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Look To The East

There ought to be a law! Until several weeks ago, we thought there was one that was poorly enforced. But we were informed recently that such is not the case - that it's not against the traffic laws.

We refer to the practice in Munday of motorists ginning along in one direction, then deciding to park, so they "bend it" to the left, right in the middle of a downtown street and park on the other side.

We have been standing inside the Courier building on numerous occasions when this happened right in front of the office. We couldn't help cringe at a sudden left-hand, middle-of-the-street turn. Sometimes they don't bother to signal.

It's the best way in the world to have an accident, we think.

Suppose someone is "tailgating" you and is too close to your vehicle to "brake it" to a stop. The result would likely be a damaged rear end to your car. It could, in our opinion, result in bodily injury, or death.

For that reason, we suggest that "there ought to be a law!"

We used to make a practice - along with Bill Bowley - of pulling into the driveway to the city hall just about south of our office, then making our turn to park in front of the Courier. Bill pulled in there one morning, then was amazed that the driver of the gargage truck backed into the rear of her car before she could complete her turn.

City officials told her she shouldn't do that, that the city could pay for damage to her car this time - but not more. The lesson was enough for her, and us, too. We both discontinued the practice!

When Boyd Baker was police chief, an Abilene man who wanted to come into the Courier office whipped his car to a middle of the block left and parked in front of the office. Boyd was coming from the city hall, said something to the man who came on into the office with a sheepish grin.

"You wouldn't do that in Abilene," we says, "and you can get your rear end knocked off in Munday just the same as Abilene." He asked the police what was going to happen to him, obviously expecting a fine. "Nothing," Boyd replied.

It was a long time after that when we were told it wasn't a traffic violation.

Trouble is that it's almost impossible to whip it to the left and park without being parked at an almost right angle. When a car is parked along the marked lines and this happens, it is next to impossible for the parked vehicle to be backed out.

We tried this once and locked bumpers with the car driven by the police chief's wife, who had parked in that manner. We located her in the library, told her our vehicles had "locked horns" and for her to survey the damage. She reported none, and we then asked that she drive her car forward so we could get the bumpers unlocked.

She went inside after her keys, but notified her husband, who soon arrived in his police vehicle. He examined the situation and said: "No damage," and at our insistence, moved his wife's car.

After he left the scene, we noticed that he pulled the same stunt with his police car - this time right on Main street. It was after this occurrence that we were told "The police say it's not against the law."

