Wichita Falls Farmers Market To Open Friday

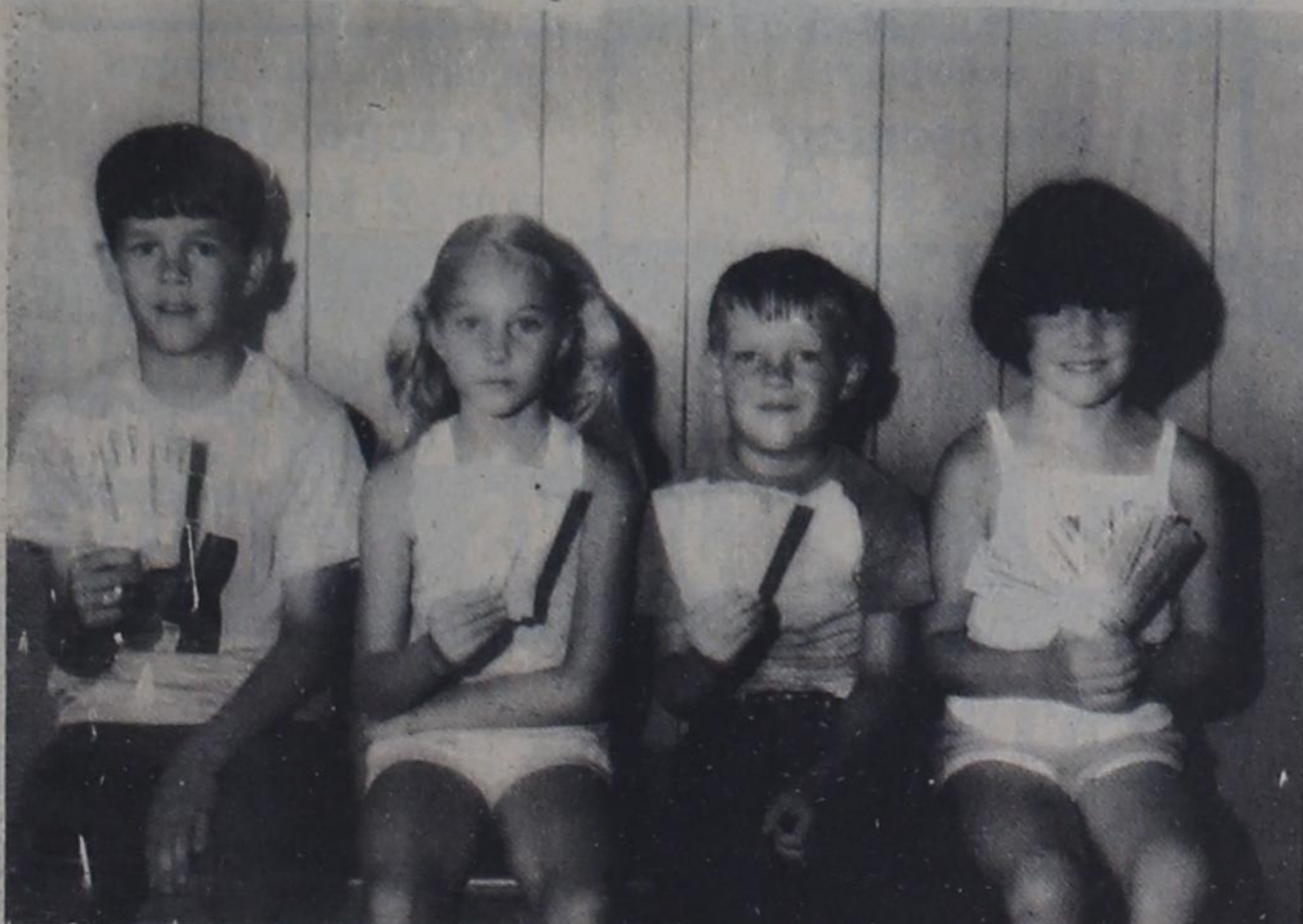
The Wichita Falls Farmers' Market will open June 15th at Ohio and 10th Streets with plans to move into a permanent facility about July 1 at Ohio and 8th Streets, according to B. T. Haws, Market Manager. The temporary location has covered stalls for farmers to back their trucks under and has shade for produce. Haws, retired Wichita County agriculture agent, said the cool spring weather has delayed most vegetables, but area growers

