**FAIR WARNING**

Our Courts of Appeals have recently held that marble tables, boards and machines having a 'pay off' feature are gaming devices, and the keepers thereof are by law guilty of a felony. This includes all slot machines, marble tables, dice boxes, race track machines and other like devices and machines that are coin operated and have a 'pay off' in money, merchandise or other things of value.

Also, all punch boards and grab tags and all prize drawings, where the privilege of drawing is determined by the sale of numbers or tickets or by the purchase of merchandise, are violations of the law.

All gaming devices, such as above de-

scribed, are subject to being seized and destroyed under orders of the court.

Notice is hereby given that, on or after January 1, 1936, all persons violating any of the above named laws will be prosecuted for such violations and if the above named gambling devices are not removed from the premises where they are being operated by that date, the same will be seized and destroyed. The removal from the premises does not mean to simply to put them under a counter or in some obscure place on the premises, but to move them off and away from the premises.

This notice is not to be taken as a precedent in regard to any other violations of the law, but it is given because the circumstances are such that some persons may not know the true status of the law in regard to the violations named.

Your cooperation in the enforcement of the laws above mentioned will be appreciated.

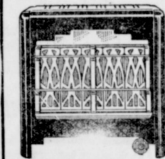

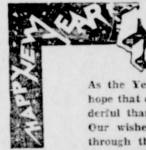

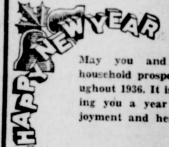