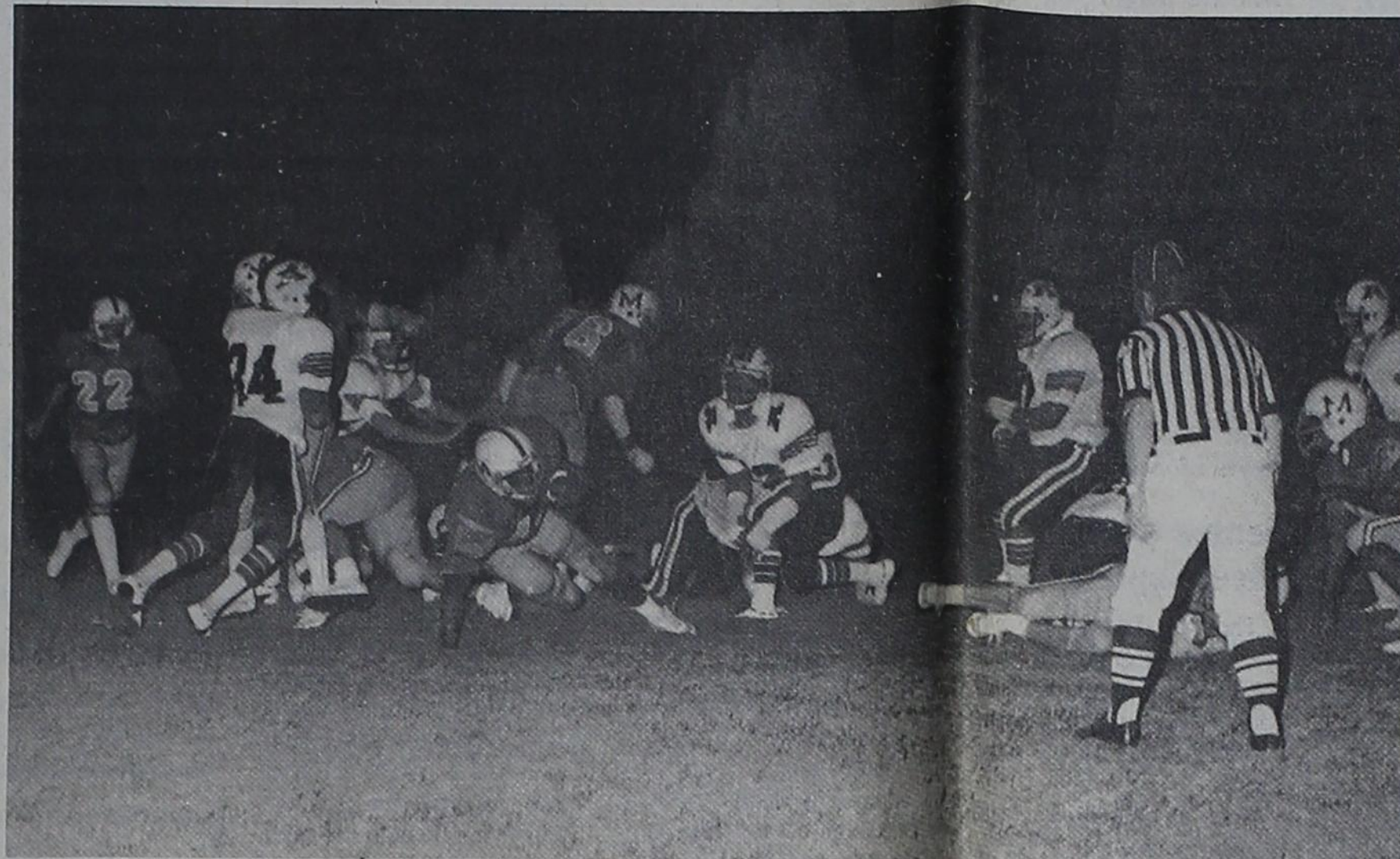
"Well, it certainly should be," we opined, and our informant agreed.

We don't know where the "fine print" is that makes this practice not in violation. If it's not the law, we still insist it ought to be!

Moguls Blast Anson 64-13

Hard work and the "Strawberry Shortcake" drills paid off Friday night as the Munday Moguls ran by Anson 64-13 in the season opener.

Led by senior tailback Quincy Adams, who rushed for 161 yards and five touchdowns on 13 carries, the Moguls failed to cross the goal line only three times during the game - once in the second quarter when they were stopped on the Tiger 25-yard-line, the second time when Kent Josselet lost a touchdown pass on a penalty, and the clock stopped them the third time at the half.

After receiving the opening kickoff, Munday drove 63 yards in nine plays and Adams ran over right tackle from nine yards out to score with 8:52 left on the clock. Ronny Lowrance kicked the extra point.

Anson came right back with Junior Garcia scoring on a one-yard run over right tackle with 1:28 left in the quarter, but the extra point try was blocked and Munday retained the lead.

The Moguls were stopped on the Anson 25-yard-line on their next possession. But the Mogul defense, led by Brad Angerer, controlled the line of scrimmage and stopped Anson cold, forcing a punt which was nearly blocked and Munday got the ball back on the Tiger 47-yard-line. Dent Offutt hit Todd Thompson with a 42-yard pass, and with the blocking aid of Ronny Lowrance and the offensive line, Adams scored from five yards out. Lowrance kicked the extra point, making the score 14-6.

43 seconds later Adams scored again after Munday recovered a fumble as Anson attempted to punt on their own 8-yard-line, leaving the score 20-6 after the extra point try was blocked.