have indicated to him they will begin having fruit and vegetables ready for the market after June 1. However, the opening day for the market has been scheduled for June 15 to insure good quantities of produce for the large opening day crowd of buyers that is expected. A daily fee of \$7.00 will be charged individual growers to use the facilities at the farmers' market in Wichita Falls. Arrangements can be made for "dealers" of vegetable produce and for growers desiring a seasonal stall at the market. Haws can provide additional information on this. The market is expected to draw fruit, vegetables and melons from a wide area around Wichita Falls in both Texas and Oklahoma. Potato Harvest Under Way

Potato harvest in the Munday area got under way in earnest last Monday morning after having been delayed by rains for a week or more. Farmers were ready to harvest but had to wait until drying weather made the fields so they would hold heavy harvesting equipment.

The first to begin harvest were L. D. and Dan Offutt, who farm just north of Munday. They had a small load to reach the Munday Vegetable Growers' shed on Saturday and started up again Monday morning. Transport trucks were on hand Monday morning when the first spuds reached the vegetable growers processing sheds. It was stated that most of these potatoes were contracted to Ballentine Produce of Alma, Ark., and Frito-Lay, with the first shipment going to the firm's Irving plant.

It was a little too early to determine potato yields, but the spuds seemed to be of high quality.

First to be dug for the Colville and Wilson processing shed came from the Austin Tomlinson farm near Rhineland. These loads came from a field that had been damaged earlier by hail, but the yield was estimated at between 215 and 220 sacks per acre.

Kiser and Sons, who have 280 acres in potatoes this year, started their digging operations at 8 a.m. Monday. Most of this crop is contracted and a good yield was in prospect, although it was too early to determine. The quality appeared to be very good.

A larger portion of their yield has been contracted to

some five or six firms. B. E. Smith and Son started harvesting operations on their 220 acres of

red Tuesday morning. As usual, they do their own digging and processing on the Smith farms.

Knox County 4-H Horse Show Slated June 16th

The annual Knox County 4-H horse show will be held in the Lake Creek Arena in Munday on Saturday, June 16, beginning at 6 p.m.

Classes will include halter classes for both mares and geldings, showmanship, western pleasure, western horsemanship, reining, barrels and poles. Rules governing the show will be the official State 4-H Horse Show rules.

Participants must be 19 years of age or younger and must have owned their horse prior to May 1, 1979, to be eligible to compete. Participants may enter as

many classes as they wish, but may use only one horse. Trophies will be presented to winners of each class with ribbons for every contestant. Awards will also be given for the high point horseman and also the runner-up high point horseman.

