

'Chief' Runkles at Sunrise

The Kwahadi Dancers of Amarillo will assist "Chief" Frank Runkles this Saturday morning in the annual Taba'na Yuan'e ceremony at South Lake in Post, just off U.S. Hwy 84 East.

The ceremony, which is a careful observance of an ancient Plains Indian spring ritual, begins with the lighting of the fire and constructing of the circle of council and concludes at sunrise.

Visitors will want to be at the scene by 6:15 a.m. to capture the full ceremony.

The Kwahadi Indian Dancers, members of Explorer Post 80 in Amarillo, will set up teepees and assist "Chief" Runkles in preparing and conducting the ceremony.

Sponsored by the Post Chamber of Commerce, the annual event will again this year feature a \$3 per person breakfast, catered by Jackson's Cafeteria, following the ceremony.

The Taba'na Yuan'e tradition, which dates to earliest memories of the Plains Indians, began here in 1906 when early pioneers in Garza County recalled the legend as told by the Indians.

The ceremony is held each year on March 22, as visitors and Garza County residents gather around a circular ceremonial ring to watch a dancer, clad in traditional beaded buckskins and feathered head-dress, perform an Indian version of an extended weather forecast.

Taba'na Yuan'e translates to "The Sunrise Wind."

The Plains Indians used the dance to check the wind direction at the exact moment of sunrise, which would determine their success in the coming year.

According to the legend, the wind must be checked at sunrise on the day after the sun reaches the halfway point in its journey from south to north.

Garza County farmers and ranchers have relied on the Taba'na Yuan'e for more than 80 years to provide a hint as to their success in the coming year.

"Chief" Runkles has been faithfully keeping the ceremony true to its original form since 1973. He is a long-time student of Indian lore.

Noah Stone preserved the custom for 40 years before "Chief" Runkles continued the tradition.

He starts the Taba'na Yuan'e with the building of a small fire, using only natural materials.

The fire is lighted by the

Citizen Input Urged by Agents

Garza County leaders, as well as other throughout Texas, are concerned about rapid changes occurring in the state economy and population--changes that are placing challenging demands on resources of all state residents and their communities.

"These changes point to the need for identifying the most critical issues facing Texans today, and determining new directions the Texas Agricultural Extension Service should take as the state moves toward the 1990's", explains Garza County Extension Agents Colleen England and Syd Conner.

Sales Tax Rebate Up

Another significant increase in the city sales and use tax allocation to Post was reported last week by State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

The payment of \$11,477.16 for the period ending February 28 was an increase from last year at the same time of \$8,928.76.

The 22 percent one-month increase brings the total for the year to \$48,652.43, a 35.97 percent jump from last

year. The payment to date this same time last year was \$35,782.13.

Slaton showed a slight decrease this month at \$11,325.54, down from last year's \$11,685.84 and showing a 3.43 percent increase for the year at \$51,146.11.

Tahoka was also down slightly at \$3,953.06 from last year's \$4,708.92 for an annual decrease of 4.52 percent at \$16,539.07.

This spring, a process for mapping a new plan of action for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will be launched.

Several Garza County leaders will be among more than 10,000 Texans, representing all 254 counties, who will conduct an Extension-sponsored study to identify key local issues.

Local citizen input is crucial if Extension is to fully address educational needs that reflect the major concerns of all Texans.

The kickoff meeting for the Garza County study group has been planned for Thursday, March 25, 7:00

p.m., at the Post Community Center by the Central Planning Group of the local Extension Program Building Committee.

At the local meeting, leaders will form task forces for identifying the most critical issues in the broad fields of agriculture and natural resources, home economics, youth and community development.

A second meeting is planned in about eight weeks, when the county

study group will present its findings and finalize priority concerns.

As county groups complete their studies, issues identified across the state will form the foundation for a major new statewide Extension educational planning effort for the remainder of the decade.

Task force members are serving a vital role in assisting with planning future educational programs in the county.

The citizens of Post are now at the mercy of the elements...because the current single siren at the courthouse is inadequate to provide warning to most of our residents.

