Death of John H. Reagan

The death of that grand old an who has served his country man who has served his country so faithfully in public 1'e since 1859 occurred at his home(Old Fort Sam Houston)near Pales tine Texas at 5 o'clock lest Morday, March 6. His last sickness was of four days duration only. He was not thought to be ser iously sick until a few hours before his deate, when the case developed into acute poeumo

In the death of John H. Reagan, Texas loses her most dis ringuished citizen. With him pased out into the great beyond the last of the cabinet officers of the two Governments during the Civil war, 1861 to 1855. He was born in Seyler County Tennesce, Oct. 8, 1818 and was

86 years and 5 months old when death came. His public life began as a deputy public sur-veyor of the Nacogdoches Dis't. in 1839. After that he served as Justice of the Peace, Captain of Militis, Colonel of Militia, Probate Judge, member of the Legislature, Dis't Judge, Member of Congress, Member Prober of Congress, Member Pro-visional Congress of Confederate States, Postometer-general of the Confederacy, Secretary of the Treasury of the Confederacy, Member of U. S. Congress, U. S. Senator, Chairman of the Texas Rellway Commission, and in all this long public career extend-ing over a period of about 60 years, he maintained the repuyears, he maintained the repuyears, ac maintened the repa-tation of an honest and effi-cient public servant. He retired from public life of his own voli-tion to attend to his private af-fairs. He was a grand old man. His attenuess both in public and private life evidenced a His attenues both in public and private life, evidenced a pure and noble mind. The Orient Railroad is the most important new line that is now b ing constructed or projected in the United States. It will be more than 1600 miles long when completed, and is surveyed and located in nearly a direct line from Kansas City to Topol-obampo on the Gulf of Califor-nia in the Republic of Mexico It enters Texas on the north line of Wilbarger County, crossing the Denter Railway near Chill-cothe, then coosing the Texas and Pacific at Sweetwater, then through portions of the counties Iron, Reagan, Upton, Crockett Pecos, Brewster and Presidio. crossing the Rio Grande river below the Mexican town of Prebelow the Mexican town of Pre-sidio del Norte. 
