Forrest Weimhold To Seek State Representative Post

Forrest Weimhold, publisher of newspapers at Levelland and owner of Radio Station KLVT and the Morton Tribune, announced this week that he would be a candidate for State Representative of the 119th District of Texas in the Democratic Primary of July 22nd.

The 119th district is composed of nine counties including: Hockley, Cockran, Crosby, Dawson, Gaines, Lubbock, Lynn, Terry and Yoakum. At the present time the district is represented in the State Legislature by Preston Smith of Lubbock who is a candidate for Lt. Governor.

Weimhold, who is 36 years old and married, has been a citizen of the South Plains for the past 25 years and is a native West Texan. He graduated from Texas Tech in 1936 and owned and operated The Sudan News with his father, the late H H Weimhold, who was a pioneer West Texas publisher, until 1939 when he purchased The Hockley County Herald and moved to Levelland.

Since being a citizen of Hockley County, Weimhold has been active in all civic and county affairs, being a past president of both the Levelland Rotary Club and Hockley County Board of Development, as well as a director of these organizations and the Hockley Co. Fair Association, and other local organizations. He is also a past director of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. He is the treasurer and a director of Hotel Levelland, Inc., a community enterprise.

The Levelland publisher has been active in the various professional organizations, as he is the president of the West Texas Press Association as well as other high offices. He served 3 years in the U. S. Army Air Forces during World War II 16 months of which was spent overseas in the Far East

During Weimhold's army service The Hockley County Herald was managed and operated by his wife, the former Ruth Maples of Spur. Weimhold is a member of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars.

"I feel that I am well acquainted with the problems and needs of the peoples of the 119th district and that I am qualified with experience and ability to capably represent this large district in the State Legislature," Weimhold said.

"I fully realize that it is imperative that every economy be exercised in our state government as well as all other branches and that for each tax dollar spent, 100 cents worth of value must be received", he added.

"I believe that I can serve the people of this district well as state Representative, and sincerely solicit the support, influence and vote of each citizen who believes in good sound, common sense government. I promise to serve all sections of the district fairly and impartially"

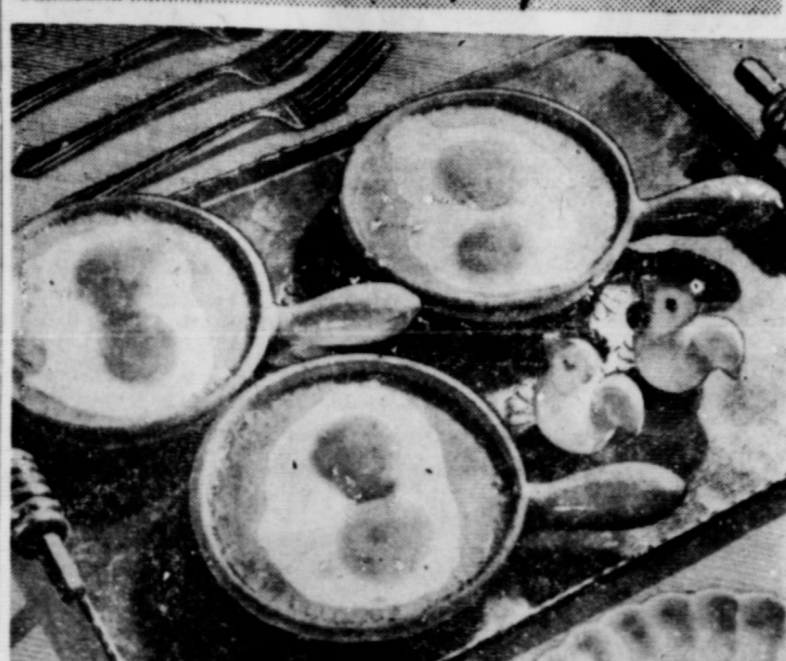

LENTEN MEALS need an extra spark to keep them interesting and appealing since they are meatless. They should, however, be substantial and nourishing, and with plenty of cheese, fish, eggs and vegetables they will have plenty of stick-to-the-ribs quality.

Don't get into a rut with one or two dishes each season. There's plenty of variety and interest available in Lenten dishes if you'll just try new recipes and plan sparkling menus.

