Big Weekend in Store for Post with Stampede Rodeo

Parade Begins at 5:30

"The entries are coming in real well and everything seems to be ready for one of the best rodeos this area has seen," said Tommy Young, president of the Post Stampede, at their regular meeting Monday, August 4.

The books for the events opened at 8 a.m. Monday morning and will continue until noon Wednesday.

Marv Pierce, of Clovis, N.M., will be here as announcer and Hoss Fly Atchinson, of Midland, was confirmed as specialty clown for the rodeo.

At the meeting the officials and directors were told of the arena being ready by rodeo time and a discussion about parking.

The regular events of bareback bronc, calf roping, saddle bronc, barrel racing, team roping and bull riding will be joined by an exciting steer wrestling event.

Another new event which should be a big crowd pleaser will be the wild cow milking contest.

Teams for this event have already been confirmed and five teams will compete Thursday night

and three Friday night with the four top times being in the finals Saturday night with the winner taking the whole prize.

Thursday night the teams are Williams Ranch Company, Earl Chapman Ranch, U Lazy S Ranch, Macy Ranch and Jack Myers competing against each other.

Friday night the Cross H Ranch, Jack Kirkpatrick will compete against T Y Ranch, Mark Kirkpatrick and the Richard Hart group.

The juniors will also have an opportunity to participate in this year's rodeo.

All children under 12 years of age are encouraged to pay their \$4 entry fee and compete for a trophy that will be given every night of the rodeo.

A BBQ will be served Thursday immediately following the rodeo parade and Saturday at 6 p.m. at the arena.

A combination rodeo ticket and BBQ plate is \$6 for adults and \$4 for children under 12.

The BBQ plates by themselves is \$3.

Rodeo tickets, separate from the BBQ, are \$4 for

adults and \$1 for children under 12.

The parade through downtown will begin at 5:30 p.m. Thursday, August 7.

The parade will be led by the Parade Marshall Jack Meeks and followed by floats and horse groups from the area.

The rodeo parade is sponsored by the Post

Chamber of Commerce.

Terry Walls, of Stephenville, Texas, will be the stock producer for the rodeo.

Everyone is invited to attend the "Best Rodeo in West Texas" this Thursday, Friday and Saturday evening at the Rodeo Arena on the north side of Post on the Lubbock Hwy.

An active FFA member for four years, David won a first place county swine showmanship award and received district and area awards in extemporaneous and public speaking.

