## Emergency Forces Closing

Last Friday afternoon Mayor Giles McCrary ordered the closing of the back portion of the Algerita center, declaring the structure a potential hazard to the public safety.

## Post City Council Holds Public Hearing on Proposed Planning and Zoning Ordinances

Only one citizen voiced concern about the proposed planning and zoning ordinances during the second public hearing held Monday night at City Hall.

John Redman, who owns mobile home lots, requested clarification on the future of his ability to rent the lots.

"If one of my tenants move, will this ordinance keep me from renting to someone else?" Redman asked.

City attorney Harvey Morton explained that as long as Redman continues his rental as a business, the "grandfather" clause should allow his continued renting.

"The intent of the ordinance is not to cause problems, but to foster development of mobile home parks," Mayor Giles McCrary explained.

The mayor added that at some time in the future development of mobile home parks in the designated areas would ease the shortage of lots available for mobile homes.

The ordinance is designed to provide stability for property values and to

allow for orderly growth in the city, planning and zoning commission chairman Robert Cox added.

Marie Neff requested the city to consider declaring the downtown Main Street as a historic area, which

## Higher Premium For Liability Insurance Hits Hospital Board

The Garza Memorial Hospital Board of Directors met in regular session last Thursday, June 12, with the buying of a high premium liability insurance policy facing them.

"We had paid a \$6,000 premium in September, 1985 for a three year policy that covered from April, 1985 until April 1988," said hospital administrator Maritta Reed. "In April 1986 the insurance carrier filed bankruptcy, leaving us without coverage."

Reed continued, "We can get coverage with another carrier for one year, one

million limit for \$6,000." Even though the cost has tripled, the Directors decided that they could not do without it so they agreed to purchase the insurance.

A decision to install needed equipment to the sprinkler system in the storage room to satisfy deficiencies on a Life Safety Code Inspection was passed with the cost not to exceed \$400.

The directors agreed to buy a defibrillator with pedi-paddles for the emergency room for a cost of \$8,544.

This unit is capable for external pacing and is compatible with the monitoring equipment and with the ambulance equipment.

It was also agreed to acquire the help of third year Texas Tech medical students to help with coverage in the Emergency Room.

The help is needed when the other doctors are out of town.

A slide presentation was shown to the directors that showed the advantages of the Garza Memorial Hospital to Post and the area.

Present with Alexander and Reed were directors David Tyler, Zoe Kirkpatrick, Norma Baumann and David Nichols.

It will then travel to El Paso, Texas where it will begin its "Run Through Texas History."

The goal of the run is to involve as many Texans

as possible from all walks of life, ethnic backgrounds, and economic status in this exciting and emotional run.

Once the torch gets to Post, it will travel a four mile route in the city and meet at the courthouse where a short presentation is scheduled.

The "Run Through Texas History" is sponsored in Post by the Post Chamber of Commerce with the help of the Sesquicentennial Committee.

## Post Sales Tax Rebate Slips 20.4 Percent

The state sales tax rebate check for Post slipped 20.4 percent from last year as the city received \$8,065.65 recently.

The check represents the period ending May 30, 1986.

Last year at the same time the city received a rebate of \$10,133.04.

The drop is considered to be a reflection of the

decline in oil field related taxable services.

The year-to-date payment to Post is still an increase from last year of 12.82 percent at \$89,962.67, compared to \$79,737 in 1985.

Other area cities also showing decreases included Tahoka at \$3,122.59, down from \$3,492.53 with a year-to-date decrease of 8.21 percent.

Slaton's rebate was down slightly at \$11,125.47, compared to \$11,365.44 last year. Slaton's year-to-date collection is up 4.13 percent at \$97,011.52.