Vegetable combinations can give plenty of texture, color and menu interest. Cheese as a main ingredient snaps many a main dish from the doldrums. Add fish to macaroni or spaghetti and you'll never miss meats. Try new ways with eggs, and the family will cheer you to new culinary accomplishments.

Eggs Mornay (Serves 2 to 3)

- 4-6 eggs
- 2 cups thin white sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 1/2 cup grated cheese
- 2 egg yolks

Add paprika and cheese (reserve about 2 tablespoons for top) to hot well-seasoned sauce. Beat in yolks. Pour layer of sauce into well-greased shallow baking dishes. Slip eggs into sauce, one at a time. Pour remaining sauce around edge, leaving yolks partially exposed. Sprinkle with remaining cheese. Bake in moderately hot oven (375°) 15 to 20 minutes, depending upon doneness of eggs desired.

Fresh Vegetable Casserole (Serves 6)

- 2 cups cooked carrots, sliced
- 2 cups cooked string beans
- 2 cups cooked peas
- 2 cups cooked lima beans
- 1 cup vegetable stock
- 1 cup cooked creamed celery
- 6 broiled mushrooms
- 1/4 cup vegetable glaze

Have all vegetables cooked and seasoned separately. Grease shallow individual casseroles and place sliced carrots around the sides of each dish. Place a spoonful of each string beans, peas and lima beans in the dishes in the order given; add a little vegetable stock; then top with a small spoonful of creamed celery and a broiled mushroom. Put a spoonful of vegetable glaze over the mushroom and when all dishes are filled bake in a moderately hot oven (375°) for 10 minutes.

Maine Casserole (Serves 6)

- 3 onions, sliced
- 2 cups kernel corn
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Dash of pepper
- 1 1-pound can baked beans without pork
- 1/4 cup ketchup
- 1/4 cup dry bread crumbs
- 2 tablespoons butter

Cook onions in boiling water 20 minutes and drain. Arrange corn in casserole. Cover with a layer of

***Baked Beans and Onions Au Gratin (Serves 8)**

- 2 cups dried marrowfat beans
- 5 cups water
- 2 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 12 medium-sized onions
- 1/4 cup old-fashioned molasses
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1 1/2 cups grated cheddar cheese
- 1 cup soft bread crumbs
- 2 tablespoons butter, melted

Soak beans in water overnight. Add 1 teaspoon of the salt and onions. Simmer but do not boil until onions are tender but still retain their shape (about 15 minutes). Remove onions from pot, continue cooking beans until tender (about 45 minutes). Drain. Save water.

Combine liquid molasses, mustard, pepper and Worcestershire sauce. Place half the beans in two-quart casserole. Sprinkle with 1/4 cup cheese. Add remaining beans and arrange onions over top of beans. Add liquid. Bake uncovered in moderately hot oven (325°) for 45 minutes. Butter bread crumbs and sprinkle over top of casserole. Return to oven and cook until crumbs are brown (about 15 minutes).

Deviled Tuna and Macaroni (Serves 4)

- 4 ounces shell macaroni
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 tablespoon enriched flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1 cup flaked tuna (1 7-ounce can)
- 2 hard cooked eggs
- 1 tablespoon chopped pimiento
- Sliced stuffed olives

Cook macaroni in boiling salted water until tender (about eight minutes). Drain and rinse. While macaroni is cooking, melt butter in saucepan. Stir in flour, salt, paprika and Worcestershire sauce. Gradually add milk, stirring constantly until slightly thickened. Add lemon juice and tuna. Dice hard cooked eggs, reserving one, yolk for garnish. Fold eggs and macaroni into deviled sauce. Mix thoroughly. Pour into four greased individual baking dishes. Bake in moderate oven (350°) 20 minutes. Garnish with sieved egg yolk, pimiento and olives.

Do not have large meals nor so-called heavy foods in the evening if it can be avoided.

Automatic Feeder

Many southern farmers, who would like to install automatic feed handling setups, often pass them up because they feel they lack buildings large enough to hold the necessary electric equipment. That such tight-sided buildings, so necessary in cold climates, are not needed for this operation in the South is shown by the above picture.

Taken on a farm near Roanoke, Va., it shows a combination indoors-outdoors arrangement. Whole grain is fed into the outdoor mill, to the left. Here it is ground and then elevated by blower pipe into feed bins inside the combination grain and machinery storage shed in the background.

