Van Winkle, if he had bought lots in Amarillo three years ago, could wake up now and sell at hundreds of per cent profits, made solely by the enterprise of the citizens, without himself having done a hands turn to earn the profits. This unearned increment ought to go into the public till, and taxation abolished—and land speculation abolished.

"What shall we do with the tramp?" is the question that officials of sixty-five cities have met in Philadelphia to discuss. "Take him off the vaudeville stage and put him on the rock pile," is one way of answering the conundrum.—Exchange.

That is about the way the convention will decide. It seems hard for the average "reformer" to understand that the best way to abolish tramps is to give them a chance for working the land and making a living for themselves. Putting them on the rock pile is no worse than working convicts on the public road. Breaking rock to mecadamise the streets only adds value to town lots, and working roads add only to the value of farms, and this added value is always paid by the renter, and such added value paid by them so reduces their earnings as ultimately to drive them into tramping. To abolish tramps we must abolish involuntary poverty, to abolish poverty we must give men a chance to work for themselves. The land offers the only chance under heaven. The single tax will do it.

### A Dangerous Man.

About inauguration time a prominent railroad president who was visiting Washington declared that it might become necessary to elect a democrat next time because of the odium which the republican party was bringing upon itself. When asked to name a satisfactory candidate he mentioned a prominent democrat whose availability is now being canvassed. The railroad president was asked how Tom Johnson would do and his reply was that Johnson was not a "safe man," that he was, in fact a "dangerous man." Something has occurred in Cleveland recently which supports the opinion expressed by this railroad president and shows that Mr. Johnson is in truth a "dangerous man" to corporations that avoid taxation or seek some unfair advantage at the expense of the people.

Mayor Johnson has been trying to raise the assessment of the railroads. According to the Columbus Press Post he says:

"The members of the state board will place the railroads on the same level with residence property and farm lands, or there'll be such a storm of indignation throughout the state that they will be swept out of political life forever."

When the assessment was raised from 12 per cent. to 13 per cent. (Johnson wanted it raised to 60 per cent.) he is reported to have said to them:

"Gentlemen, you ought to be proud of yourselves. You have been as good to this charitable institution, the Pennsylvania Railroad company, as you know how. I hope that every one of you will be defeated should you aspire to a re-election of any other office. If I can help to defeat you I will do so."

All of this goes to show that Mr. Johnson is a "dangerous man." As he is in favor of making corporations pay their share of the taxes and stand on the same level with the farmer and home owner, he is probably a "demagogue," and if he sticks to his resolve to do his duty to the public he may after a while be called an "anarchist." The fact that Mr. Johnson, while supporting the national ticket heartily in 1896 and 1900, has not been known as a radical silver man will not be sufficient to protect him from the wrath to come. The corporations will not permit any independence in thought or act. No one can enjoy their smiles unless he is willing to abandon conscience and conviction, and obey every command without questioning.—Commoner.

WASHINGTON, May 31st, 1901.

Editor Amarillo News.

The Constitution has stood some hard knocks in the past from partisan decisions of the U. S. Supreme Court and it will stand the extraordinary and contradictory decisions handed down this week in the insular cases. Although for the time these decisions give the administration a free hand in carrying out its imperialistic colonial policy, they will doubtless make enough democratic votes among the serious-minded, who believe Congress to be the creature of the Constitution, instead of the Constitution being the football of Congress, as the principal one of these decisions practically holds it to be, to elect the next President. There is not the slightest doubt that a majority—a vast majority—of the people of this country regard the Constitution as the best protection of their liberties, and to doubt that they will resent its being juggled with in order to make it meet the exigencies of the McKinley administration is to doubt their intelligence. Democrats, of course, regret that this decision was made, but they find consolation in the belief that it will result in hastening the return to power of the democratic party, which has ever been the defender of the Constitution and believer in its strict construction.