Anson was stopped with minus three yards on their next possession, and forced to punt. Four plays later Ronny Lowrance crossed the goal line from six yards out for his only touchdown of the night. Adams completed the extra points. The Moguls were driving again when the clock ran out, giving the home team a 28-6 lead as they went in at halftime.

Munday came out running in the second half, driving 70 yards in three plays on their first possession. Adams ran for 10 around left end, Lowrance gained two yards up the middle and quarterback Dent Offutt sprinted 58 yards around left end for his only touchdown, with Lowrance again good for the extra point.

Aided by a 15-yard pass interference penalty, Michael Garcia tacked on six points for Anson on a six-yard reverse run with 6:08 left in the third quarter. Matt Wilson kicked the extra point. The Moguls came right back 17 seconds later as Adams scored his fourth touchdown with a 66-yard run around right end.

City To Gain More Housing For Elderly

After more than three years of sending large amounts of various data, paperwork and general red tape to the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), Jeanie Carden, executive director of the Munday Housing Authority, has announced the purchase of land for construction of nine new apartments for Munday's senior citizens.

The application for these apartments was submitted to HUD on April 9, 1979, according to Mrs. Carden, and a letter was received from Congressman Charles Stenholm in August of that year confirming the approval of the application. "Since that time," said Mrs. Carden, "we have been submitting detailed paperwork to get to where we are today."

The Housing Authority Commissioners have voted to name the new units the Amerson Apartments, in honor of retiring director J. H. Amerson. Dorse Collins, chairman of the board, made this announcement at the annual meeting of the commissioners held Tuesday, September 6, at Granny's Kitchen.

Mr. Amerson has served on the Board of Commissioners of the Munday Housing Authority since January of 1960. He was chairman of the board until October, 1982, when he resigned this office due to health reasons and continued to serve as a commissioner. He has asked to be taken off the board when his term expires in October of this year.

Therefore, in honor of Mr. Amerson's 23 years of dedicated and supportive service to the Munday Housing Authority, the board of commissioners takes great pleasure in announcing this means of recognition. Other members of the board are Phillip McAfee, vice-chairman; Frank Jackson and Larry Swan.

The land for the apartments was purchased on Tuesday, August 30. Six of the new units will be constructed on land purchased from O. V. Milstead and Colville and Wilson south of the Community Center, and the remaining three on the property located behind the business of Wilkie Guinn which was sold to the Housing Authority by Mr. Guinn.

The nine new apartments will be designed especially for senior citizens, with all the necessary safety features. They will all have front and back doors, washer hook-ups and tubs and showers. Each apartment will contain one bedroom.

Bids for construction of the new units

will be opened at 2 p.m. Tuesday, September 27, in the Housing Authority office.

Mrs. Carden also announced that the Housing Authority received approval in December on an application for \$92,400 worth of modernization and improvements to the red brick apartments near the school and to the Newsom Apartments. This money will also provide additional parking area and a new walk at the Community Center. The walk will be installed with handrails but no steps, making it easier for persons who have difficulty walking to come into the Center.

Cameron Alread, an architect in Fort Worth, has been chosen by the Housing Authority board to design this project, and his contract has been sent to HUD for approval. Mrs. Carden said this project should be given the go-ahead to start in the next three to six months.

Another application for modernization in the amount of \$68,000 was mailed to HUD for their approval on August 19, 1983. These funds are slated for improvements to the apartments near the school. Approval of this application is expected within six months.

Surplus Of Histories Prompts Special Offer

Members of the Munday Historical Committee have sold, up to the present time, 78 copies of "My Home Town" to people in the local community. 52 copies of the history book have been purchased by former residents, many of whom have written complimentary letters to the committee, voicing their pleasure with the book.

These sales have reduced the committee's indebtedness by some \$2,000; however, a large number of copies remain unsold and the money borrowed from the bank to cover printing costs has not yet been repaid.

A special offer has been made to families whose histories are published in "My Home Town". The response from out-of-town buyers has been very gracious, and the committee is extending the offer for their benefit, as well as making the special bargain available to the public.

