Cotton Bringing 24.50 on the O'Donnell Market Friday Afternoon

Display for County Fair

O'Donnell will be represented at the Lynn County Fair this week with a credible exhibit of farm products of this territory.

C. A. Wasson, T. B. Bailey and Clyde Frost have been busy the entire week making the round of farms gathering up representative products to make the display.

As fine samples of grain sorghams, oats, corn, peanuts, potatoes, etc., as could be grown anywhere are included in the display. Some splendid samples of canned fruits, meats and vegetables from the home of Mrs. B. O. McGonagill and other housewives will be in the collection.

At a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Thursday, Messrs. Wasson, Bailey and Frost were appointed to assist Mesdames B. O. McGonagill and J. R. Sanders in arranging the booth and looking after the display during the fair. At the close of the Lynn county fair, the exhibit will be taken to Lubbock where it will be shown.

Prizes will be awarded to the farmers for the best products obtained from their farms, although the entire exhibit will go in as a community exhibit. If the O'Donnell exhibit does not get a blue ribbon, there are going to be some mighty fine displays of farm products at the fair.

It displayed a very patriotic spirit for Messrs. Wasson, Bailey and Frost to spend several days of their time to get together this exhibit and they have the thanks of the entire community.

Organize Foot Ball Team

O'Donnell is to have a foot ball club.

This was decided Tuesday when the high school eligibles met for the purpose of organization pursuant to call by Prof. W. A. Jones, who has charge of the school athletics.

About eighteen men reported for the first work out and the prospects are bright for a splendid team to represent the school this season, some good timber being represented in the number reporting and all were eager to go into training. The uniforms have not been received but they have been ordered and the boys will present a splendid appearance when they step out for their first game.

The men go under strict and intensive training rules at once and will be whipped into shape as quickly as possible in order that they may have a full schedule of games for the entire season. The first game will be played with the Tahoka team at an early date, and games with other teams will be booked to fill the season's schedule.

Since this is the first year that O'Donnell has had a foot ball club, there is much to be done and the cooperation of the people of the town is earnestly requested so that the High school will have a team that will be representative of this fast growing little city. Let everybody root for our foot ball team and show the boys that we are behind them.

School Opened Last Monday

School opened Monday with a spirit that portends the most successful term the town has ever had.

Quite a number of the patrons and the board of trustees were present and after the children and the visitors had assembled in the auditorium the exercises were opened by the singing of America followed by scripture reading and invocation by Rev. W. K. Horn. Rev. Joseph E. Eldridge made an interesting talk to the school, as did R. E. Harberger. Dr. C. P. Tate delivered an inspiring message to the patrons, emphasizing the need of a Parent-Teachers' Association.

Superintendent J. A. Rickard gave an outline of the year's work he had planned for the school, and also a summary of the requirements necessary to obtain the units of credit for it to become affiliated. He stated that much work had to be done to accomplish this and that the school must have the full cooperation of all the patrons.

The teachers were introduced to the pupils and visitors, after which the regular routine of work was taken up.

There were 335 pupils present on the opening morning, but a great number of the children are engaged on the farms helping to gather the crops and a full attendance is not expected for several weeks.

679 Bales Received at Yard

The number of bales weighed in at the O'Donnell yards Thursday night amounted to 679, 111 having been ginned on this day. The ginners predict that 125 bales a day will be ginned for the balance of the week. Cotton is opening very fast the past few days and next week the big rush will be on.

As the picking proceeds, all the farmers say that their cotton is turning out better than they expected, in many instances the yield being estimated as high as three-fourths a bale to the acre.

O'Donnell is leading all the Southplains towns in the number of bales ginned, expect Lamesa and we are running that thriving community a close second.

A Lubbock paper stated last week that town was leading any of the Southplains towns in the number of bales ginned; that between sixty-five and seventy-five bales having been weighed at that yard. On that date O'Donnell had ginned above 350 bales.

Cotton took a jump today, 24.50 being paid and many happy smiles were being worn by the farmers who were selling.

Two hundred bales were shipped out in one consignment for export to Liverpool Thursday. This tops any shipment made from the Southplains this season.

Mr. and Mrs. E. D. Holman, of Athens, finally fell for the boost of the O'Donnell country by their nephew, Carl A. Holman and moved here this week to make their home. A welcome is extended these good people.

When Time Gets Ripe

TEXT—Then Jesus said unto them, My time is not yet come; but your time is always ready.—John 7:6.