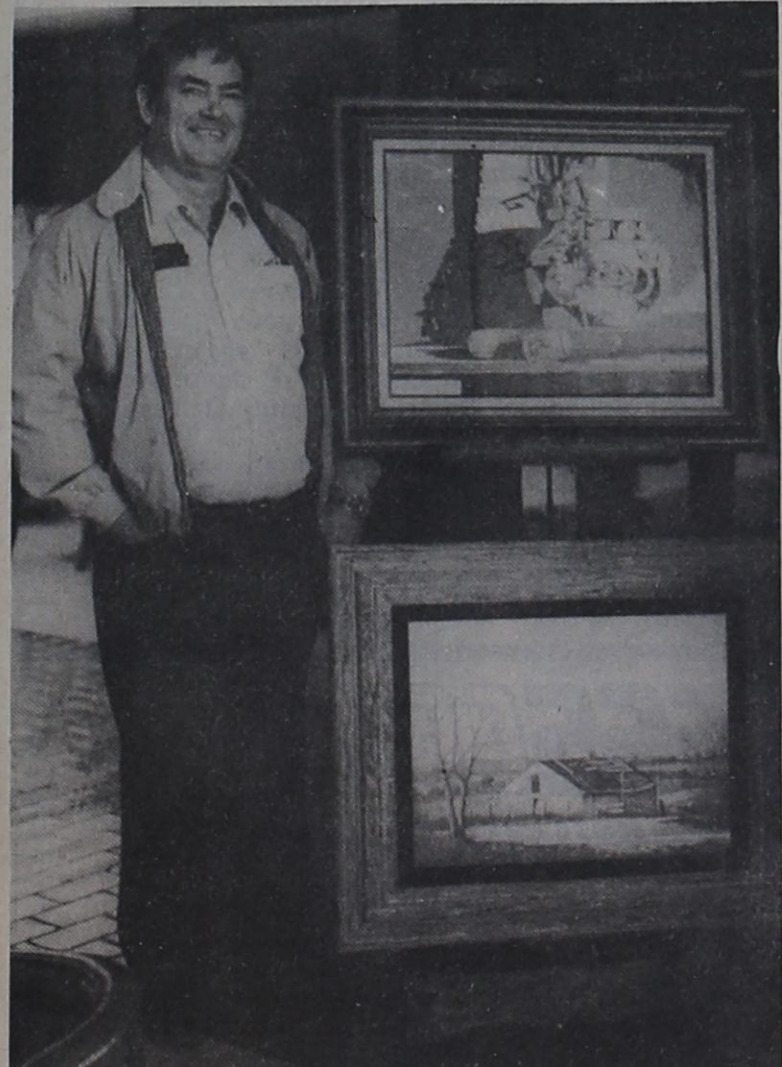
In the midst of a storm, when tornadoes are most likely to strike, the lone siren at the courthouse has a very limited range.

To argue for complete coverage of the city with an adequate civil defense siren system seems to me to be a waste of time.

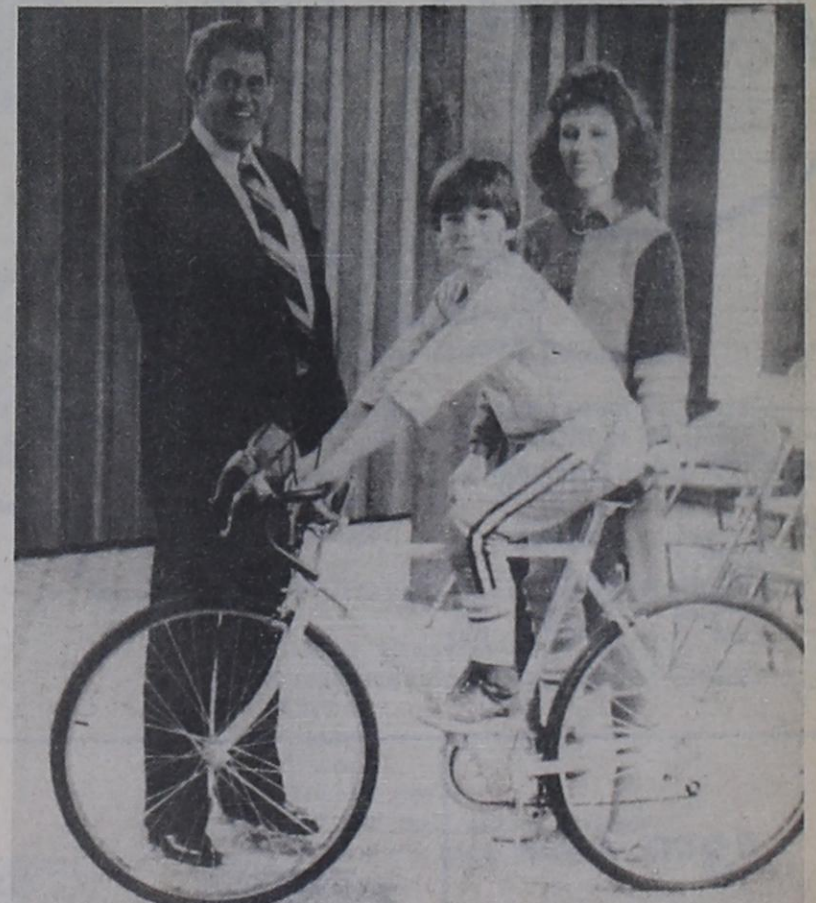
Anyone who doesn't see the need for this important warning system just isn't in tune with reality.

friction of rubbing two sticks together.

