Section 12. If the members of the fire department should for any reason, fail to elect their officers in February, as herein provided, they may elect such officers at any monthly meeting thereafter and the officers of the preceding year shall hold over until their successors are duly elected and qualified.

Section 13. The fire alarm bell as now used by the fire department, shall be the means of giving the alarm for all fires, and any person who may discover fire in any building within this city is hereby authorized and required to give the alarm by ringing the bell as now provided for that purpose; and in addition thereto, any other means of giving the alarm may be used, that is not in conflict with the ordinances of this city. But should said alarm bell, be maliciously rung, or be used for other purpose than giving alarms for fires, insurrection, or riots, or robbery, or meetings of the department, any person, such person so ringing the bell, shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor and upon conviction may be fined in any sum not less than \$25.00 or more than \$100.00, and shall be committed until such fine and all costs have been paid. When the fire alarm bell is used by the department in calling together its members it shall rung by three slow rings, and a pause and at intervals of 15 seconds.

Section 15. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance, are hereby repealed. Section 16. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval.

Section 5. The assistant chief, shall assist the chief, obey his orders, and in his absence act in his stead, do all things, and perform all duties that devolve upon the chief.

Section 6. Upon the alarm of fire the firemen shall, under the direction of their officers, repair as rapidly as possible to the scene of fire with the fire apparatus and there work and manage the same under the direction of the chief and his assistants until the fire is extinguished. If any member of the fire department shall without permission of the chief, or person acting as chief, leave any fire before same is extinguished, he shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$25 00.

Section 7 The members of the fire department may adopt such constitution and by-laws for their government, not to conflict with the ordinances of the City of Amarillo, as they deem best calculated to perfect and preserve the organization of an effective fire department; and to that end said fire department shall hold regular monthly meetings, the one occurring in February being their annual meeting, at which they shall choose from their own number, the officers required by the provisions of this ordinance and in addition thereto such other officers as may be required by their constitution and by-laws.

Section 8. The chief, or officer in charge of the fire department, may order any building, fence or other obstruction to be torn down, or blown up whenever, it may be necessary to arrest the progress of the fire and shall not be held liable for damages in consequence thereof.

Section 9. During the prevalence of any fire, the service of any person not a fireman may be required by the chief or his assistant in helping to convey the fire apparatus to the scene of fire, to remove and protect property and in extinguishing the fire; and it shall be lawful for the chief or other officers of the department to require the assistance of any teams or draymen with his team, or the aid of any by-stander. Any person refusing such assistance shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$100.00 for each
