Fresh, cool, frosty mornings remind us of our boyhood days, when the lascivious persimmon hung low on the bough, and the possum wandered nightly in large numbers through the bottom, corn and cotton patches, and both were ripe.

Mr. Stephens succeeded in getting a bill through the House during last congress looking to this end. Through the efforts of Senator Jones of Arkansas it received a favorable report from the senate committee on Indian affairs, and one of its strongest advocates in the senate was Senator Chilton. Its failure to pass the senate was due to the opposition of Senator Platt, of Connecticut, who objected to it being taken up out of the regular order, and it was too low down on the calendar to be reached in its turn.

Mr. Stephens' success in getting this bill through the last House was a great victory for him as a member serving his first term. Other congressmen before him had tried to secure the passage of similar measures, but invariably met with signal failure, and Mr. Stephens' success in this one matter entitles his election to a third term.

When the importance of this measure is considered, as it directly affects the interests of north-west Texas, every candidate for congress should be required to openly announce his position as to whether he favors or opposes opening this country to settlement. If he opposes it, he opposes a measure which is of vital interest and does not deserve their support. —Wichita Falls Times.

A Letter from Rev. Dr. J. W. Grace to His Fored County Friends

Nov. 2, 1899.

Editor News: As I have promised to write to so many of my friends, and find it quite a task to write to each one separately, so I will write one letter to the News and ask all to consider it to them personally.

As you all know, I came here principally for my health, which, I am proud to be able to say, has very much improved. I will now say that I believe this to be the best place for any one who has any lung trouble or catarrh of the head or throat that I ever saw. The winters are said to be very mild here. All I know of that is from the appearance of things generally. The people here are even now planting gardens just like they would be doing there in April or May. We have all kinds of garden stuff, such as beans, English peas, onions, tomatoes, beets, lettuce, etc. In fact anything that grows in the garden.

We have had no cold weather here yet this fall. It has only been two or three nights that I have slept with cover over me. Well, some will wish to know about the general market, etc. I will answer that by saying that everything is about like it is there except garden vegetables. Anything that grows in the garden as well as some of the fruit here in town is for sale. You can rent a good house at from two to five dollars per month. Land is what some would call high. Anywhere within five or six miles of town good land, unimproved, is worth from \$75 to \$150 per acre. Labor is about the same here as it is in Fored county. Now, southwest of this town a distance of 25 or 30 miles you can get land at from one to two dollars per acre, and finer land is not in existence. There will soon be a railroad built from San Antonio to Brownsville, Texas, running through a belt of as fine land as there is in the state of Texas, and that land is unsettled and can now be bought for almost your own price, but the moment the railroad is built the country will begin to fill up and then of course the land will advance. The city of San Diego is in the center of this country and will, I think, be a fast town in the near future.