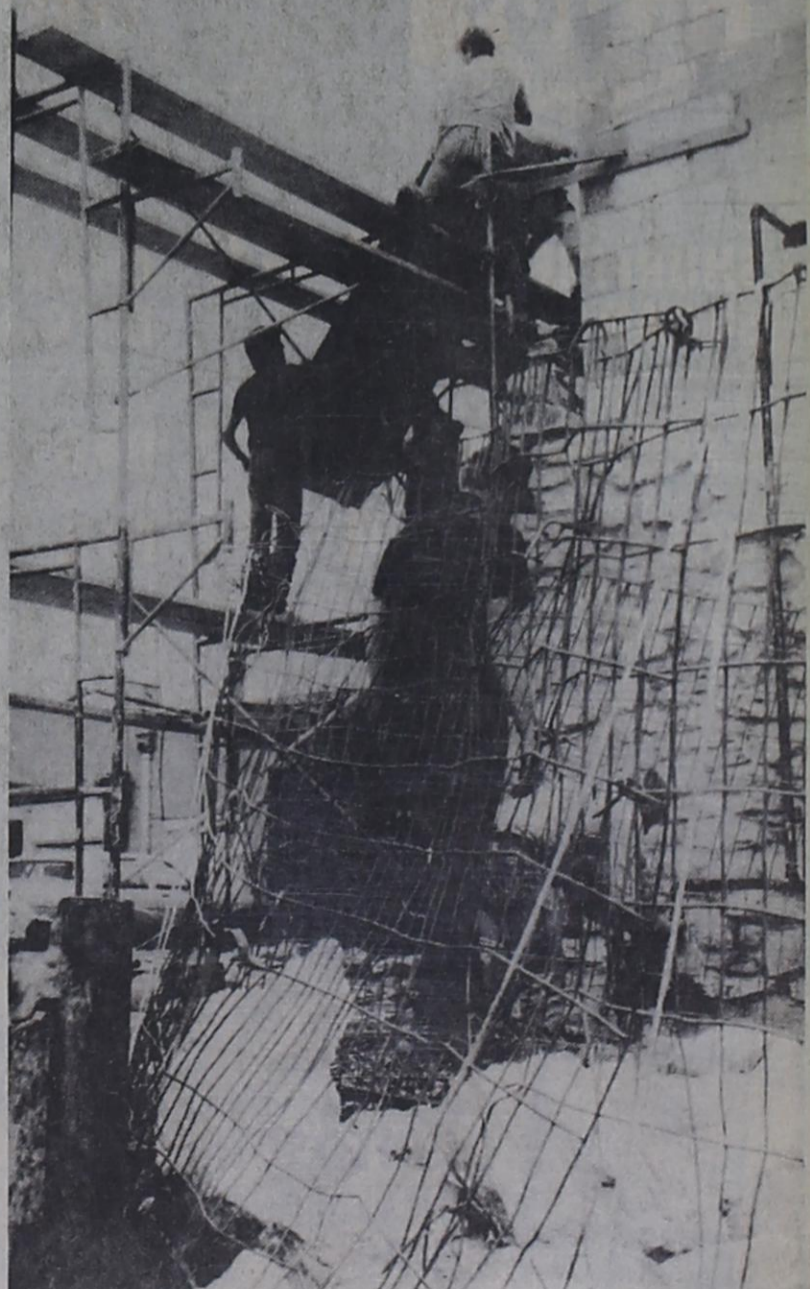

Oil Drilling Report

Two producers have been brought on line in Garza County's Dorward Field, with Exxon Corp, as the operator.

Located four miles southeast of Justiceburg, the wells are in a 240-acre lease in the H&GN Survey. They are designated as the Nos. 3 and 4 Exxon Fee "R". The No. 3 well indicated potential to pump 90 barrels of oil per day, plus 174 barrels of water. Total drilling depth was 2,624 feet, and the well was plugged back to 2,571 feet.

The No. 4 well potentialized at 72 barrels of oil per day, along with 132 barrels of water. It was taken to a 2,580-ft bottom.

The wells produce from perforations commingled in the San Andres and San Angelo Formations, ranging from 1,817 to 2,500 feet into the wellbore.

Hrubetz Oil has revealed production figures on a re-entry operation in Garza County's Rocker A Field. Drillsite is six miles northwest of Justiceburg.

The well is designated as the No. 715 RSA San Andres Unit, showing potential to pump nine barrels of oil per day, plus 163 barrels of water. Bottomhole was at 3,245 feet, and the well was plugged back to 2,750 feet. Production is from perforations in the San Andres Formation, 2,464 to 2,496 feet into the wellbore.

The well's original operator was R.S. Anderson. It was completed Jan. 17, 1969, and was known as the No. 12 Spalding-Stoker. It produced from an interval in the Clear Fork Formation, 3,019 to 3,245 feet into the hole.

DPS Reports

The same operator has abandoned five undrilled location in the Dorward Field, Garza County. They were designated as the No. 47 Exxon Fee "G", the Nos. 133 & 134 M.A. Fuller, and the Nos. 1 & 2 A.D. Justice. The No. 47 well was to have been drilled three miles east of Justiceburg; the Fuller wells were to have been located seven to nine miles southeast of Justiceburg; and the Justice wells were to have been drilled 15 miles southeast of Post.

Latest Accidents

Get The Most From Back-To-School Clothing Dollars

For many Texas families the economic downturn means beginning a new school year with less money to outfit the kids.

But a number of alternatives are there for stretching the family's back-to-school clothes budget.

Start by going through the childrens' clothes to see what is worn out, what is outgrown and what can be "restyled".

A clothing exchange with relatives, friends, and neighbors can help everyone get more wear out of outgrown, but not outworn, childrens' clothing.

Garage sales and re-sale shops are also a source of inexpensive clothing in good condition.

If you have the time and sewing skills, try altering some dresses, jumpers, and other items.

Look for deep hems in skirts, pants and sleeves that can be lengthened.

Decorative stitching, trim, or a fabric insert will hide marks from the old hem.

Tucks in bodices, skirts, pant legs and sleeves may also be released to add length.

When you shop for school clothing, look for durable clothing that can "grow" with the child throughout the school year.

Discount and outlet stores carry less-expensive clothing, but it may also be less durable.

Before buying, inspect clothes for wide seams that won't ravel or pull out, and on knits, narrow seams that are stitched and overcast.

Double stitched seams or

tape inserted in seams that receive the most stress, such as pants crotch or armhole seams, is another sign of durability.

If the style, fabric, fit and price are right, you can always add needed reinforcements on your home sewing machine to make less durable clothing last longer.

When you shop for new clothing, keep in mind the specific features that will allow for the child's growth.

Some of these features include deep hems, adjustable straps and waistbands, raglan sleeves, and stretchy fabrics.

Two piece clothes usually provide more room for growth than one piece items, and dresses without a definite waistline can be worn longer than those with fitted waists.

In general, you'll do best to spend the most money on those clothes that are worn most often, receive the hardest wear and are laundered frequently.