Local Newspaperman Is Senior Citizen Of Month

Look to the east, because that is the only direction you can look and behold the greatest of all miracles - the first rays of the rising sun. The sun with its magic explosion of light that engulfs the entire universe is God's miraculous ray of heralding the arrival of another wonderful day.

These words were written to begin the first "Look to the East" column, in October of 1971. We feel that repeating them is an appropriate way to saluting our senior citizen for September.

Aaron Edgar was born July 27, 1904 in Hemphill, Sabine County, Texas, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin M. Edgar. The family moved to Fort Worth, then on to Hall County. Aaron received his education in Hall and Collingsworth counties, graduating from Wellington High School. After two years at John Tarleton Agricultural College in Stephenville, he became an associate editor of the Collingsworth Standard in 1927. Later he worked at the Throckmorton Tribune, the Eldorado Success, then came to Munday to operate the Munday Times in 1938. He married Alta Tom Bridge of Memphis in 1938.

In 1947 Mr. Edgar and Grady Roberts formed a partnership and purchased the Munday Times, with Mr. Edgar as its editor and publisher. They sold the newspaper establishment in 1965.

In October, 1971, the Times was closed through bankruptcy and the town was

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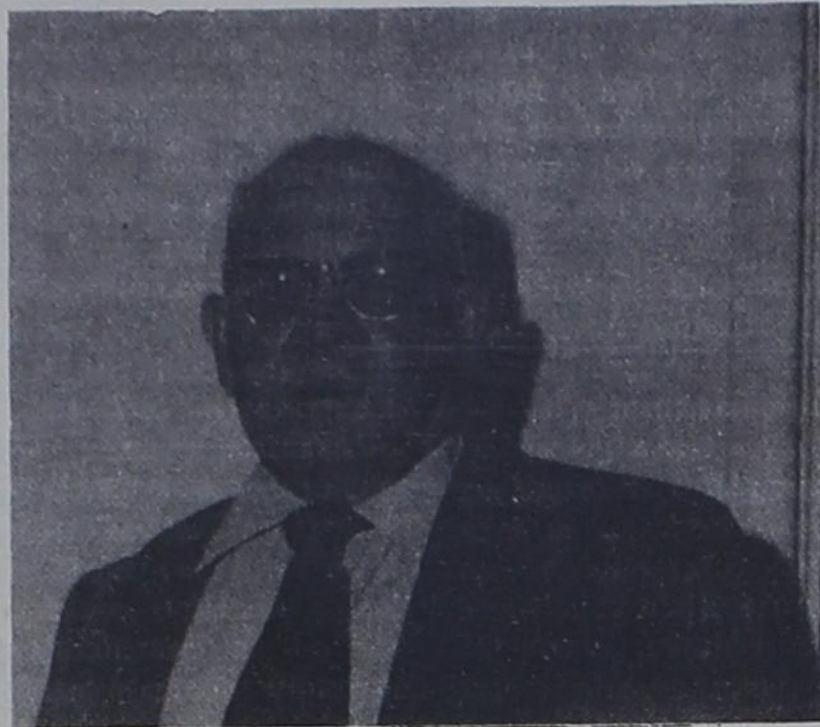

without a newspaper. Although Mr. Edgar had semi-retired, he still worked when needed at the news office. The community sought his assistance and experience in returning to the newspaper business, and within one week, the Munday Courier was born in the offices of the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. The community came alive again as everyone realized the importance of a rural newspaper. Mr. Edgar was really "conscripted" into service, as he was not eager to spend the many long hours it took to publish a newspaper. He did it for the community, and the community appreciated his willingness to come out of retirement and serve them once again.

In 1973 the Courier was sold to the M. L. Waggoners. Mr. Edgar was still willing to work two to three days a week, and has been invaluable to the Courier and to the community.

Aaron and Bridge are "good neighbors" to the entire community. He has been a news boss to many employees of newspapers in Munday. In conversation with some of his former employees, they described him as "the best boss" anyone could have. His sense of humor always surfaced during his working day. He is always willing to help serve his fellow man in any capacity, whether it be related to the newspaper, his church, civic groups or charitable activities.

