TEXAS SCHOOL LANDS.

This and all the other free school and asylum lands can, be bought by actual residence in each of four years, or by purchase in advance of the time when placed upon the market. 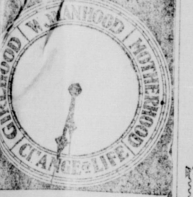
