Survey To Aid In Fund Application

City of Munday employees and

paving in several areas of town, and
officials feel the city should make an
attempt to obtain the necessary
money.

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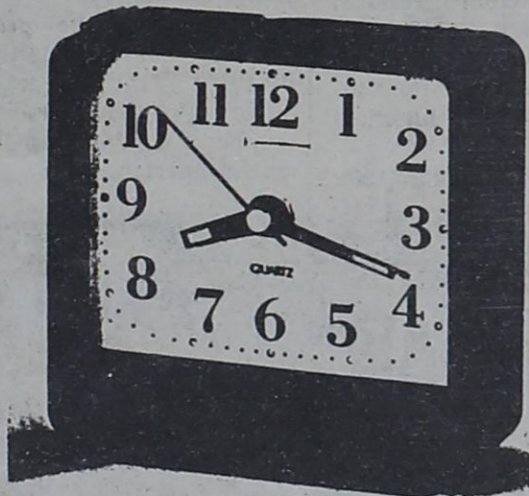

County Judge Voices Concern Over Proposed Legislation

"Fee Bills Divert County Revenue", is the cry being heard around Texas during the present legislative session in Austin.

Knox County Judge David N. Perdue said, "The state has found a way to get through the legislative session in Austin without raising any state taxes, but the way they have decided to do it means that the property taxes will probably have to be raised at the county level or services cut."

Several state programs such as the administration of justice, including increased local costs of the judicial system and costs of incarcerating state prisoners, and even the cost of drivers education in the public schools, may be financed out of county and district court fees if pending legislation is passed.

"The way this works," Judge Perdue said, "is that the state increases its share of fees that the county collects in order to raise revenue for state programs. This could decrease the future amount of money the county gets to retain from the fees. The county could be forced to take up the slack by increasing property taxes just to stay even."

Counties only have four sources of revenue: property taxes, fines, fees and federal revenue sharing.

Revenue sharing has been going down for several years, and the administration proposes to eliminate it by October 31, 1986. Revenue sharing averaged 16% of county budgets statewide in 1977 but in 1982 it amounted to only 11%. It's dropped even more since 1982 and will be gone entirely by late 1986.

"Taxes have to be increased even more by the county if inflation causes increased costs. And while the state is taking more of historical county revenue, legislators are devising ways to have the county take on more and more responsibility that normally would be handled by the state. The more responsibility they give us, the more property taxpayers have to pay."

To put it real simple, "The federal government is passing costs to the state, the state is passing costs to the counties and they aren't raising taxes. They're not. Local government has to do it for them."

"Those of us in county government are finding ourselves in the uncomfortable position of voicing our opposition to some essentially fine programs because of our concerns regarding their funding base. And with the direction the Legislature seems to be taking in its attitude toward the county's revenue base, it could cause us some real problems in the near future."

DON'T GIVE UP HAIL DAMAGED VEGETABLES

Many home gardeners in Knox County are wondering what can be done with those badly battered vegetable plants following a hail. The first thing that comes to mind is to till everything under and start over. Don't do that yet!

Most of the home gardens in the county had tomatoes, peppers, green beans, squash, cauliflower, cabbage, broccoli, and carrots growing in them when the hail hit. Some of these may look bad but they are not lost.

Tomatoes and peppers probably look the worst but they also have the best opportunity to survive. If the tomato or pepper plant is not broken off at the ground and just one leaf remains it will put out suckers from the buds on the stem. By now, this growth has been seen on most tomato and pepper plants in home gardens which were hailed on.

Vegetable plants like green beans and squash also can survive to produce a crop. The key to their survival is whether or not damage was done to the stem or terminal bud. If both of these are intact then the chances of survival are good. Vegetables which may have a hard time trying to survive hail damage are the cold season vegetables such as cauliflower, cabbage, broccoli, lettuce and carrots. These vegetables will require time and care before you can determine if they weathered the storm. Because it is too late to replant these vegetables, don't give them up too soon.

Other factors should be considered in conjunction to the survival of existing plants before starting your home garden over.

Availability of transplants is one of the most limiting factors. Most cold season vegetables are gone and the selection of tomatoes and peppers is limited this late in the season.

