## OIL OUTPUT IN TARVER NO. 1 ON INCREASE

Gauge on Pipeline Thursday Morning Showed 228 Barrels For Last 24 Hours

A ninety-barrel increase in the oil flow of the Shell Petroleum Corpora-Tarver No. 1 was registered Thursday morning when 228 barrels of pipeline oil was gauged for the last twenty-four hours compared with about an average of 138 barrels of

pipeline oil for the week. The well is now 45 feet in the pay and Thursday afternoon the bottom of the hole was standing at 2059 feet with drilling continuing. The report that the production in the test had increased to 480 barrels Tuesday was found to be incorrect, according to

reliable sources. The last four or five feet of drilling has shown an incerase in sand. A saturated chalky lime has been in evidence since encountering the oil and the increase in sand is looked upon favorably, although there is a
