improve Texas schools. Under THSP, the state will offer grants of up to \$600,000 to approximately 140 school districts to help pay for additional services for at-risk students at low-performing high schools to help them graduate and be academically prepared for college. Partners include the Michael and Susan Dell Foundation, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and the Communities Foundation of Texas.

Back in 1895, Texas hunting enthusiasts had a lot longer season. Quail season ran from Oct. 1 to April 1. Hunting deer was legal from Aug. 1 to Jan. 20. With two of the first three weekends of this deer season almost summer-like, today's Texas hunters can easily imagine what that early-day season must have been like.

New park guide available...

If camping, hiking or just plain enjoying the outdoors are among your passions, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has a new guide to the state's 120 parks. The 140-page guide is available free at Texas Department of Transportation Travel Information Centers, chambers of commerce or the TPW Web site, www.tpwd.state.tx.us/parkguide.

When Investing, Get on "Same Page" as Spouse

Communication is the key to successful marriages. But a surprising number of married couples may think they communicate well, only to discover that they have radically different ideas about one of the most important aspects of their life together - their money.

At least that's the finding of a recent research project completed by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. The study showed that men tend to estimate the family income 5 percent higher than their wives. And men view their family wealth - stocks, bonds, home equity, etc. - as 10 percent higher than wives do. Also, wives believe that family debts are about \$500 higher than husbands.

This "disconnect" could lead to problems when it comes to making important savings and investment decisions. For example, husbands, operating under inflated assumptions of income and assets, may be more inclined to spend, rather than save. Conversely, wives, concerned about higher debts and lower income and resources, may favor more conservative investments. In fact, other studies have shown that this may well be true.

Of course, in anyone's individual situation, it might not be particularly helpful to generalize on how husbands and wives think differently about saving and investing. Nonetheless, to make sure you and your spouse are working together toward your common long-term financial goals, you may want to consider the following suggestions:

- Review your finances regularly - Don't assume that you and your spouse know the exact same things about your income, savings and investments. Take the time to "put all your cards on the table." And do it regularly, because things change all the time - one of you may get a raise, one of you has noticed something unusual in your investment statement, etc. If you work with an investment professional who conducts regular reviews of your financial situation, you and your spouse have the perfect opportunity to scrutinize the same information.

- Discuss your goals - With careers, kids and all the activities of everyday life, you and your spouse may not have a lot of time to discuss topics such as retirement, college funding and other long-term financial goals. But you need to make the time. If you each have different conceptions of your ultimate financial destinations, you'll have a hard time agreeing on the proper strategies for getting there. Make sure each of you knows when the other would like to retire, what sort of retirement lifestyle you envision, what kind of contributions you're thinking of for your children's college education, etc.

- Reach common ground - If you and your spouse have different investment personalities, you may well have to find some "common ground." That is, if one of you is an "aggressive" investor, while the other is "conservative," you might have to chart a course that is considered "moderate." If one of you is unhappy with the way you are investing as a couple, then nobody really comes out ahead.

- Keep your records accessible - In some marriages, one partner manages the finances so completely that the other spouse doesn't even know how to find the investment statements, tax records and other documents. That is a recipe for disaster - if something were to happen to the "in-the-know" spouse, the other one could face big delays in taking control of much-needed assets. By following these basic suggestions, you and your spouse can work together to make continual progress toward your objectives. And, as you know from any endeavor in life, any job is easier when people pull in the same direction.

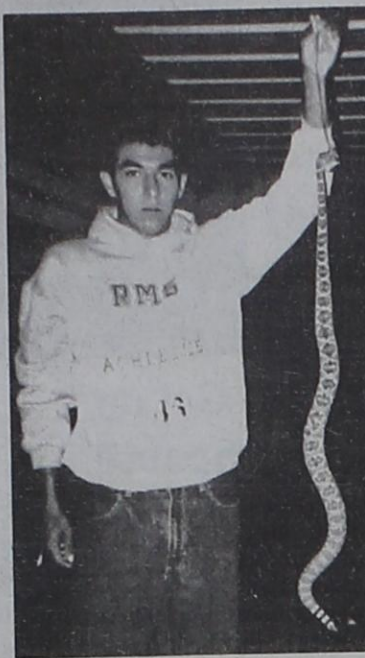

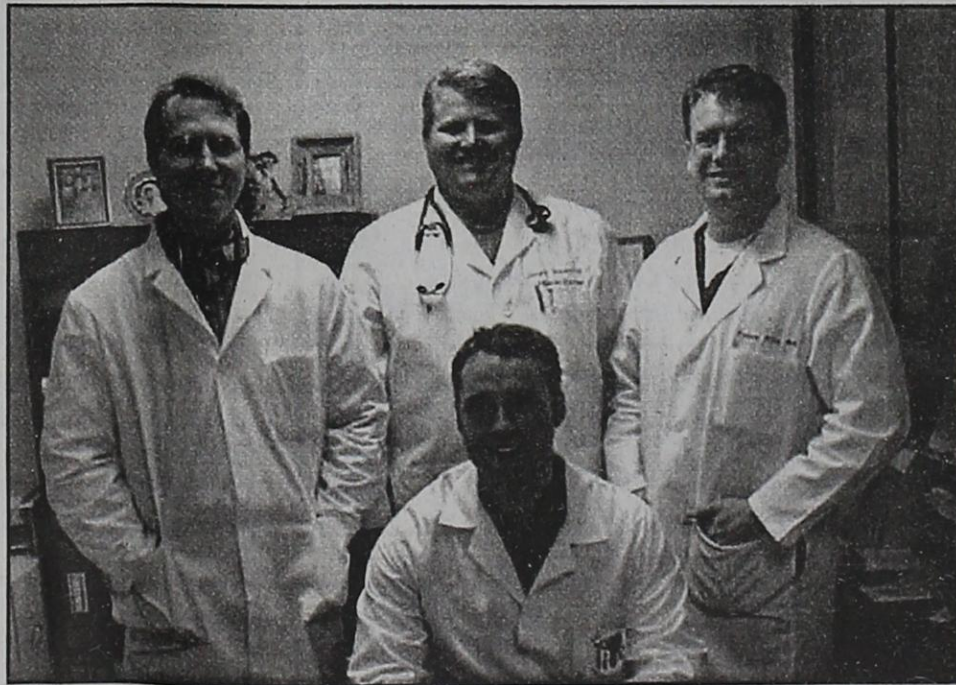