When time has ripened it may be harvested but not before. Just as it is unwise to brush the earth away to see whether the seeds are sprouting, so for the ripeness of time we must wait. Said a father: "I would give a thousand dollars to the man who would ask my son, now grown up, at the proper moment, just this simple question: 'What value do you place upon being brought up in a home of prayer?' and I would be willing to sweep the streets to earn the money."

Our Lord's appeal to the leaders in Israel was concerning one of time's great birth-throes. There was an epoch, Great religionists could not see it but He saw it. They saw clouds, they heard winds, but they could not see the cloud of glory nor hear the "rushing of the mighty wind." They heard words, they did not distinguish the voice of the speaker. "How is it said, He, that you do not discern this time?" It is hard for deafness to listen to the message of truth. Men surround themselves with a materialistic din which no truths can penetrate. So these men, when the Kingdom was offered, did not discern the actual King.

"When we were without strength, in due time, Christ died for the ungodly." Mark that, it was in due time. Why was it not at the time when Adam and Eve were turned out of the garden of Eden? Why was it not at the time when David's heart broke in the cry of the fifty-first Psalm? Why? At least there was one lesson to be learned. It was this: "By the deeds of the law shall no flesh be justified." Man's first effort to deal with sin was to try. He has been trying ever since. Aprons of fig leaves were the utmost attempt. Men have thought that they could be self-savers, and that thought appears to be more pronounced today than ever. By literature and public address and toilsome organized effort it renders the multitudes stone deaf to the only hope, namely: that "Christ died for the ungodly." And thus throughout that reach of time the lesson that man cannot save himself was taught and repeated until, the utmost lessons having been given—none too few, and since God's mercy is so great, none too many—the time was due, and Christ died for the ungodly. Observe who stands at the arrow point of these great crises. It is Christ. It is Christ as King, and Christ as Savior. How serious then the offense if, after the repeating of the lesson so often and so long until the "due time," men persist in the delusion that they may be self-savers.

Hearing about the Gospel from childhood, yet they are not conscious of the crisis. If they but saw that from the hour of the death of Jesus on the cross until this hour all men who live long enough to be accountable are met with this crisis, this "due time," if they but saw that all has been exemplified and threshed out and "settled in heaven," that by the law is the knowledge of sin and not the cure of it, that men can be saved by grace, not of works, how they would then cry: "Thou, Oh Christ, art all I want." The clock has struck, but all unaware, they are waiting for the hour to pass. They are still trying what has been absolutely tried out to its dismal failure. How could the conquest over death be real to men who declared it "an idle tale"? Surely they required more light and they got it. Ah, that old vanity-filled noise at the first prevented their "tuning in," and the truth did not penetrate. Who then can hear, who will be persuaded that in Jesus' words, "It is finished," there is the death-knell to their guilt before God? They who are willing to admit the need and allow the Holy Spirit to "tune them in"; for "God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace to the lowly." The time for this momentous event is N-O-W. "Behold N-O-W is the accepted time." For our salvation the time is ripe.

Condensed Austin News

The Attorney General has approved \$200,000 street paving and \$100,000 waterworks reservoir bonds for the city of Galveston, serials 5s.

It is said that one of the reasons why Governor Neff went to Kansas City, Mo., at this particular time and without previous announcement was to meet John W. Davis, the Democratic nominee for President.

Governor Neff said he had received the confession of Euzebe Vidrine exonerating Frank Smith of the murder of Lee Duke, Orange taxi driver, also application for pardon of Smith and protests against it, but that no action has been taken.

S. L. Staples, State Treasurer, says he is securing the co-operation of the Federal Reserve Bank at Dallas in disposing of \$3,000,000 of Liberty bonds held by the various Texas special funds and that the plan is to market about \$500,000 at a time.

At the close of the first two weeks of the deficiency in the general fund that amount of unpaid warrants was \$700,000. It will not grow so much in October as \$1,000,000 will be received in that month in gross receipts taxes.

Net revenue from operation of Texas railroads continues large, according to official figures compiled by the Railroad Commission. For the six months ending June 30 of this year the net revenue was \$17,187,563, an increase over the same six months of the preceding year of \$6,656,323, or 63.37 per cent.

John M. Scott, Commissioner of Insurance, announced that he had suspended the permit to do business in Texas of the Inland Lloyds of New York. He further said that the New York Insurance Commissioner had advised that the inland had not responded to notices to appear for a hearing with reference to its financial affairs.

The State Department of Education will make a payment of \$2 per capita on the State apportionment for the public schools during September. The apportionment is \$14 per capita, and, for the first time in the history of the State, a substantial payment will be made during the first month of the school year.