Time is another critical factor to consider. Hail damaged plants may be set-back two weeks but starting over may set your garden back four

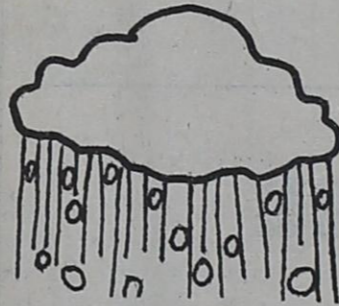
weeks. Your garden can still produce a bountiful harvest with a little time and care.

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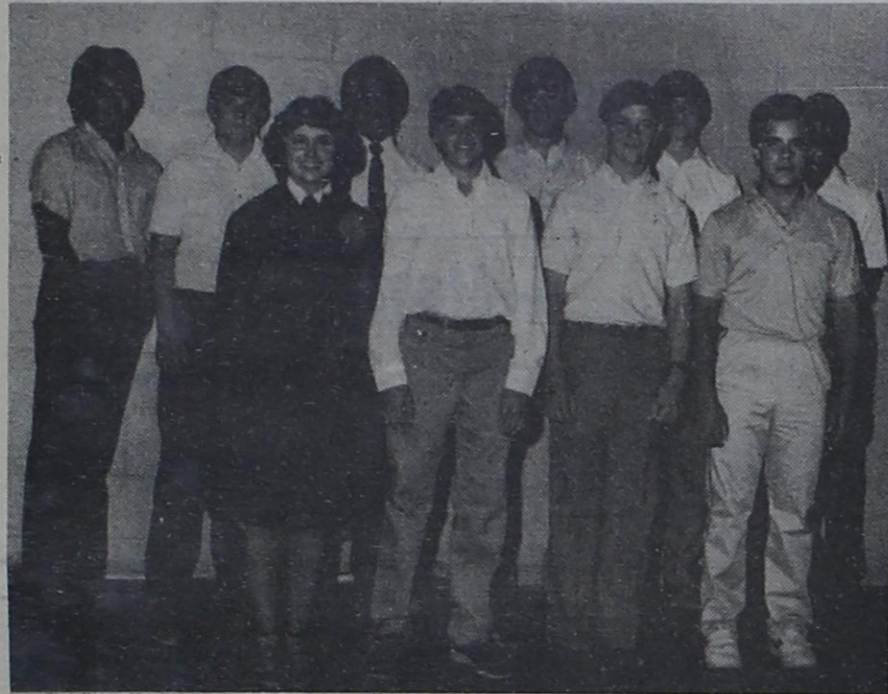

