Chester Robinson, 32, engineer or the State Highway Department n charge of construction of th new bridge across Pease River be tween Crowell and Quanab, drowned in the river last Thursday eve ning at about 6:50 o'clock when he and two other men were swept into the water from a trolley-basket device that spanned the 275 foot section of the old bridge that was carried away by raging waters on May 18.

The other two men, Jake Roberts of Memphis, assistant engineer, and Harold Lehman of Quanah, were able to swim about 400 yards to safety on the north bank. The drowning victim could not






