Wealth--True and False.

Wealth is the product of labor applied to land. If anybody gets wealth in any other way he gets it by appropriating the labor of others. There can be no other way. And how? By selling to labor the privilege of applying itself to land that it may produce wealth. Land is not wealth; it is the source of wealth, and he who owns the source can charge toll for access to it. A fountain of water in a desert is a source of wealth to the owner of it, for all that a man hath will he give for his life. The traveler is ready to give anything measured by his thirst for a drink of its waters. So land is the spring of life to humanity: The race will pay all it can make save a bare existence for access to this fountain, and they who own the land need not labor. It is they who sit at the receipt of custom, and for the privilege of entering upon the land, there to apply their labor to it, they charge their fellow man a price, called rent. "A perfumed seigneur, delicately lounging in the Ocuil de Boent, hath an alchemy whereby he will extract the third nettle, and call it rent."

The great crime of landlordism is a continuing crime. Its robbery does not cease with one depredation; it is continually appropriating the wealth earned by others. Society is daily sharing the wealth it has produced with its silent partner, the owner of the soil. But for this

acquiescence of society no Rockefeller could roll up his millions, for what is the wealth, so-called, of Rockefeller but the power to collect from industry by his monopoly of natural oil lands? What is the power of Hanna but the power to appropriate to his own use the value of the coal put into the bowels of the earth for the sons of men? What is the predatory power of the trusts but their monopoly of some natural opportunity, backed by the law that confers special privileges?