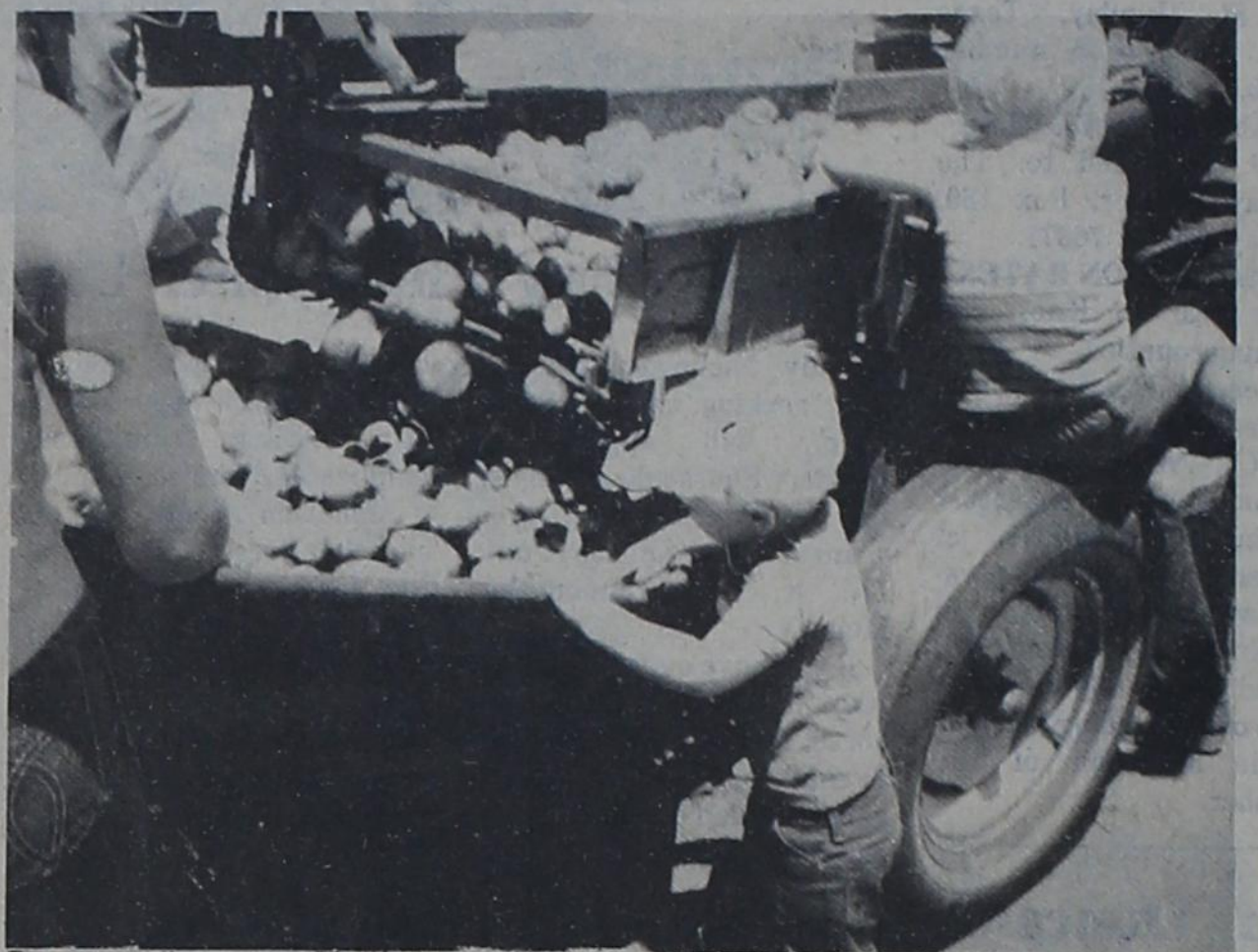
Two Earn Reading Club Certificates

Wheat Harvest Hits High Gear In Surrounding Area

Wheat harvest - like the month of June - began "bustin' out all over" early this week, as sunny days and brisk winds began drying out moisture in wheat fields over the weekend.

Some efforts were made to harvest Sunday, with one small load being received at Farmers Grain elevator. Others brought in samples for tests, and most of these contained too high moisture

content. At mid-afternoon one farmer's wheat tested 15.8 - just one point too wet to be accepted. Doubt was expressed that moisture would drop enough for cutting Sunday afternoon.

A heavy dew during the night Sunday prevented early wheat cutting, but with continued sunshine and wind, combines got started around noon.

It will be "busy times" from now on for combine crews, wheat haulers, elevator operators and wheat farmers until the golden grain is finally out of the fields. Combines are being fire up as soon as early moisture is burned off, and they continue to run on into the night until the grain is again to wet to be accepted by elevators.

Joe Decker of Knox Prairie Seeds, Inc., stated Monday they received their first wheat on Wednesday, June 6, when Roy Day Jr., who farms near Knox City, brought in some five or more loads. Additional wheat was received Sunday, and more

came in Monday. Decker said the first wheat tested okay, but later loads contained more moisture. These smaller amounts were accepted, and the grain dried out at the elevator.