Automobile registrations through the State Highway Department continue to shatter all previous records, the week's additions bringing the total to the following: Passenger cars 660,777, commercial 54,140, busses 3,214, trailers 1,998, tractors 111, dealers' 2,714, motorcycles 2,391, chauffeurs 16,657, transfers 134,183, duplicate numbers 35,817, out-of-state 207.

Unused appropriations in the various departments which reverted to the general fund of the State Treasury at the close of the fiscal year, Aug. 31, together with \$120,000 which the State is to receive from the receiver of the oil properties involved in the Red River boundary suit as gross receipts tax will materially help the general fund which is now on a deficiency.

Governor Neff has announced the appointment of Jeff J. Strickland of San Antonio as Secretary of State to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of J. L. Staples, recently appointed State Treasurer to serve out the unexpired term of C. V. Terrell, who was named to succeed Dr. W. M. W. Splawn, elected president of the University of Texas.

Lee S. Thrift, manager of the textbook division of the State Department of Education, says that there will be a small and brief shortage in free textbooks at the beginning of the new term of the public schools; that the adoptions in June and the time for revisions also the late final decisions in the textbook litigation, all conspired to delay delivery. Over 4,000,000 books are to be supplied at the start of this term.

The act of the Thirty-Fifth Legislature making it unlawful to use on motor vehicles devices known as muffler cutouts on any public highway where the territory contiguous thereto is closely built up is void for uncertainty, the Attorney General's Department held in an opinion given the County Attorney of Polk County. That portion of the law which prohibits the use of muffler cutouts within the limits of the incorporated cities or towns is held to be valid and operative.

PERISHING FAREWELL PRAISES COMRADES

BEARS SIMPLE SIGNATURE WITHOUT INDICATION OF HIS RANK.

ADDRESSED MY COMRADES

And Bears the Simple Signature, John J. Pershing, Without Further Indication of His Rank

Washington.—General Pershing's formal farewell to the army, written in the form of the last general order he signed on his birthday, Sept. 13, which will be read to every army organization by the officer commanding at the first parade formation after it is received, has been made public at the War Department. It is addressed to "My Comrades" and bears the simple signature, "John J. Pershing" without other indication of his rank than the heading at the top, "General of the Armies."

"No words seem adequate to express to you the conflicting emotions that I feel upon reaching the date which officially marks the termination of my active service," General Pershing wrote. "Our experience together have been varied. We have withstood the same hardships and shared the same pleasures. We have faced discouragements and rejoiced over victories."

"Today, the recollections that swiftly pass in review fill my heart with a deep sense of gratitude for the loyal service and warm appreciation of the sincere devotion to the country of the patriotic officers and men with whom it has been my good fortune to be associated during the fleeting years of my army life. "It is my proud privilege, in parting, to say of the men of all ranks who have borne arms under the flag that none has more earnestly wished peace, yet in defense of right none has ever been imbued with loftier purpose nor more completely consecrated to the maintenance of our ideals."

"My esteem for them and my admiration for their achievements continue to increase with the passing of time. The inspiration of their exalted conception of citizenship and their fulfillment of its obligations should ever assure the preservation of our institutions. The glorious example to their fidelity and courage will be remembered by those who come after us."

"It is with an abiding confidence in our national forces and with the assurance of my lasting interest in the welfare that I bid you all an affectionate farewell."

MACMILLAN IS BACK FROM ARCTIC TRIP

Returns to Home Waters After Locked in Ice Nearly Year.

Monhegan Island, Maine.—Back in home waters after a trip that carried them to a spot within eleven degrees of the North Pole, where they were frozen in the ice 320 days, Captain Donald B. Macmillan and his party of explorers have anchored their stanch little schooner Bowdoin here and received their first greeting from "home folks."

As the Bowdoin poked her nose into the waters off this island she was met by an advance welcome party, headed by Mrs. Fogg, a sister of Macmillan. Later the explorers were taken to Island Inn. The Bowdoin will soon make the run to Wiscasset where a more elaborate reception will be held for the explorers.

The Bowdoin, set out from Wiscasset for the frozen North in search of scientific data, fifteen months ago. For nearly a year this snug little craft was locked fast in the ice off the coast of North Greenland, a little more than twenty miles from the spot where seventeen men of the Greeley expedition starved to death in 1884.

Fly Over Occupied Zone.

Cologne, Germany.—The interallied Rhineland High Commission has authorized the flight of the ZR-3 over occupied territory in the coming voyage of the big Zeppelin from Friedrichshafen to Lake Hurst, N. J. At Lake Hurst the dirigible will be turned over to the American Navy Department, for which she was built.