He has always enjoyed the Lions Club, having served as their publicity chairman for 30 years, held other executive offices and last year received his 29-year pin for perfect attendance. He is also a dedicated member of the First United Methodist Church in Munday.

One of the high points of Mr. Edgar's year is his family reunion, which is held during Memorial Day weekend. He takes great pleasure in visiting the remaining members of the original "Edgar clan", as he refers to his family. Included in this

group are his two brothers, Tommie Edgar of Dallas and Zeddie Edgar of Stephenville, and two sisters, Josephine Warrick of Eureka, Kansas, and Maurine Albert of Houston.

How can anyone surprise a newspaperman? According to Callie Ann Combs, manager of the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, "It is not the easiest thing one has to do. Aaron was selected as Munday's Citizen of the Year in 1971. It was the custom of the news media to write the story of this citizen prior to the annual banquet when the presentation was made. Aaron gave me a very bad time as I could not divulge the name of the honorary citizen. It was most difficult to explain to him that it was an absolute secret until banquet night, but prevail, I did. I had to ask forgiveness for a 'little white lie' to prevent his knowing it. Everyone will always remember that banquet as Aaron, with his camera, moved to the head table to be able to get a picture of the recipient. As he focused the camera he found he had no subject . . . he slowly looked around for someone to come up for the award, and at that time realized his name had been called. He was a very perplexed Edgar! He soon forgave me for misleading him, although his expression of surprise will never be forgotten.

"Aaron and I have worked together on stories for each Senior Citizen of the Month. We had so many nominations we agreed the best way to begin was to take the nominations in alphabetical order. As 'E' comes after 'D', it should not come as a surprise for Aaron, but if it does, then we offer our congratulations to you, Aaron, you are our Senior Citizen for the month of September."

JV's, Junior High Teams Play Thursday

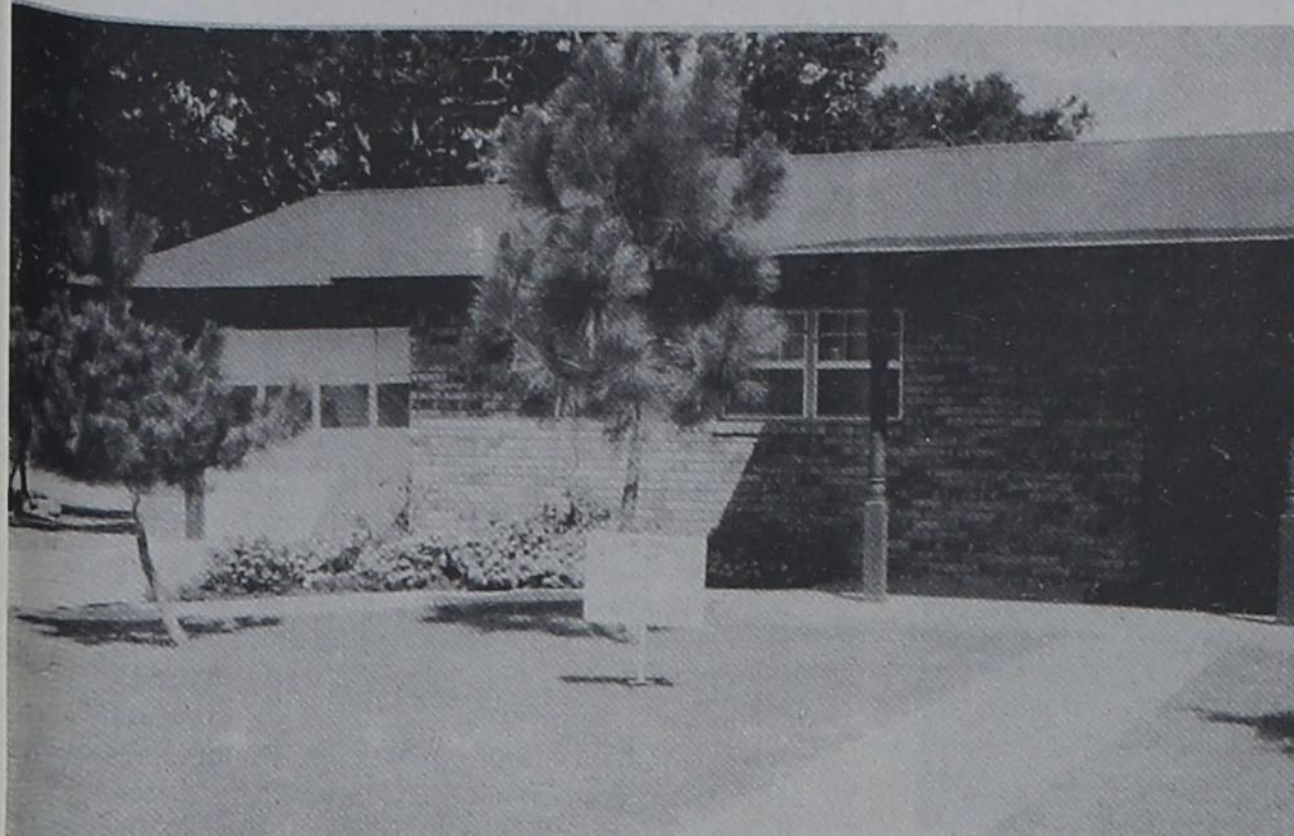
The Munday Mogul junior varsity lost their first game 18-0 to the Anson Tigers last week.