4-H Judging Team Returns From State

The Knox County 4-H horse judging team recently returned from competing in the State 4-H horse judging contest conducted last week at Texas A&M University, College Station.

The team placed in the top fifteen against very strong competition from teams representing each of the Extension Districts in Texas.

Vegetable Production Gains Impetus By Added Research

Vegetable production research in the Rolling Plains of Texas will receive added emphasis under a cooperative arrangement between the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Tech University. This arrangement will find staff from the two agencies working side by side at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Vegetable Research Station in Munday, according to Dr. Wayne G. McCully, resident research director of the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center at Vernon, and Dr. Dwane Miller, head of the Department of Plant and Soil Science at Texas Tech University.

Mr. Richard Hassell will join the Munday research

staff as a research associate for Texas Tech University. Hassell has a M. S. degree in vegetable crops with a minor in plant physiology from Cornell University and a B. S. degree in horticulture with a minor in botany from Brigham Young University. His research at the Munday Research Station will feature potatoes, melons, onions, and cabbages. His investigations on improved practices in crop physiology, fertility and weed control will complement the vegetable breeding by Dr. Billy Kingston, associate professor in charge and the water and tillage work of David Bordovsky, research engineer.

young scientist with Mr. Hassell's capabilities to place in this cooperative research program, declared Dr. Dwane Miller.

This joint program will offer vegetable producers

and home gardeners in north central Texas with research in important areas of vegetable production. This joint effort will strengthen the research program for both agencies.

Big Slice Of Sales Tax Paid By Consumers

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said individual Texas consumers pay about 38 percent of all sales tax collected in the state.

Bullock said while the legal impact of the sales tax clearly falls on retailers who make the actual tax payments to the state, the portion of sales tax paid by individual consumers has remained fairly constant during the past four years.

Bullock's comments were included in "Fiscal Notes," a monthly financial report published by his office.

The estimates were based on an analysis of combines sales tax collections. He reported that businesses pay about 58 percent of all sales taxes and nearly 5 percent of the sales tax coming into state government is "exported" to consumers from other states.

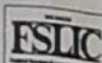

- Trim shrubs and bushes around the unit. Free air circulation around an air conditioner is a "must" for efficient performance.

- Check coils inside and out. Vacuum clean coils on the inside of the unit. Also, look for dirt on the outside coils. If cleaning is necessary, you'll probably need the help of a professional who can steam clean the coils.

- Check the oil points. If you're unsure of where to oil the unit, read the use and care manual. If you're still unsure, call the repairman. Ask him to show you where the unit may need oiling in order that you can oil the unit yourself periodically.
- Check the power cord on a room air conditioner. Look for peeling or cracked insulation. Repair problem areas at once.

