Twenty Years Ago in The News

The items below were taken in whole or in part from the issues of The News of Nov. 13-20-27, 1914.

Serious Explosion What came near seriously burning two persons and causing the loss of the Christian Church by fire was narrowly averted Sunday night. The carbide lights had not been working well and T. L. Haggard and Albert Schooley went out to the small building where the gas fixtures were to ascertain the cause of the low pressure. It was soon found out that there was some gas escaping, but it was not thought to be sufficient to be dangerous. Mr. Haggard was standing in the door of the small building and it being dark on the inside, he asked Mr. Schooley to light a match in order to enable Mr. Haggard to see what the matter might be. Mr. Schooley was a little bit apprehensive about lighting the match, but he being several feet from the building, he decided that it would be all right and he did; but the next instant there was an explosion that was heard all over town. Mr. Haggard was blown clear out through the door and landed several feet from the building. Both he and Mr. Schooley were severely burned about the hands, arms and face, but are getting on all right and will soon be out again. The small building and the church caught fire, but prompt work soon extinguished the flames.

The cells have all been scientifically arranged, making for ease and convenience in meal planning. The cellars will be kept as they are and visitors are welcome at all times.

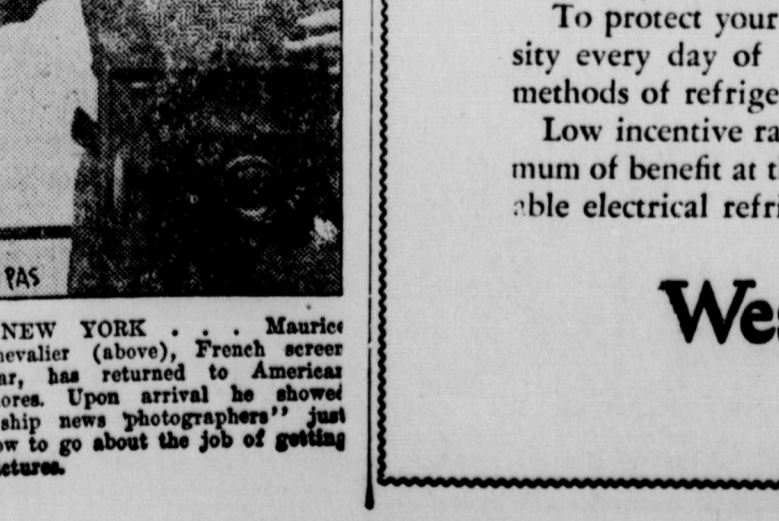

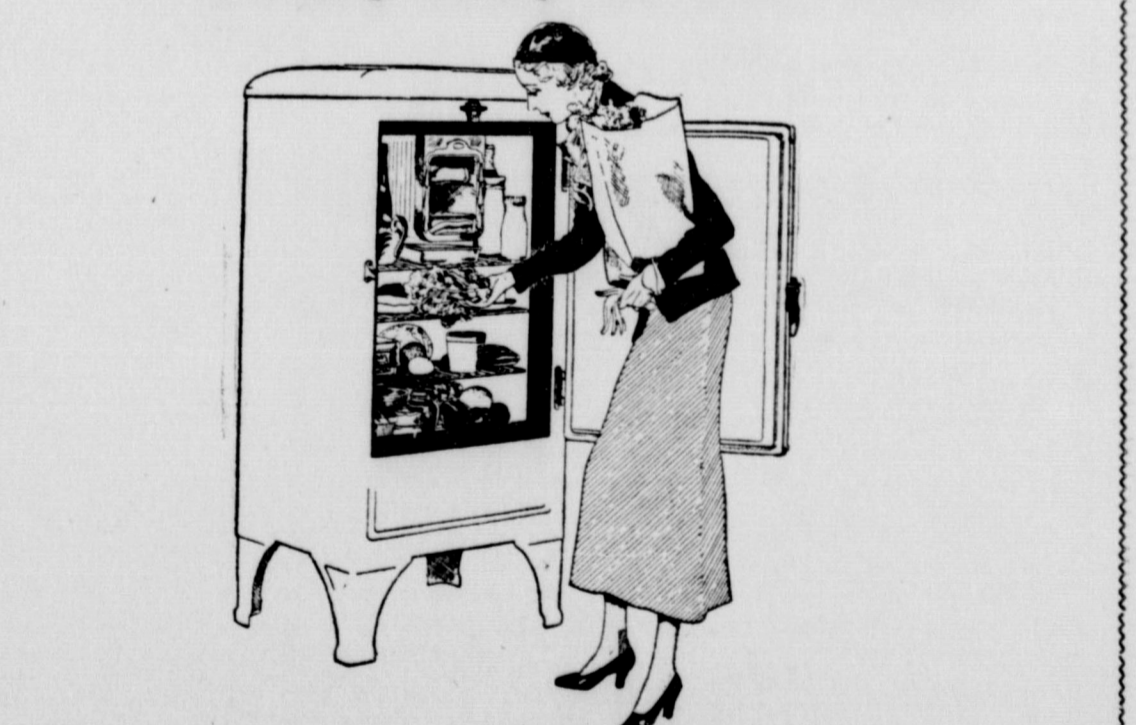