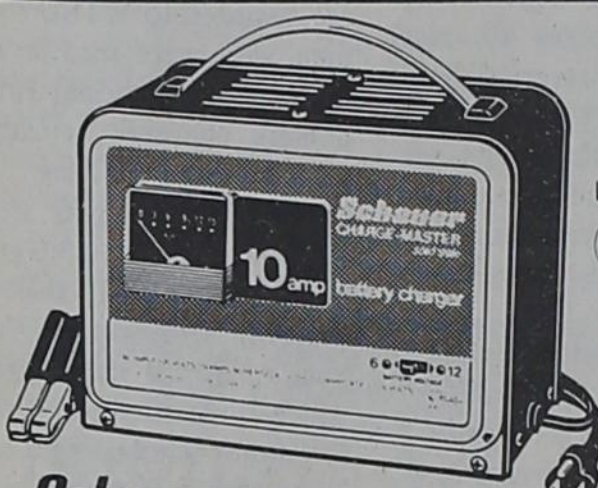

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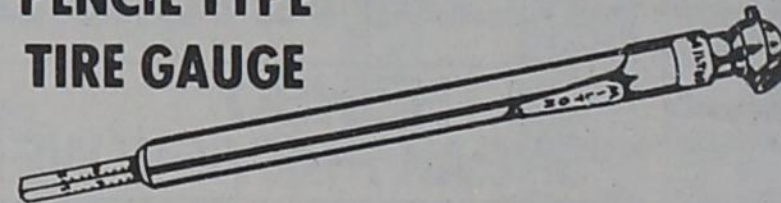

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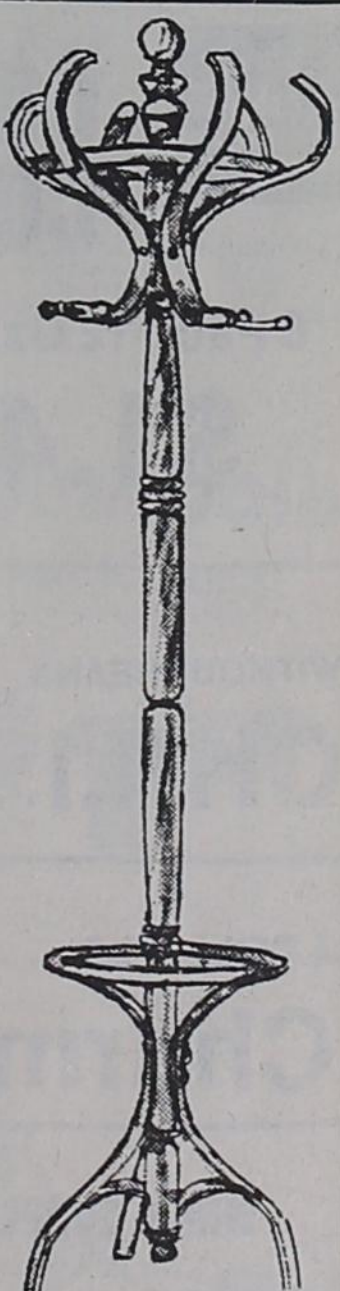
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LaJet Classic To Present Texas Putting Championship

