First National Bank Is Now Home Owned

Local Men Buy Stock; Organize Under New Official Board

Few persons, perhaps, realize the crisis through which the bank was passing, or were conscious of the danger that O'Donnell might be without a bank completely.

One of the most forward-reaching steps in the development of the town of O'Donnell was completed last Saturday when stock of the First National Bank was officially turned into the hands of local owners.

The First National Bank is now organized with a capital stock of \$40,000, and with a surplus of more than \$6,000 all of these sums in actual cash.

The new official board is composed of C. H. Doak as president; J. L. Shoemaker, vice-president and cashier; Charles Cathey, assistant cashier; J. M. Noble, Jr., C. J. Beach, and John Earles.

Each member of the board has had experience in the banking business or in a similar business, and it is believed that affairs of the bank will be carried on in a manner which will be a pride to the entire community.

Mr. Doak, in company with a Mr. Ray, organized the first bank in Lynn county at Tahoka, back in 1905.

He also was instrumental in organizing the first bank in O'Donnell and served as president of that institution for some time.

Mr. Shoemaker almost cut his teeth on a bank ledger, having spent most of his adult life in this business.

He has been connected with the local bank since 1927, and has been a stockholder all of that time.

Mr. Cathey has also been connected with the bank for many years, while Mr. Noble was for some time cashier of the old bank here, as well as having had wide experience as a business man, a public accountant, and bookkeeper.

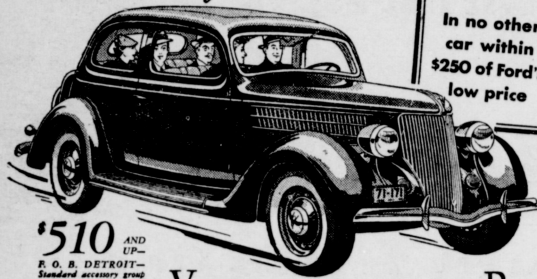