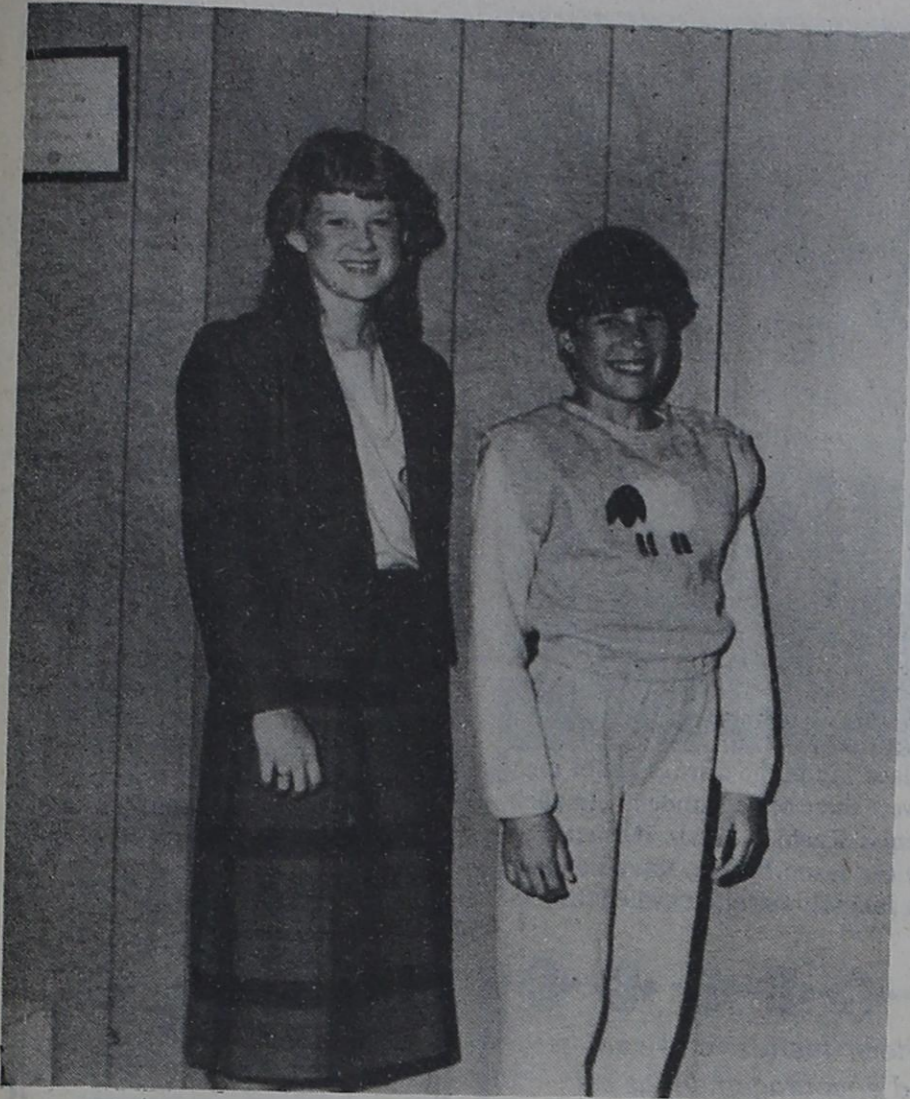

VITAMINS: USE AND MISUSE
Before you reach for that bottle of vitamin pills again, don't you think you should know more about what you're taking?

The easiest way to describe vitamins is to say that they are chemical compounds of an organic nature. This means they come from living things - like the plants and animal products that make up our diet.

Shortages of vitamins are not a concern of most of us if we eat a reasonably sound diet, because we require them in only tiny amounts. We need only a fraction of an ounce of all the vitamins combined from the entire amount of food we eat in a day to maintain good health.

Vitamins promote good health by assisting the major nutrients - proteins, carbohydrates and fats - to do their jobs. The fat-soluble vitamins, A, D, E and K, must be accompanied by fats in order to be absorbed into your body. Once there, they move about slowly and tend to settle into fatty tissue waiting to be used.

The water soluble vitamins, C and the B-complex, enter the body freely, move easily and are expelled if not used immediately.

What do these points mean to you? First, that the water-soluble vitamins must be replenished regularly since the body does not store them. If you take megadoses of

water-soluble vitamins - like vitamin C - you just waste your money. And if you take megadoses of fat soluble vitamins - especially A and D - they will be stored in your body and can produce poisonous build-ups.

Second, taking vitamins will not give you more pep. Vitamins contain no energy. What they do is to allow those major nutrients to do their jobs, one of which is to provide you with energy. And whether you have vitamins in minimum amounts or in megadoses, the energy outcome is the same.

So don't attempt to rely on vitamin pills as a substitute for a well-balanced diet. If you eat properly, there is no nutritional advantage in taking vitamins.

Did you know that the average American writes 24.6 checks a month? According to Telecheck Services, Inc. 11.5 are written to pay bills, 10.6 to make a purchase and 2.5 for cash.

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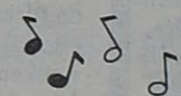

Teenage Behavior Studied At Seminar

Ralph Wayne Kantor, an independent child care consultant, led a workshop for studying self-destructive behavior in teenagers at the Santa Rosa fellowship hall in Knox City April 22 and 23. Sponsored by the Knox County Child Welfare Board, the workshop was attended by professionals who work with children, including educators, clergy and members of the Texas Department of Human Resources.

Kantor titled his program "The Rage Within" and detailed the circumstances which can cause a real crisis in the life of a child. He debunked many of the myths regarding suicide and presented latest research findings to the group. A substantial amount of his program was devoted to the factors involved in raising children who are generally resilient and tend to survive calamities.

Kantor, who resides in Abilene, was a speaker at the National Association of Health and Welfare Ministries and the annual Wilson-Johnson lectures. He is director of the executive development program at the West Texas Rehabilitation Center and works with a gifted-child program in Dallas. He also teaches human development and growth at Cisco Junior College.
