Oats from 50 to 75 with occasional yields of 100 bushels per acre. Most of the wheat sown was the Marquoise variety and all of this is yielding well. The corn is far above an average, and four weeks will put nine-tenths out of the way of frost. Corn that was planted in June is now in roasting ear stage. It has been ideal corn weather even since we came. This is not the case all over the state. The southwestern part has had drouth and hot winds as has Kansas and Ne-

braska in many places. I wish the people of Foard County could have the apples that are going to waste here now. This is usually the case with the early apples, as they will not keep long. There are enough going to waste on our farm now to make every boy and girl in Foard County happy for a few days if they were here.

We are inded sorry that Foard County has had its long drouth and hope that none feel that it was sent as punishment, as there are no better people, taken as a whole, than are the people of Foard County, and Foard County will come again some day. The cause is purely a natural one. We have friends in the vicinity of Cut Bank, Mont., who have had no crops for two years, and that is a very cold country.

THISTLE IN SCOTCH HISTORY

Various Traditions Concerning Its Adoption by the Highland Clans as Their Emblem.

"The thistle of Scotland is said to be the oldest national flower, and tradition traces its adoption to the reign of Alexander III and the battle of print this week on account of space. Larga" (when an attacking Dane but these will appear next week. stepped upon a thistle and involuntarily gave the alarm, whereupon the Scots drove the invaders out).

"Another account of its adoption is of a very different character," writes Katherine M. Beals in Flower Lore and Legend. "About the middle of the fifteenth century a company of sternfaced men met in the council chamber of Edinburgh, and the occasion of that meeting was to discuss the advisability of substituting the thistle for the figure of St. Andrew on the national banner. The proceedings of the council were secret, but soon after the thistle appeared upon every Scottish banner. The national motto might have been adopted with appropriateness on either of these occasions: 'Nemo me impune lacessit.' The polite reading of this is, 'No man attacks me without being punished,' but the more simple translation of earlier days was, 'Touch me who dares!' while the original is supposed to have been, 'Wha dare meddle wi' me?' Another inscription which sometimes accompanies the Scottish emblem reads: 'Ce que Dleu garde, est bien garde;' 'That which God guards is well guarded.'

"The thistle appeared officially for the first time during the reign of James II, who had it placed on the coinage of the kingdom and adopted it as his own badge. It also appeared upon the coins in the reigns of James IV, Mary Stuart, James V and James VI. The thistle merke was a silver shilling. The thistle dollar was a double merke. Each took its name from the emblem on it."

Lacustral Settlements.

lacustral settlements were places of refuge for a pastoral and agricultural people, and the light and drypess that characterized the dwell ings show a step in advance toward more permanent abodes. In this period science places the beginning of civilization. By these lacustrine men spinning and weaving were invented. Agriculture was born among them; animais were domesticated-the ox, the cow, the sheep, the goat, the dog. The uses of metal were discovered, and the age of iron was ushered in. Habitations similar to these still exist in the East Indies, and among the Amazonian tribes of Maracalbo. They existed also in Lake Prasias, in Thrace, during the time of Herodotus, the Greak historian.
