THE MEXICAN GOVERNMENT ALLOWS HIM UNTIL 1906 TO FINISH THE ORIENT LINE.

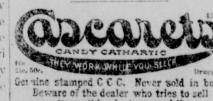
Austin, Tex., March 19.—The permanent survey for the Mexico City, Mexico & Orient railroad between Chihuahua, Mexico, and Presidio del Norte, on the Rio Grande, is to be made immediately. W. T. Millington, local engineer for this division of the proposed road, has started out from Chihuahua with a party of engineers, to run the line north-east to the Concho river. The route of the road when north through its rich valley to the Rio Grande border. The Mexican government has modified the concession granted A. E. Stilwell and associates for building this road. The modification is embraced in a supplementary contract dated February 20, 1902, by which the time for the construction is extended until 1906.—Kansas City Star.

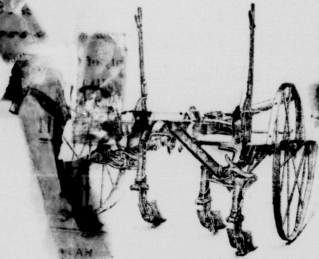

# Bro. McGehee Again Takes Us to Task.

Vernon, Texas, Mar. 31st. Editor News:

You say "That no greater loss occurs just along the line than immediately west of it is attributable to the fact that cattle east and south of the line are immune." (1)

You further say that "Newly imported cattle when brought to a country from east Texas arrive well from the beginning. The only danger is to the native cattle." (2)

You say, it is only the "uninformed" that are kicking against present law and regulations of cattle quarantine. (3)

In the beginning of your reply to my article of the 18th, you proclaim your own sanctity and that of your country. Figuratively, "Thank God" that you are not as the "publican sinner." (4)

The first observation I had on question of tick fever imported and given to native cattle was in the early fall of 1887, 35 years ago next fall. The case of Texas steers, long horns, were started in early spring of '87, and passed up being driven thro' to northern Illinois or foot. This drove passed up through southern Missouri, where I then lived, grazed along the way from south Texas mixing with other cattle along the way. No injury was done by this drove until got to a central Illinois. There many native cattle caught fever from these cattle and died. None of the drove died of this fever. (5)

After this, in 1874, the St. L. & M. & Southern Ry. Co. shipped

to the south side of the line. Now please do not lay the blame on me again and you will see that we agreed for you to exercise your pleasure as to a location. Were it left solely with us, we would have you remain with us. We ask that the following letter be carefully read. Then you believe it not, you will believe none—"Though One roared from the dead."

Washington, D. C., Feb. 25, 1902—Mr. S. Webb, President, Albany National Bank, Albany, Tex.: Dear Sir—I regret owing to absence from the office I have been unable to answer your letter of the 17th inst. at an earlier date.

I note with regret your statement that there is a decided opinion to the quarantine line in Texas and that the state senators from your district has come flatly in opposition to the line claiming it is a scare and fraud and that the tick theory is a humbug of the worst kind. It is ever regrettable that his views are shared by many of your people and advocated by the press.

If it could be certainly ascertained that cattle were entirely free of ticks they might go above the line at any time of year, unfortunately, it is impossible to ascertain this fact safely by any ordinary inspection. Cattle from below the line may have ticks on them so small that no inspector could find them, and yet after the cattle crossed the quarantine line the ticks might develop and cause disease. This has frequently occurred, and the recent instance of a large number of animals in the country taking the disease at the Charleston exhibition, where every precaution by your citizens and in inspection and veterinary attendance was adopted, shows of facts are established and impossible it is to guard against denunciation of the disease by inspection. In spring of 1882 I came to Vernon, then on a plain cattle trail. Some years over 200,000 head of southern cattle were driven along the high edge of Vernon to north ranges. Very little complaint of native cattle catching fever from any of the herds though this country was then full of native cattle. In 1895 Wilbarger county was south of the general quarantine line. Many Jersey cattle died that year from Bowie, Texas, to Amarillo, Texas, all along the line. Every year cattle die above the quarantine line just as many of them as die below it.

Your citation of Wilbarger county people's trouble with quarantine north is unhappy for the position you assume for Wilbarger county is on the wrong side of the line for your purpose. (9)

The defect in present law is principally in its uncertainty, and too much authority and arbitrary power given quarantine officers. I could cite instances of wrong and oppression along this line that have come to my knowledge. Thus a rule that does not protect from fever should be upheld simply to give power on one side of the line in matters of market over those on the other side when the line has little merit when looked into, for you quote the happy condition of immunity from fever that obtains

and happiness—as an abiding place—and we object to anything being done that will deprive us of any part of the happiness thereof. Yes; a home in the Panhandle, under present quarantine regulations, is as near perfection as it is possible for a mortal to obtain. (8)

have been brought to the attention of the search of various classes. With reference to your statement that it is the interest of the people to enable them to raise cattle at a higher price than other cattle are kept, to prevent competition and to operate in this way to a certain extent, I know that the purpose of establishing the line, because it was by my advice, I had no interest, directly or indirectly in any class or cattle in Texas or in favoring any class of Texas cattlemen who have memories will not fail to recall that at the time it became difficult and almost impossible to move Texas cattle north by the route caused. I studied out the present plan of shipping them to market for slaughter at all seasons of the year, without uncertainty or delays, and have worked steadily to keep open the market of the Northwest for feeders from Texas at such times of the year as could be safely moved there.

The quarantine line in Texas was first established by an investigation to determine from what counties in the state cattle came which could carry this disease to other sections. The line established by this class of evidence did not differ materially from that afterwards established with reference to the counties infected with Texas fever tick. Consequently, it makes little difference

in the matter an our efforts to relieve your cattlemen of all unnecessary restrictions. I have said this much to show you that those who claim the tick theory is a humbug, and that the quarantine line was established to favor certain classes of cattle growers, are mistaken in their opinions. But with the facts which I have stated admitted, it still remains for your people to decide what course is best for them to adopt for their own interests. As one who has labored many years to aid Texas cattle growers in marketing their crops, I may be permitted, perhaps, to express my views upon this point. I do not think any one can successfully contest the fact that Texas cattle have been brought to market without any restrictions and that the cattle business in Texas was never more prosperous than it has been during the last few years. The first time I was in Texas I attended a cattle convention at Ft. Worth, and I heard one of your cattle raisers telling another that they were bringing more than they were actually worth. Under such conditions, it seems to me the part of wisdom to be deliberate and careful in making changes which are liable to affect the cattle industry of the whole state.