Poultrymen Are Advised To Purchase 'Quality'
"Good chickens can not be sold at a low price," G. S. Vickers, field manager of the Ohio poultry improvement association said in cautioning farmers to "buy on quality—not price."
Outlining a procedure to inspire wise chicken buying, Vickers said: "Investigate your local hatcheryman first. See if he has a careful and thorough pulorum disease control program. See if he keeps up the quality and constantly improves it by careful selection and the use of ROP pedigreed or other good breeding males from good brooders."

Egg Preservation Methods Seen Due for Improvement
Present methods of preserving table eggs may be revolutionized by the use of a new compound developed by Dr. Alexis Romanoff and W. D. Yushok of Cornell's agricultural experiment station.
The compound, a mixture of a plastic substance called polystyrene, with chlorinated rubber and other chemicals, forms a film over the egg and preserves it at ordinary temperature.

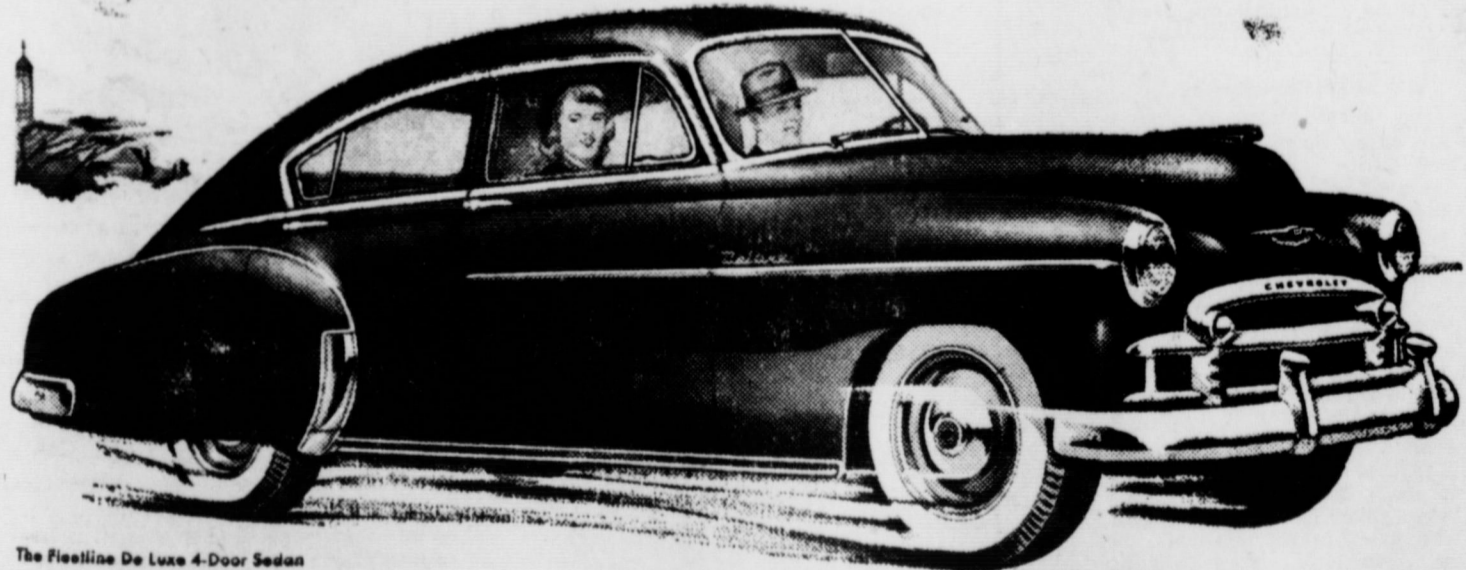

Frankly Fancy Is This Chocolate Torte (See Recipes Below)

Party Desserts

WHEN it's your turn to entertain the club for dessert, or when you plan a nice dinner, what you most want is a dessert that will really make a big hit.

Luscious cakes, fancy pastry or elegant lady finger and whipped cream concoctions are very much in order when you entertain in this way. Don't let your list of fancy desserts get down too low, or you may spend half a day trying to find something suitable.

ANY LEFT-OVER torte will keep for several days in the refrigerator, in fact once you have made this recipe you will include it in the refrigerator as an emergency dessert for unexpected guests. The wholesome goodness of the ingredients, fresh butter and eggs, makes it one that can be served to mixed groups and people of all ages.

