Three villages for refugee families have been established on the plains by the Near East Relief, partly to aid Armenian families and orphan children under American care for the past eleven years. Other private philanthropies joined in the scheme which was originally started to demonstrate how emergency relief may be trans-

Vickery, general secretary of the organization, showed that in eleven years of operation more than one million and a half persons have been rescued from death by starvation and disease; approxi-mately half a million children have been cared for in the refuge camps mately \$100,000,000 has been contributed by America to maintain this

Approximately 32,000 children are now being cared for according to the report, which shows that about one and a half million dollars must be raised to provide for the remaining orphan children, most of whom are under thirteen years of age, to bring the work of financial solicitation to a close this summer.

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