Following the singing of a tribal prayer of thanks for the fire, the "Chief" performs a Four Winds dance where a pipe of peace is presented to the four directions...then to Mother Earth and to Wakantanka, the Great Spirit above, to seek their blessings.

A wad of grass is placed on the coals and as the smoke indicates the wind direction at the very moment of sunrise, the Smoke Dance is ended by kneeling and pointing a feather in the direction from which the wind comes.

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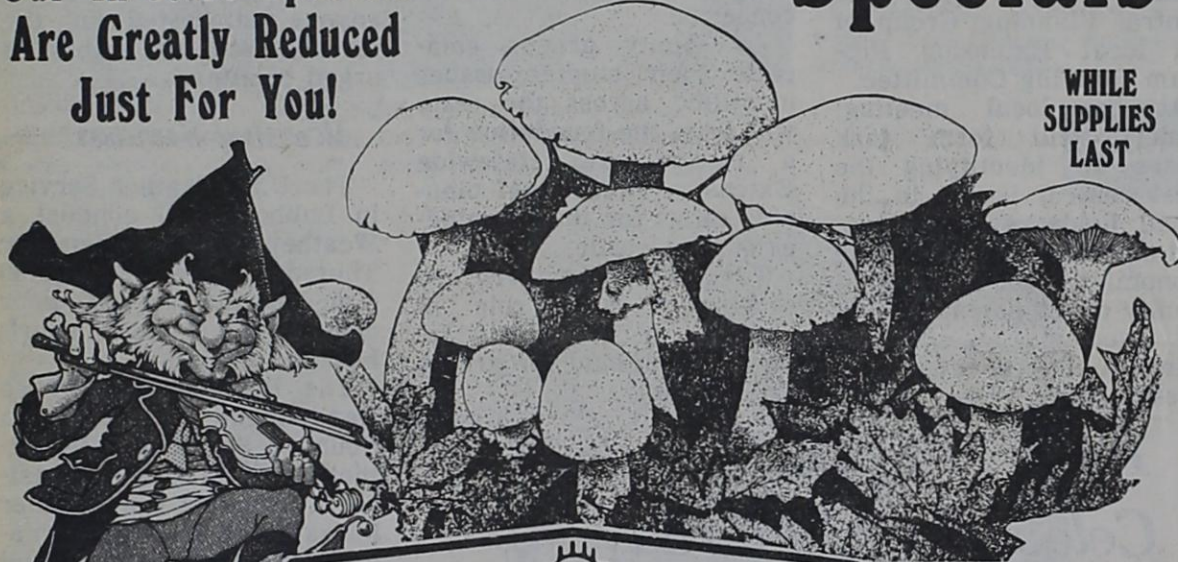

Garza County Drilling Report

Showing ability to pump 63 barrels of 38-gravity oil daily on an open choke, the No. 1 Parks "21" has been brought on line in the Red Loflin Field, Garza County, 15 miles southeast of Post.

Indian Wells Oil is the operator. Indian Wells took the hole to an 8,219-ft bottom and perforated for Ellenburger Formation pay at 8,207 to 8,219 feet into the wellbore.

Location is in a 643-acre lease in the T&NO Survey. In addition to oil, the well made 140 barrels of waste water.

Pumping 40 barrels of oil per day from Glorieta perforations, the No. 1 Post-Montgomery has been finished in the H&L (Glorieta) Field about 11 miles northeast of Post. Co-Co Oil Inc is the operator.

The well was drilled to total depth of 3,550 feet. The production interval was perforated at 3,350 to 3,500 feet into the hole.

The well made 170 barrels of salt water in addition to 38-gravity crude.

Location is in a 40-acre drilling unit in Garza County's K. Aycocock Survey.

Conoco will be seeking production at a depth of about 3,400 feet. The well originally had been designated as the No 3 Ted Shults "A".

A re-entry venture has paid off for Maynard Oil at the 201-U Slaughter "H" in Garza County's Happy Field 13 miles southwest of Post.

Originally completed as a dual zone producer in 1958, the well was re-entered in a bid for Ellenburger production.