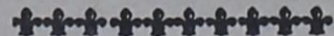

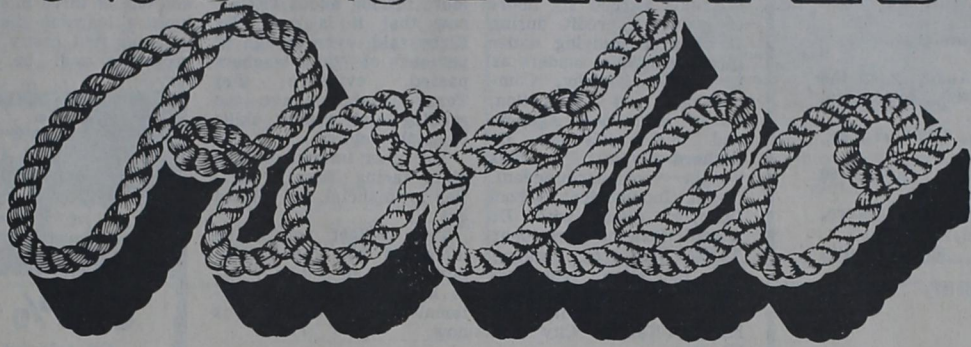

Rankin Joins Elite Group at TCU

Dan Rankin, principal of Post Elementary School, was one of 40 hand-picked Texas school administrators to complete Texas Christian University's first Academy for Educational Leadership in June.

Rankin earned six hours of graduate credit during 10 days of studying under such educational leaders as Dr. William Kirby, Commissioner of Education, Texas Education Agency, and his assistant, Dr. Richard Swain; Dr. Linus Wright, superintendent, Dallas Independent School District; along with Dr. Jared Hazleton, president, Texas Research League, and education professors from TCU and universities of Alabama, Wisconsin, Missouri-Kansas City and Houston.

Members of the academy, all highly rated practicing administrators preparing for superintendent-level positions, heard Dr. Kirby identify the basic problem in Texas education today as teacher morale, mainly because of the unpopular TECAT test. "TECAT was the political

price teachers had to pay for salary increases," the state's top educational administrator declared. The teachers should have banded together to get the law changed in 1985, he added.

There has been even more fussing about TECAT now that it is over, Dr. Kirby said, even though 98 percent of the teachers passed, evidence that Texas teachers have the reading and writing skills to do the job.

The other immediate problem facing Texas education is financial, he pointed out.

The budget must be increased by \$556 million during the next two years to keep the state's educational system where it is now.

Cheerleaders Return from SWSU Camp

Laura Crenshaw, Kerry Hart, Tina Pena, Alicia Pettyjohn, Keitha White and LaDonna Scott recently attended the University Cheerleaders' Association camp at Southwest Texas University at San Marcos.

The Post High School cheerleaders were at San Marcos July 29 through August 1.

Third CRP Sign Up

Starting August 4, Garza County farmers may volunteer highly erodible cropland for entry into the 1987 Conservation Reserve Program.

The third sign-up period for the new USDA program will end August 15, according to Victor Ashley, executive director of the agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service.

The Conservation Reserve Program encourages farmers to stop growing crops on highly erodible cropland and plant it to grass through 10 year contracts with USDA.

"Farmers will have an opportunity during this next sign-up period to bid on a program contract for the 1987 crop year," Ashley said.

Successful bidders will be allowed to harvest their 1986 crop before the contract becomes effective, if necessary, he said.

Land designated may be grazed after October 1, 1986.

For retiring highly erodible cropland from production, farmers will receive conservation payments of up to 50 percent of the eligible cost of establishing grass on the acres placed in the program.

They also will receive rental payments of up to \$50,000 per year, based on the bid per acres times the number of acres under the contract.

Ashley said rental payments will be made in cash or commodity certificates annually, as soon as possible after October 1, 1987, to producers with approved contracts.

Cost-sharing payment will be made as soon as possible after participants report the approved conservation practice is completed.

The ASCS Official said farmers may be more interested in the Conservation Reserve Program now that they know about the sodbuster and conservation compliance rules of the Food Security Act.

Those who fail to meet the rules may not be eligible for certain USDA program benefits.

We offer our appreciation and special thanks to them for their contributions to our community.



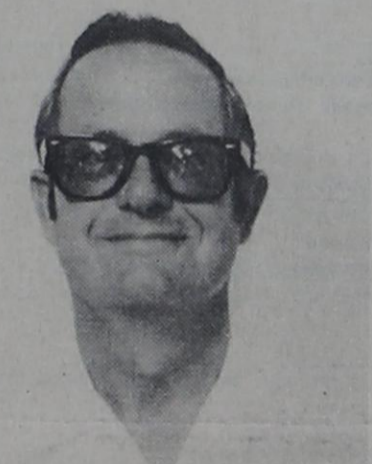
