NOTES FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

One of the great evils with which the O'Donnell school has to contend is tardiness. The pupil who is tardy is deprived of the best part of his day for he misses school at a time when his mind is freshest and is capable of doing the best work. Then it is worth a great deal more to a child to form the habit of promptness than many people imagine. The child who is prompt in school will be more likely to be on time in the affairs of life after school, and for this reason he will be more likely to succeed. School begins at 9:00 a. m. Parents are urged to put forth a special effort to get their children to school on time.

The enrollment now exceeds five hundred. While I haven't counted up within the last few days, there are approximately 510 pupils in actual attendance now—and more coming. Monday we had sixteen new ones.

Mid term examinations will be held during the week beginning Jan. 19. In the high school department they will probably begin about Wednesday, Jan. 21. Promotions will be based upon the grades given the pupils on their cards and upon the examinations and other work that has been assigned. There will likely be a large number of failures due to irregular attendance, or late enrollment. This is regrettable but unavoidable. Rest assured that the teachers will keep the best interests of the children in mind in determining the question of promotion. The third regular six weeks' grade will be placed on the report cards at the end of next week, in the high school work, and the fourth regular grade report at the same time. Friday, Jan. 25, old books will be returned and new books issued to grade and high school pupils. This work will begin at 3 p. m.

O'Donnell to Be on Air Line Map

O'Donnell is to be an emergency landing station for aviators on one of the new lines being mapped out by the Bureau of Aeronautics at Washington.

This was made manifest this week when W. A. Jones was notified by the bureau to have the citizens of the town become interested to the extent that a suitable landing field be set aside for this purpose. The bureau also requested that a "sausage" wind indicator be erected and that the name of the town be painted in large letters on the roofs of some of the buildings so that it would be visible to flyers passing over, and that a drawing of the landing field and the town be sent in which will be reproduced on the new map for the benefit of the flyers who are "getting in" for the first time.

Mr. Jones immediately went to work on the matter and the details will soon be worked out. The landing field will be situated in the southeast part of town and the work of erecting the wind indicator and painting O'Donnell on the roofs of the buildings will soon start. Mr. Jones is to be congratulated in securing this landing station for the town.

It is the intention of the Bureau of Aeronautics to build up the air service of this nation to equal that of any of the other powers. At present the United States is behind all the powers in flying strength both military and commercial, despite the fact that we hold the record for the first flight across the Atlantic, the first circumnavigation of the globe by air and the longest non stop flight. The round the world flight and the tour of the Shenandoah were made primarily to get the people of the nation interested in flying.

There is a bill before congress to provide funds to increase our air force. If it passes we will soon be second to none in air strength, but if it fails we will continue to fly low speed ships.

Trade in Human Heads Recognized as Legal

For a hundred dollars New Yorkers can buy a human head, shrunken and shriveled. These heads are smuggled into the United States from Ecuador, where they are contraband. Immediately they reach American shores they become legal merchandise, says an article in an English paper.

The Jivaro Indians, of which there are 15,000 in the oriental region of Ecuador, have been cutting off the heads of their enemies and their own dead for years, and pickling them in a secret preparation only known to their own savage tribes. The heads, after treatment, shrink from natural size to a grisly miniature about three by two inches in size.

A hatter is said to have a representative in Ecuador who regularly ships these heads to Panama City, because there is no legitimate market for them in the cities of Ecuador. In America, however, they have a ready sale. Prompted by some morbid instinct, American women of fashion pay prices ranging from \$250 to \$350 for each grisly specimen.

The market is so brisk in America now that the demand is far in excess of the supply, and standing orders are left by New York dealers with agents, who find difficulty in coping with the incessant trade.

In appearance the heads are misshapen, and are generally covered with rich, black, abundant hair, some with red and yellow toucan feathers in the ears.

A peculiar feature of the dried heads is that the hair is said to continue to grow. In the Bishop museum in Honolulu the hair on one of the heads grew over an inch in length after its acquisition.

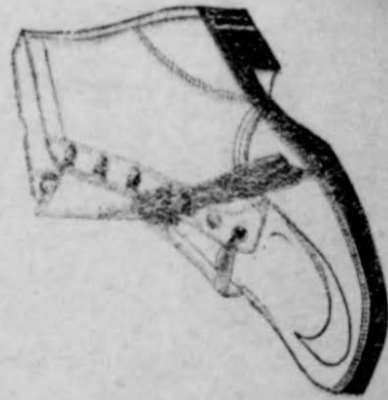

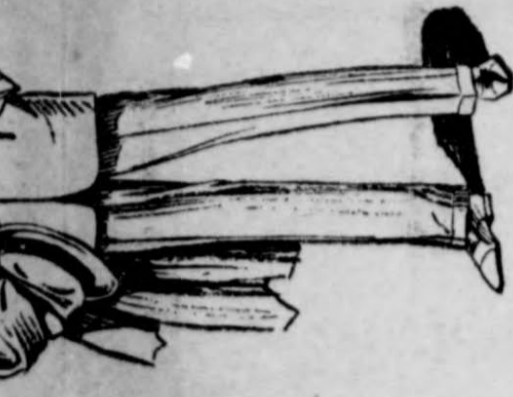
