Anyone out there think this is a good idea? If so, let's round up some support and get the money together to find the right person.



Conservation Reserve Program Sing-up at ASCS August 4-15

The next signup for the 1987 Conservation Reserve Program will take place August 4-15 at Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service county offices.

Farmers may offer bids to place highly erodible cropland into the reserve for the third time this year.

Annual payments for 10 years will compensate farmers for retiring highly erodible land from crop production. The amount of the payment is determined by the accepted bid per acre and the number of accepted acres.

Participants will also receive cost-share assistance for establishing grass, trees, or wildlife plants on the acreage placed in the reserve. Hunting is allowed on the land but no crops can be harvested while it is in the reserve.

Dwaine Binford, district

conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service at Post, said land that is eroding at more than three times the tolerance level is eligible to be placed in the reserve if it was farmed two or more years between 1981 and

During the first two signups, bids were tentatively accepted from more than 1,200 Texas farmers on 310,000. Bids accepted ranged from \$25 to \$50 per.



Colleen's Comments

In spite of the heat wave outside, shoppers will be flocking into air-conditioned stores soon to buy back-toschool wardrobes.

Clothing industry figures show that the number of small children who are outfitted for school is growing at a fast pace.

This is probably due to the increasing numbers of working mothers who enroll their children in nursery schools and more money available for clothing in smaller families with two incomes.

While many shoppers are interested in cutting clothing costs, they also want quality, and are willing to pay for it.

A few simple steps to insure you get the most for your clothing dollar include:

- Before you begin to shop, know what you already have that is wearable. Consider fit, needed repairs and appropriateness of the clothes you have

- Figure out what you need in terms of types of clothing, colors, and fabrics. Cut fabric swatches so you can match items you already own.

- Get organized for shopping. Set a budget, and shop with a list.

- Remember that separates are a relatively inexpensive way to extend a wardrobe, since items can be mixed and matched.

- It doesn't cost anything to try on "trendy" clothes, but be careful when you buy them. Make sure the clothing is suitable for you, and that the trend is new, rather than on the way out.

- Try on every item of clothing you plan to buy. This is important both for children and adults. Sizes are often little more than a guideline since they vary too much from manufacturer to be entirely reli-