Will Fight Mosquitoes.

Bonham, Texas.—The women of the Civic League of this city are going to fight mosquitoes with oil. They have secured a lot of it from the Texas & Pacific Railroad and will pour it on pools over the city where the pests breed. The oil was given them by the railroad company.

Record Snapshot

A snap-shot taken from the highest altitude at which any such photograph has ever been made is now on exhibition at the War department in Washington.

The picture is of Dayton, Ohio, and it was taken from 32,220 feet above sea level, which is a little more than six miles. The temperature was 62.5 degrees below zero F., and special electric warming devices had to be used for the camera.

GOOD FOODS

A dainty dessert which is not too filling but most satisfying is:



Peach Soufflé.—Take two tablespoonfuls each of butter and flour, mix and cook, add one cupful of milk, a pinch of salt and one-fourth of a cupful of sugar, flavoring with a few drops of almond, and one cupful of chopped peaches with three egg yolks, adding one at a time and beating well, then fold in the stiffly beaten whites and pour into a mold; set in hot water and bake half an hour. Serve with peaches finely chopped, powdered sugar, a little butter, all well mixed and blended with a little almond flavoring.

Prune and Peanut Cake.—Take one-half cupful of butter, add one cupful of sugar, one and three-fourths cupfuls of flour sifted with two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, two eggs, reserving one white for the filling, and one-half cupful of milk. Mix and beat well, bake in two layers.

Filling.—Boil together one cupful of sugar, one-half cupful of water until it forms a thread. Pour the hot sirup over the stiffly beaten white of an egg, beat until thick, then add one-half cupful of chopped peanuts, one-half tablespoonful of lemon juice and one-half cupful of prunes cut into fine pieces. Beat until thick enough to spread.

Watermelon Rind Preserves.—Pare the thin green skin from the rind of the melon and cut into thin strips, removing all of the pink portion. Place the rinds in cold water to which a teaspoonful of alum has been added with a quart of water. Let stand ten hours or overnight, then rinse and stem until tender. Prepare by using three cupfuls of the melon to two of sugar, adding lemon and candied ginger for flavor; add just enough water to start the flow of juice and cook slowly until clear.

Ice cream, when living near a commercial supply, is always an acceptable dessert which may be varied by sauces, nuts and sirups.

GOOD THINGS FOR WINTER

Do not fail to put up enough grape juice for the family as it is so simple and so delicious.

Grape Juice.—Take two cupfuls of ripe, juicy grapes, put them into a well-sterilized two-quart jar, add one cupful of sugar and fill the can with boiling water. Seal at once. Try this one year and you will always make your grape juice in this way.

Spiced Grapes.—Take eight pounds of grapes, four pounds of sugar, three cupfuls of vinegar, four sticks of cinnamon, one ounce of whole cloves and two blades of mace. Remove the skins from well-washed grapes; cook the pulp in the vinegar with the spices tied in a cloth. Pass as much as possible of the pulp through a colander or sieve, keeping back the seeds. Add the skins and return to the fire, when boiling add the sugar and spices. Cook until thick. Put into glasses and seal.

Grape Conserve.—Take seven pounds of grapes, pulp and seed them, putting the pulp and skins together. Grate the rind and squeeze the juice from four oranges, add the juice of two lemons, boil all together for fifteen minutes, then add five pounds of sugar, one pound of seeded raisins, one pint of drained canned cherries, one-half pound of pecan meats. Cook fifteen minutes with one cupful of water. Seal in glasses.

Ginger Pears.—Select hard green pears, pare and slice them thin. Take two ounces of green ginger root, scrape and cut it into very small pieces, squeeze the juice of two lemons over it. Cover the pears, using four pounds of sliced pears with three pounds of sugar and let them stand for several hours. Then place over a slow fire with the ginger root, juice and rind of two lemons. Cook slowly until very thick, remove from the heat and seal in sterile jars.

Texas News

The attorney general's department has approved \$10,000 waterworks extension and \$30,000 sewer bonds of the city of Timpson. The bonds are serial sixes.

Wood county will operate a county farm. A tract of 150 acres of timber land has been purchased by the county commissioners to be used for the farm.

The outlook for a bumper citrus fruit crop in the Falfurrias section is considered promising by the leading citrus fruit growers.

The date of the convention of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World in Houston has been officially fixed as May 10, 1925.

To date 7862 bales of cotton have been ginned in Bishop.

A bus line has been established between Carthage and Marshall.

Work on the 11 miles of hard surface roads which will link Falfurrias with Kingsville and Corpus Christi will be completed within the next two weeks.