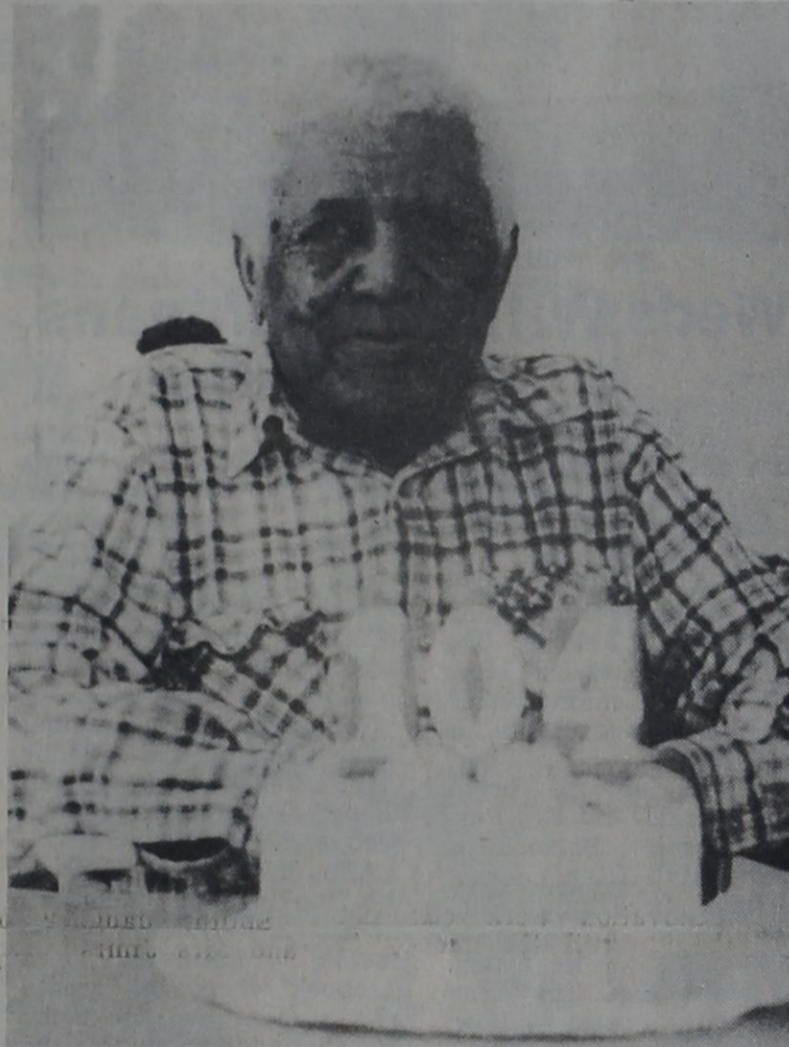

### What Consumers Should Know About Saving Money On Food

Save money as you shop for food by using these tips:

Compare egg prices. If there's less than a 7-cent price difference between one size and the next smaller size in the same grade, you will get more for your money by buying the larger size.

A half gallon of milk usually costs less than two quarts. The larger size is only a bargain if you use it before its expiration date.

Choose meat by the cost per serving than cost per pound. Money paid for bone, skin and fat is wasted.

Buy a whole chicken and cut it yourself rather than

buying chicken parts. Refrigerated, cured hams are usually less expensive than canned hams.

### Calorie Content Information Can Mislead

If you are persuaded to buy one product over another because of the calorie content listed on the nutrition label, you may be misled unless you read the fine print.

A food label typically lists calories per serving. A product may appear to be low-calorie, until you check the serving size.

The serving size listed could be much less than you would normally eat, so the calorie count would actually be higher.

For example, a gourmet rice product may list 120 calories per 3.6 ounce serving, which is about one half cup. But if you eat ¾ to one cup in a serving you will be getting twice the calories listed.

Also note that calorie information per serving is often stated for the food as packaged.

If you must add butter or other ingredients to the packaged food, that too, will add calories.



## Stress Management

(Presented by  
Sharla Wells  
Garza County Mental  
Health Center)

When we approach any problem, physical or emotional, we should automatically ask several questions.

First, ask: "Is this problem due to me or is it due to factors outside of me?"

Secondly: "Do I have any control over this?"