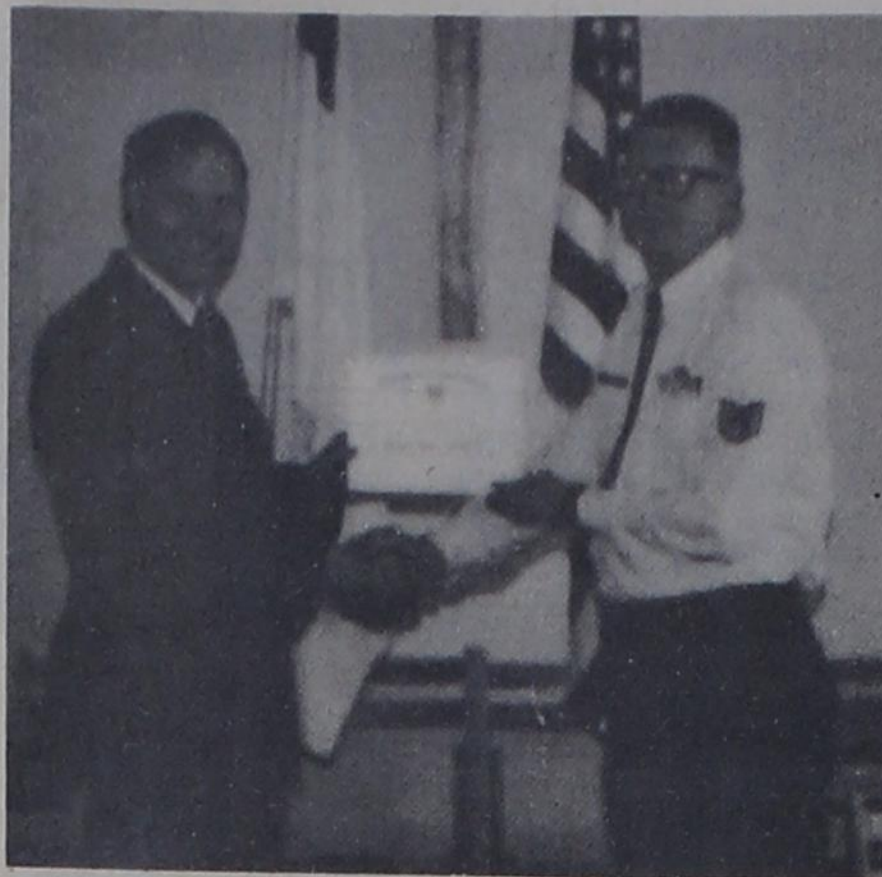

Funk, who uses a television camera to inspect two maternity pens, 62 free stalls and 10 calf pens - without leaving the house. He checks the 50 x 70 foot loafing shed 500 feet away that quarters his milking herd of 60 Jerseys. He suspended the camera from a rafter and equipped it with a telephoto lens and controls the camera with three switches mounted on his desk in the office of his house. The controls also operate a 250-watt 9-inch portable black and white television set. Two motors move the camera in a 90 degree vertical arc and a 355 degree horizontal arc. Funk says he can locate nearly everything in the shed, and he can see to the end of his 60 x 70 foot open lot even at night. The plot may be a little weak but the results are better than many of today's shows. *****

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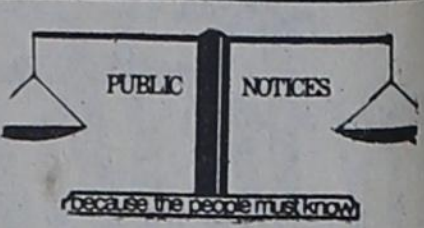

Control Grassland To Boost Grazing Program

Control grassland weeds and brush to boost your grazing program. Many herbaceous weeds and some woody weeds are good because they supply livestock forage high in phosphorus. Unwanted weeds and brush, however, cause considerable losses in forage production, adding to operating costs.

It is suggested to broadcast pastures with 2, 4-D amine or a low volatile ester, granular dicamba 5 percent (Bivel 5 g.), liquid dicamba (Bivel), dicamba 2, 4-D (Wedmaster) or picloram 10percent (Tordon 10K) pet and simazine. Kerosene, ammate and 2, 4-D may be used for spot treatments.

Products containing 2, 4, 5-T (Banvel 2+2, Tordon 25E and silvex) were suspended from use on rangelands, rights-of-way and pastures on Feb. 28. The Environmental Protection Agency defines pasture as "land producing forage for animal consumption, harvested by grazing, which has annual or more frequent cultivation, seeding, fertilization, irrigation, pesticide application and other similar practices applied to it."

It has been determined that all cultural practices must be carried out before a plot is a pasture. Also, any grazing land with a woody plant problem can be treated with 2, 4, 5-T because, by definition, it is rangeland. West of the East Texas Pineywoods, rangelands can be broadcast with 2, 4-D amine or a low volatile ester or 2, 4, 5-T compounds. Spot treatments with kerosene, 2, 4-D or ammate can be used on specific weeds. Water, plus a commercial surfactant, is the standard

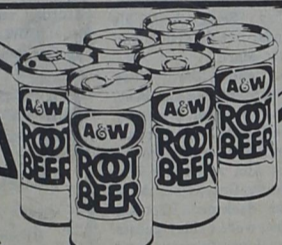