Report of the current scholastic census reveals increase of 114 in the San Antonio independent district's scholastic population over last year. The number this year was given as 37,815.

Four hundred thousand dollars of the city of Galveston bonds have been approved by the attorney general. The issues are \$300,000 for paving and \$100,000 for water works, all serial fives.

The San Antonio & Mexican railway has received authority from the Interstate Commerce Commission to construct a 40-mile line of road in La Salle, McMullen and Live Oak counties, Texas.

Work will begin on receipt of materials already ordered for the tinting of the white dome of the state capitol to a hue that will match the red granite of which the capitol building proper is constructed.

The Nueces Valley, Rio Grande & Gulf railroad company has been denied authority by the Interstate Commerce Commission to construct a new line of railroad in Bee, Live Oak, McMullen, La Salle and Webb counties.

Highways in Grimes County are to be built with the proceeds of three issues of special road bonds of the county, aggregating \$189,500, approved by the attorney general and registered at the comptroller's office this week.

The gins of Rosenberg have been running nights for some time and have ginned something over 3000 bales of cotton to date. All of the cotton is now open and with favorable weather, will be picked much earlier than usual.

Seven Texas counties have submitted applications before the state highway commission for \$550,000 aid on road projects, and four other counties have asked the inclusion of new roads into the state's primary designated system.

The ginners' report for Falls County gins up to August 31, 1924, shows 14,553 bales of cotton ginned, as against 24,461 bales to same date for 1923, according to announcement of D. E. Wooley, federal statistician for Falls County. The cotton crop in Falls County being about two weeks behind last season partially accounts for the difference.

Texas' quarantine against twenty-two California counties because of the foot and mouth disease was lifted Saturday by proclamation issued by Governor Neff. Live stock may be shipped into Texas from the designated counties if they are properly certified. Another proclamation provided for the disinfecting of all cars used in shipment of stock exposed to infection. The cleansing is to be done at Houston, Fort Worth and San Antonio.

Texas has six county free libraries, 21 Carnegie library buildings, including branches, and four others that were gifts of individuals, according to a bulletin of the State Library Association. A fifth gift will be available next January.

The state treasury has sold \$4,000,000 worth of U. S. government bonds on the New York market. Treasurer S. L. Staples announced this week. The state received a profit on the bonds of \$157,626 over the price paid for them last May. Most of the money derived from their sale goes to the available school fund.

An organization is being perfected at El Campo which will be known as the "Wharton County Game Protective association." The object of the organization will be to see that all game laws are enforced and securing of game and fish to restock the woods and waters where possible to do so. Some wild turkeys were turned loose near El Campo last spring, five hens and two gobblers, and from the last reports as many as 50 or 60 turkeys have been seen. It is hoped that none of these will be killed this fall.

GOOD THINGS TO PUT UP

IF THE family is fond of beets the small ones put up in sweet pickle are most attractive and tasty. Take a pint or more of very small beets about the size of a large hickory nut. Cook until tender. Dash cold water over them and remove the skins and pack while hot in sterilized jars; cover with equal parts of vinegar and water, adding a tablespoonful of sugar and one clove to each pint jar. Seal and serve as pickles.

If one does like chutney he usually likes it very much; here is a good reliable recipe:

Mandon Catsup.

Remove the stem end of a bushel of ripe tomatoes but do not peel; add one quart each of brown sugar, vinegar, one cupful of salt, two tablespoonfuls of mustard, one tablespoonful each of cloves, allspice and cinnamon, one-half teaspoonful of black pepper and one-fourth teaspoonful of cayenne. Boil slowly, stirring often until reduced one-third, or as thick as desired.

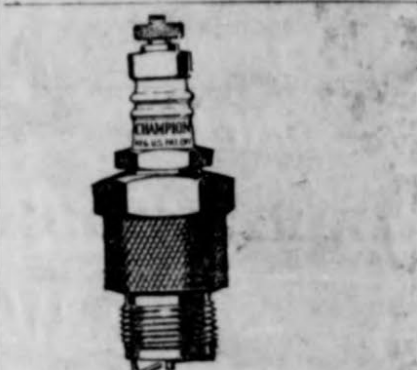
Chutney.

Take twelve green sour apples, two green peppers, six green tomatoes, four small onions and one cupful of seeded raisins, all well chopped. Boil one quart of vinegar, two tablespoonfuls each of mustard seed and salt, one tablespoonful of powdered sugar and two cupfuls of brown sugar. Boil the vinegar, sugar and spices, add the apples and other ingredients and simmer until the apples are soft.
