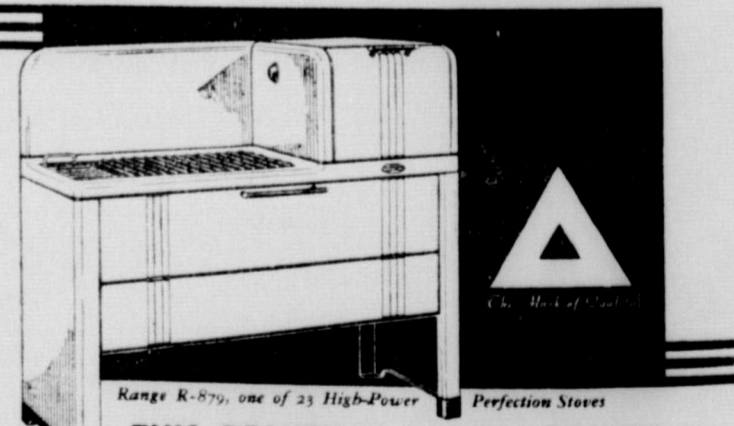

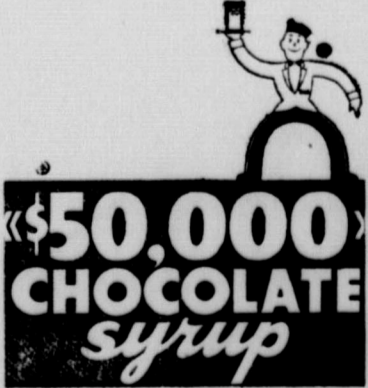

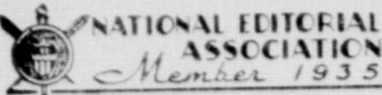

Games Next Sunday

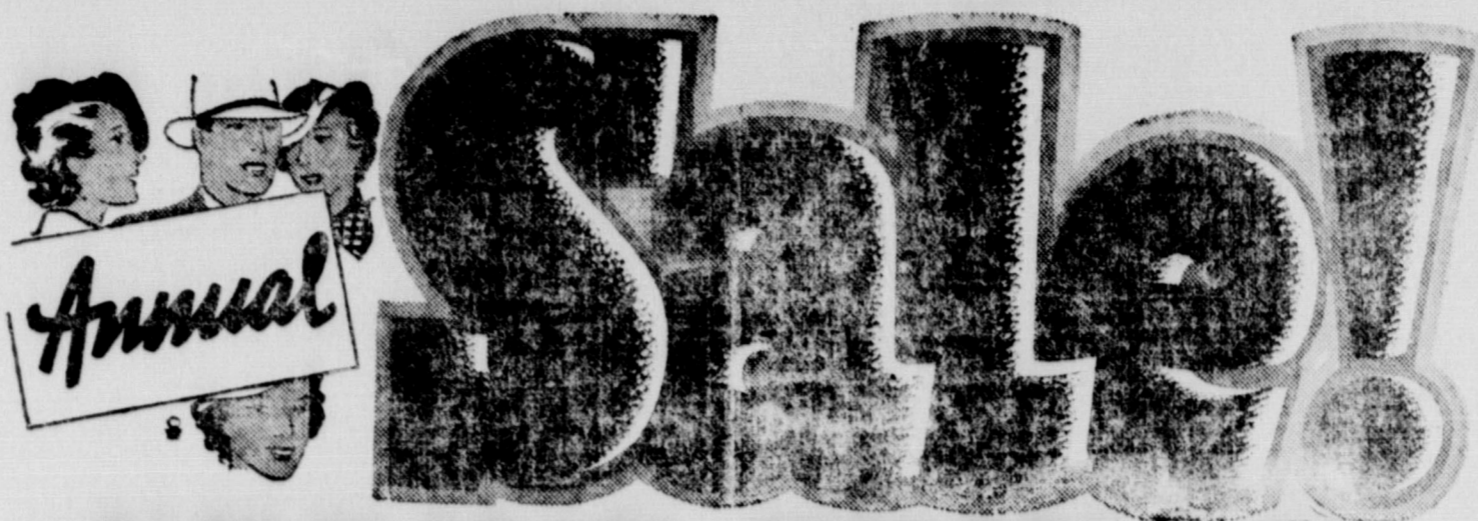
Truscott comes to Crowell Sunday for the second of a three-game series. Paducah visits Eldorado and Quannah goes to Medicine Mound for a double header.

Home Demonstration Women Build Closets At Cost of \$3.65 Each

Reports from the nine wardrobe demonstrators who recently completed their year's work show a total of \$249.07 spent on clothing, ranging from \$16.78 to \$40.85 with an average of \$27.67 for each demonstrator.

These reports also show five closets built and equipped at a total cost of \$18.24, an average of \$3.65 per closet. Three closets were remodeled at a total cost of \$3.35.

Some of the work done by these demonstrators may be seen from the following stories:

Plans Year Ahead

"My record book has taught me that it is best to know just what we have on hand and then plan for the year ahead," says Mrs. C. R. Bryson, wardrobe demonstrator for the West Side H. D. Club.

Mrs. Bryson has kept an accurate check for the year and says that she finds that it is not always the amount spent that counts for most, but having planned each item. "I like to go through my book and check on garments to find if they have lasted as they should," she says.

In storage work Mrs. Bryson has made a well-equipped closet, sufficiently light and dust proof from a space the only usable part of which were four walls and a good door. Two by fours on the walls and floor were removed, the walls papered in white and the woodwork painted ivory. Two long shelves were put in above the rod and three down the sides. It was further equipped with a rod and hangers, shoe rack, and hat racks. The ceiling was covered with sheet rock and the floor with linoleum making it practically dust proof. This was done at a total cost of \$3.15 and Mrs. Bryson feels that they have something they can be proud of for years.

