Ninety-Eighth Anniversary of Parker's Fort Massacre Came Sat.; Cynthia Ann Parker's Recapture in Foard Recounted

Last Saturday, May 19, marked the ninety-eighth anniversary of the massacre at Parker's Fort on the Navasota River, in which Cynthia Ann Parker was taken from civilization by a band of Comanche Indians, headed by Peta Nocona. She later became the wife of the Comanche chief, Quannah.

Tragic Life

The life of Cynthia Ann Parker is one of the most tragic in pioneer history. As a child her family was massacred by the red man and then as a mother, her loved ones of Indian blood were either killed or separated from her by the vengeance of the white man.

It was in 1833 that the Parker family came to Texas from Cole County, Illinois. In 1834 they established Parker's Fort on the Navasota, near where Groesbeck now stands.

Mrs. J. H. Greening, 83, Foard County pioneer, passed away at her home in Crowell Tuesday morning at 6 o'clock after an illness of two weeks. She had been in feeble health for over ten years but had been able to be up part of the time until the last illness.

Mrs. Greening, whose maiden name was Sallie Nations, was born in Yazoo City, Miss., Nov. 27, 1850. She came to Grayson County, Texas, with her parents when she was a young girl. They afterward moved to Wise County and then to what is now Foard County in 1887.

Information Given In Regard to Rural Relief Roll Housing

Bryan O'Connell, county administrator, has received the following information from the Texas Relief Commission relative to the repair of farm dwellings and premises for occupancy by relief roll families:

- The lease, a supply of which will be furnished you in a few days, will constitute a contract between the Texas Rural Communities, Inc., a corporation acting for the Texas Relief Commission, and the landlord, and will not be a contract between the landlord and the relief roll occupant.
- No farm dwelling and premises will be leased without first receiving approval of the Community Rehabilitation Committee of the community in which same is located, followed by approval of the County Rural Advisory Committee.
- All work of repairing dwellings and premises occupied or to be occupied by relief clients shall be a part of a county work project. Each man shall be assigned first to work on his own dwelling according to existing rules for work projects.
- The rules and regulations governing hours and wages for rural areas, with which you have already been provided, will apply in repairing and remodeling farm dwellings and premises.
- General plans and specifications for repairing or remodeling farm dwellings or premises are to be approved by the Work Division of the Texas Relief Commission. The work division will also supervise and direct the repair work in the manner provided for other work projects.
- All supervision not otherwise provided for by the Texas Relief Commission and deemed necessary by the Work Division must be furnished by a local political subdivision, organization or agency.
- The sum that may be spent for materials for repairs or improvements may vary with conditions and circumstances, but, generally speaking, should not be in excess of seventy-five dollars for any one dwelling and premises, inclusive of a pit privy.
- Land to be used for producing food and feed for home consumption must be provided by the landlord and covered by the lease. The amount of land shall be in a fair ratio to the cost of repairs, but may vary considerably because of soil and climatic conditions, and the particular needs of the occupant.
- No cash shall be paid the landlord. Repairs to and upkeep of the dwelling and premises is to be in lieu of rent for the years 1934-1935.
- No relief roll family shall be placed in a leased residence without having been finally approved by the County Administrator after recommendation and approval of the case worker, the County Rural Advisory Committee and the Community Rehabilitation Committee.
- As long as any family is on relief rolls its sustenance farming operations shall be under the general direction and supervision of the Texas Relief Commission, or an agency designated by it.
- The Texas Relief Commission will reserve the right to remove the relief roll tenant for cause and replace same with another tenant selected from relief roll clients, as provided for in Section 10.

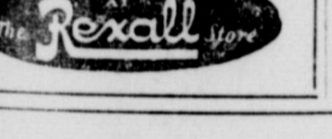

Twenty stock cars participated in the race which was held on a dry track with excellent weather conditions prevailing.

More Deaths from Appendicitis Now Than When Cooler

Austin, Texas.—This is the season of the year when more deaths are recorded for appendicitis than in cooler weather. A careful study by the State Department of Health brought out the fact that more appendicitis deaths occurred during the warm months. In twelve months about six hundred and fifty persons died of this disease, many of whom would be alive today if they had not been delayed in calling a doctor.

There are two principal causes for these deaths: the first is delay in calling a doctor, and the second is the taking of strong purges when one has pains in the abdomen. When the appendix is in a diseased condition the taking of strong laxatives often results in the rupturing of this organ. Of the deaths mentioned, 588 of them had ruptured appendix and thirty-five per cent were not operated upon.

The removal of an appendix is now a very simple matter when done early or before the appendix becomes gangrenous and ruptures, which may take place as early as 15-18 hours after the onset of the attack. In the case of abdominal pain that persists do not take a strong purge but call your physician as he will be able to tell you whether or not you have appendicitis and the method you should use in treatment.

Many persons wonder why there is so much appendicitis today when years ago it was never mentioned. The reason for this is that it has undoubtedly been with us always but was unrecognized as a specific condition. One of the common names under which it was cloaked was inflammation of the bowels.