Who is the best putter in Texas?

That question will be answered when the finals of the Texas State Putting Championship will be held on Wednesday, September 21, as a pre-tournament special on the eve of the 1983 LaJet Classic at the Fairway Oaks Golf and Racquet Club in Abilene.

Amateurs, touring pros, and club pros will be gunning for \$10,000 in prize money and prizes as the summer-long qualification process will culminate with the finals at the Fairway Oaks practice putting green.

The Texas State Putting Championship is being conducted by the PGA tour and the PGA of America under the sponsorship of two Abilene firms, Dave Pelz Golf Research and LaJet Petroleum. PGA tour administrator and former tour player Bob Dickson is serving as tournament director for the Texas State Putting Championship.

Qualification began July 15 at golf courses all over Texas on the grass roots level and continued through September 5. Club champions will be crowned September 10 with those winners moving on to regional competition on September 17 at seven sites around the state.

21 amateurs will then advance to the Texas State Putting Championship finals in Abilene the Wednesday before the start of the \$350,000 LaJet Classic at Fairway Oaks. They will be joined by Tom Kite, Ben Crenshaw and four other PGA touring pros from Texas, plus the top two club professionals from each of the two PGA sections in Texas.

From that select group, the first-ever Texas State Putting Champion will be crowned. This tournament is essentially a pilot program for a proposed World Putting Championship in 1984. Texas was chosen to test the concept be-

cause it is such a strong golf area.

Dave Pelz, whose dream is realized by the Texas State Putting Championship, says early reaction to the idea is fantastic. Scores of golfers have signed up at pro shops around the state.

One attraction to the Texas State Putting Championship is that all levels of golfers can compete - men, women, juniors and seniors. Tournament director Bob Dickson says, "Unlike a regular tournament competition or a long drive contest in which most golfers do not have a competitive chance, everyone has had a 'hot' putter on given occasions."

Kevin Kuehler Wins Additional WTSU Scholarship

Kevin Kuehler has won his second Don and Sybil Harrington Scholarship at West Texas State University in Canyon. These scholarships are awarded to WTSU freshmen who were members of high school National Honor Society chapters or similar organizations. One son, Howard William, preceded his father in death in 1936.



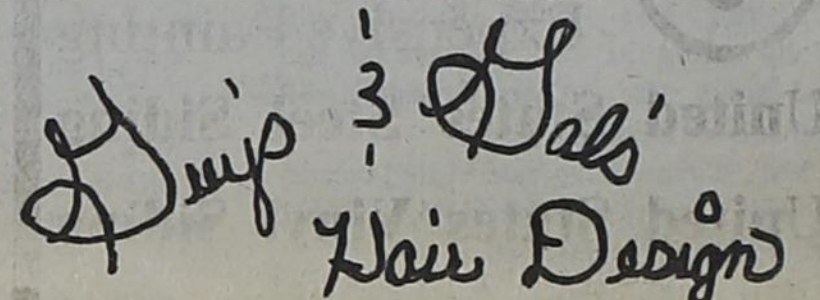

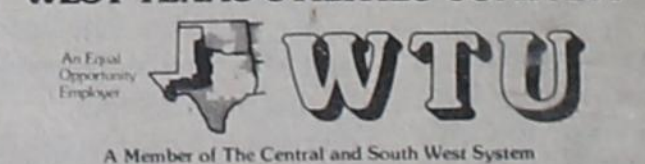