Two Closets

Two new closets built in the house as a part of her wardrobe demonstration together with one already in use by the men of the family provide adequate storage space for every member of the family, according to Mrs. Dave Sallis, wardrobe demonstrator for the Gambleville Home Demonstration Club.

These two closets took the place of one small one in the girls' room which did not reach to the ceiling, had a curtain for a door and with the clothing of four people in it, was so crowded that things were hard to find and keep straight. This old closet was torn down and one built eight by two and a half feet with a partition dividing it into two closets, one opening into the room in which it was built and the other into Mrs. Sallis' bedroom.

These closets were fully equipped with shelves, rods, hangers, shoe racks and hat racks. A rod was put across the lower shelf of Mrs. Sallis' closet for the clothes of the five-year-old daughter. Now she can take care of her own clothing as she has a rod she can reach.

Closet for \$1.15

Using a part of the kitchen pantry for a clothes closet is very convenient, according to Mrs. H. H. Beggs, wardrobe demonstrator for the Vivian H. D. Club. At the beginning of her wardrobe demonstration her storage space consisted of a rod across one end of the pantry with two shelves above which were too high to be used except for storing unused articles.

With \$1.15 in money and some careful planning and work Mrs. Beggs now has a well-equipped closet in her bedroom. This closet was built from a piece of sheet rock and scrap lumber around the place except for door facings. The closet is two by four feet, extends to the ceiling and is divided into two compartments. The upper part is equipped with shelves for storing out-of-season clothing and the lower part fully equipped for storing the family clothing that is in use. It is papered both inside and out in cream paper to match the walls of the room and the shelves and other equipment painted.

Mrs. Beggs says that she does not miss the space occupied by the closet and that she is thoroughly enjoying her pantry in one place and her wardrobe in another.

Rat Poison in Paste

"After learning how simple and easy it is to keep clothing accounts I intend to always keep them in the future," says Mrs. B. J. Hopkins, wardrobe demonstrator for the Riverside Home Demonstration Club.

In speaking of her other work Mrs. Hopkins filled up cracks in the floor, moved the soiled clothing bag in order to make more room for hanging the clothing, and re-arranged the shelves. In papering the inside she used rat poison in the paste to keep the mice from cutting the new paper. So far she reports that they have not bothered it. One interesting bit of her work was to provide individual storage spaces for the two small children, with the dresser drawers and trunk divided in such a manner that they have a special place for each article, they can now store their own clothing away and learn to care for it.

spent \$92.81 for clothing, accessories, and cosmetics.

As the clothes closet had been rebuilt and equipped the year before, Mrs. Traweck made several minor improvements that greatly increased its efficiency. One of the closet shelves had served as a medicine cabinet. For this material she built a medicine cabinet at a cost of twenty cents, leaving this shelf free for clothing. Another shelf was emptied by moving the towels and milk cloths and building a storage cabinet for them in the kitchen. These shelves were then used for their hat racks and for other articles of clothing and at the same time the towels were more conveniently located. Other improvements consist of a pin cushion, bag for hose, rack for belts, and a flash light.

College Station.—That the eradication of noxious weeds and grasses including Johnson grass, Bermuda grass, nut grass, blue-weed and bindweed will be considered as a soil-conserving practice

in Texas and will qualify farmers for a soil-conserving payment acre for acre in lieu of a soil-conserving crop, has been approved by the State Agricultural Conservation Committee.

Two methods of eradication were approved. One consisted of flat-breaking the infested land, followed by intensive cultivation during the months of July, August, and September with a knife cultivator or disc harrow.

The other method that may be used is that the infested land be bedded and rebedded with a sweep or "middle-buster" at intervals of not more than 30 days, followed each time by a harrow in order to expose the roots to the weather.

Eradication can be carried out for payment only on badly infested crop land, location of which is filed with the County Committee before eradication starts.

FATHER-IN-LAW OF GOV. ALLRED HERE TUESDAY

Claud Miller of Wichita Falls, father-in-law of James V. Allred, made a speech from the court house lawn Tuesday night in behalf of the governor's campaign for re-election in the first Democratic primary election Saturday, July 25.

His speech was broadcast over the business district of Crowell by a public address system. His speech was cut short as a tube was burned out before he completed.

Old Age Pensions

In defending Allred against charges made against him with reference to the old age assistance legislation, Mr. Miller said, "A change in the governor of Texas this term would necessitate special legislation and a further delay of nearly a year before old age machinery could again be started to functioning. In comparing the Texas laws and payments with those of other states of the United States, Texas is exceeded only by two states in the amount paid those eligible for the assistance."

"The foundation and establishment of the County Parole Boards have been among the greatest achievements of Jimmie's first term as Governor of Texas," Mr. Miller said. "The system has attracted so much attention nationally that governors of several states are going to meet with him in September to make arrangements for adopting a similar system in other states. Among the many convicts in the Texas penitentiary who have been released on parole not one has had to be returned to the state prison."

Texas Centennial

"The actual appropriation asked by Allred and made by the State Legislature of \$3,000,000 for the Texas Centennial has already been more than repaid by the increase in the gasoline tax alone since the first of the year by out-of-state tourists and the Centennial has several months to go," Mr. Miller stated. "An increase of three and one-half million dollars over the same period last year was reported by the governor July 4 at a speech at Stamford."

Mr. Miller also repeated Governor James V. Allred's stand against the adoption of a state sales tax, stating that Oklahoma was so dissatisfied with her sales tax that many of the present candidates are running on a platform against it and plans are under way for its repeal in the near future."