It showed ability to pump 25 barrels of oil with 150 barrels of salt water per day when re-completed.

The production interval is at 8,259 to 8,301 feet into the wellbore. The well earlier had also produced from the Strawn Formation.

An undrilled Garza County wildcat location has been abandoned by Exxon Corp. about 15 miles southwest of Post.

Carrying permit for 8,650 feet of hole, the explorer well had been

designated as the No 1 John F. Lott.

Exxon earlier had revealed dry hole status for the No 1 Lott "B", 17 miles southwest of Post in the same part of the county.

Breck Operating Inc has abandoned a Garza County wildcat workover operation five miles east of Post.

The well in question was the No 2 Kirkpatrick "69". It was originally completed as an Ellenburger producer in September of 1984.

Operating out of Dallas, Majestic Enterprises, Inc has staked location for a pair of 2,700-ft developmental wells in the Dorward Field, Garza County, about three miles east and northeast of Justiceburg.

The wells will be known as the No 4 and No 5 W.L. Cantrell. They are situated in a 100-acre lease in the H&GN Survey A-90.

Completed 10 years ago in Garza County's Huntley Field, the No 13 South Huntley Unit will be tested for shallower pay in a re-entry operation by Conoco Inc of Midland.

Location is five miles northwest of Post.

The well had been completed as a pumping oiler with the production zone in the Glorieta Formation at 3,938 to 4,036 feet into the hole.

Carpenter asked county officials to support their local citizen team in its effort to analyze county conditions and set directions

to take as the state moves toward the 1990's.

"It's important that this planning process occur," said Carpenter.

"Rapid changes in the state's economy and population-changes that place challenging demands on the resources of Texas residents

and their communities-point to the need to identify the most critical issues facing Texans."

Carpenter said county results and a statewide summary of the citizen study will be announced later this year, and will be made available to other

organizations and agencies.

Garza County citizens are invited to attend the first Garza County Meeting on Tuesday, March 25 at the Community Center, 7 p.m., for a pot luck supper to be followed by a meeting to determine critical issues facing county residents.

New Crisis Hot Line

A completely new service—a Crisis Hot-Line—is scheduled to begin service for a 23-county area surrounding Big Spring, it was announced this week by A.K. Smith, Superintendent, and Jack Stovall, Director of Community Programs for Big Spring State Hospital.

On-line date for the new service, mandated by Senate Bill 633, is March 1.

"This newly established Crisis Hot-Line will be operative 24 hours a day, seven days a week," Mr Smith said.

"It is being established to provide constant crisis coverage to the 23 counties in West Texas that make up Regions 37 and 38 the region for which Big Spring State Hospital is the mental health authority."

In explaining the operation of the new service, the two hospital officials pointed out that any call to the new line will light up an emergency light on the switch board at the hospital and the operator will promptly transfer the call to a mental health professional.

"All that any caller from the counties covered has to do is contact the telephone operator in his area and ask for "Enterprise 8-4357," Smith explained.

"When the call comes in to the hospital it will be handled promptly. During the day service hours—8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.—the call will go immediately to the Outpatient Clinic, where it will be handled by one of the 14 professionals of community services. At other times the request will be referred to a professional on call for that purpose."

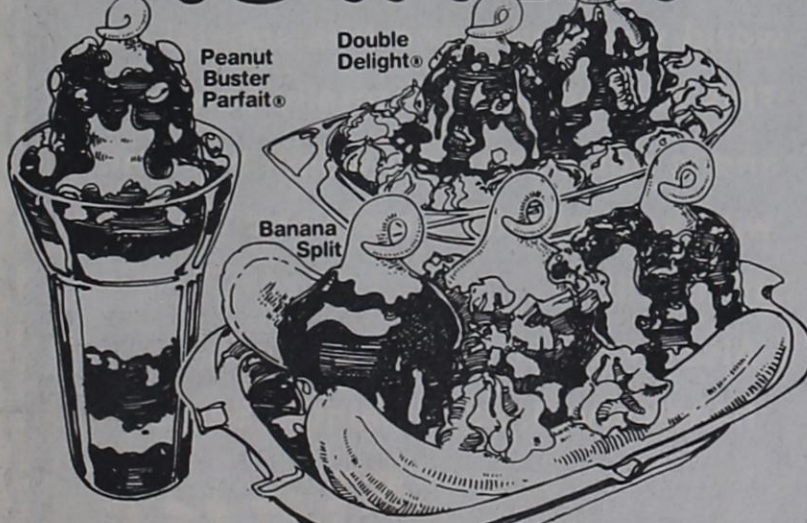