The answers to these questions will determine, in large part, how effectively we will manage the problem and the degree of stress we will feel.

Most of us have grown up with a view of emotional problems that leaves us open to emotional stress.

We believe that our emotional problems are caused by other people and things outside of us over which we have no control.

This is called the victim view.

A more effective attitude is the understanding that my emotions are the result of processes inside me over which I do have some degree of control.

This is the self-management view.

The victim view is an

irresponsible view because it assumes that we have no responsibility for what we experience and that no choice is possible.

This view of emotional stress is illustrated as follows:

1. Other people make me feel bad (he, she, you, they);
2. Things make me upset (it, that, events, etc.).

The consequences of believing the victim view are serious.

Our brains are programmed with automatic emotional reactions of fight or flight whenever we experience victimhood, chronic resentment, and emotional stress.

On the one hand, we want to run away, sulk, avoid others, get divorced or separated, go away, or at the extreme, commit suicide.

On the other hand, we fight back, get revenge, hurt others, become aggressive, or at the extreme, commit murder.

Other common ways of dealing with the emotional stress of victimhood are to abuse alcohol or drugs.

One of the tragic aspects of the victim view is that it appears to be true because believing makes it so.

If I believe that "it" makes me mad, then sure enough, "it" will make me mad and I won't experience any choice.

"It" doesn't have to make me feel anything; I can upset myself about "it" and I have some choice about how I feel and for how long.

This last statement embodies the self-management view that my emotional stress is determined more by what goes on inside of me than outside of me, and therefore, I have some management possibilities.

I can choose to continue to upset myself, especially if that is working to help me get what I want.

Another possibility is the choice to diminish emotional stress by reducing hysterical misery down to simple unhappiness.

A final choice is simply to stop upsetting myself.

This is easy to say and hard to do, but it is a skill that can definitely be learned, practiced, and improved.

The essence of the self-management view was stated several thousand years ago by Epictetus, a Greek slave who became a philosopher: "It is not the things that happen that upset us; it our view of them."

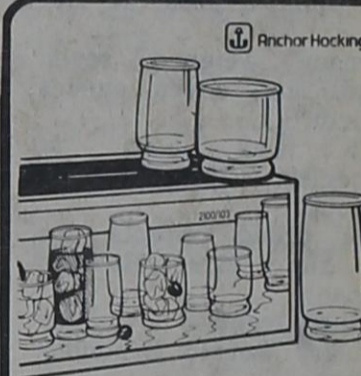

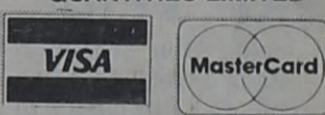

## Oil Drilling Report

At a location three miles northeast of Justiceburg, Western Reserves Oil Co. has finaled a new oil producer in Garza County's Tufbow Field.

Location is in a 178-acre lease in the T&NO Survey.

Bottomed at 7,710 feet, the well will produce from perforations in the Strawn Formation, 7,621 to 7,623 feet into the hole.

Plug-and-abandon orders have been issued for the No. 1 Davis "28", a wildcat venture of Hunt Oil in Garza County.

Spudded Mar. 17, 1986, the well had reached 8,400 feet total depth.

Drillsite was 14 miles south of Post.

PHP Petroleum has suspended operations at the No. 2 Robinson Unit in the PHD Field, Garza County.

Location was seven miles northwest of Post.

Drilling is nearing the 3,500-ft. mark at the No. 1 Lott, a

developmental well in Garza County's Happy Field, 12 miles southwest of Post.

Spudded on May 23, the well carries permit for 8,600-ft. maximum hole in a quest for Ellenburger Formation pay.

Magna Oil Inc. is the operator.

A Garza County wildcat has been bottomed at total depth of 8,464 feet in a lease five miles southeast of Post.

It is Kirby Exploration's No. 304 Kirkpatrick, carrying permit for maximum hole of 8,600 feet. Location is in a 320-acre lease in the GH&H Survey.

No details on production prospects have been released.