Orange Refrigerator Pudding (Serves 6)

½ cup sugar
2 teaspoons flour
2 eggs, separated
½ cup scalded milk
1 tablespoon butter
Few grains salt
Grated rind ½ orange
Juice of one orange
Ladyfingers
Whipped cream

Mix sugar and flour with beaten egg yolks, then add scalded milk slowly. Add butter and salt and cook over hot water until thick. Add orange rind and juice. Cool slightly and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Split ladyfingers and place a layer in pan lined with waxed paper; spread with orange mixture; cover with another layer of ladyfingers and continue until mixture is used. Chill 24 hours. Serve with whipped cream.

IT'S an excellent idea to plan refrigerated desserts for big occasions since they may be made well in advance, and thus relieve you from kitchen chores on the dessert score as you get ready for the party. Here are two you'll like:

Chocolate Torte

2 squares bitter chocolate
½ cup sugar
¼ cup milk
4 egg yolks
1 cup confectioners' sugar
1 cup butter
4 egg whites
¼ teaspoon salt

Lady fingers or sponge cake
Melt chocolate over hot water in the top of a double boiler. Combine ½ cup sugar, milk and 4 egg yolks, add to chocolate and cook until thick and smooth. Cool. Cream butter until very soft, add the confectioners' sugar and cream thoroughly. Add chocolate mixture and mix well. Fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites and pour into a straight-sided cake or torte pan that has been lined with lady fingers. Chill in refrigerator several hours. Serve with whipped cream to which crushed peppermint stick candy has been added.

LYNN SAYS: Know These Facts About Vegetables

Use green vegetables fresh—the fresher the better. Vitamins disappear as vegetables wilt and wait.

If you must hold them for a day or so, keep green vegetables cool, damp and lightly covered. Pile loosely to prevent crushing.

Wash quickly, never soak, and lift from water to free from sand and grit.

Save for the soup kettle leaves and stems too coarse to use "as is."

*Tutti Frutti Trifle (Serves 8)

½ grapefruit
1 orange
1 cup fresh pineapple
6 marshmallows
6 maraschino cherries
½ cup moist shredded coconut
2 tablespoons maraschino juice
3 egg whites
6 tablespoons confectioners' sugar

Remove segments from membrane of grapefruit and orange, slice pineapple and cut marshmallows and cherries into eighths. Soak maraschino and coconut in combined juices. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold in sugar. Combine with fruits and coconut marshmallow mixture. Freeze in refrigerator tray until firm.

*Lemon Nut Crunch Cake (10 inch tube pan)

¾ cup butter
1½ cups sugar
3 eggs, well beaten
3 cups sifted all-purpose flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup milk
Juice and grated rind of 1 lemon
1 cup chopped pecan

Cream butter until light; gradually beat in sugar, beating until light and fluffy. Add eggs; blend well. Sift dry ingredients together and add alternately with milk to creamed mixture, mixing until blended. Stir in lemon juice and rind. Generously grease 10-inch tube pan with butter and cover bottom with chopped nuts. Pour in batter. Bake in a moderate oven (375°) for 1 hour and 15 minutes. Turn out on rack to cool.

Hawaiian Fruit Pie (9-inch pie)

½ cup sifted flour
1 cup sugar
¼ teaspoon salt
2 cups scalded milk
3 egg yolks, slightly beaten
2 tablespoons butter
1 cup shredded coconut
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1½ cups shredded pineapple, drained
1 9-inch baked pastry shell
3 egg whites, stiffly beaten
6 tablespoons sugar

Combine the sifted flour, sugar and salt in the top of the double boiler, gradually stir in scalded milk, place over boiling water and cook until thick (about 15 minutes), stirring constantly. Pour small amount of mixture over slightly beaten egg yolks, return to double boiler and cook three minutes longer. Add the butter, coconut, lemon juice and shredded pineapple and pour into baked pastry shell. Top with meringue made by gradually beating the six tablespoons sugar into the stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in moderate oven (350°) about 15 minutes or until lightly browned.

You can eat sprouted potatoes if you peel them. But never eat the sprouts. They have the same harmful substance contained in green spots.

Toss together green vegetable salads just before you serve; and to make your ration for fats go further, be a miser with the oil in the salad dressing.

To get rid of sand and grit, lift the vegetable from a pan of water, rather than pouring the water off. Have the water boiling when you put green vegetables on to cook.

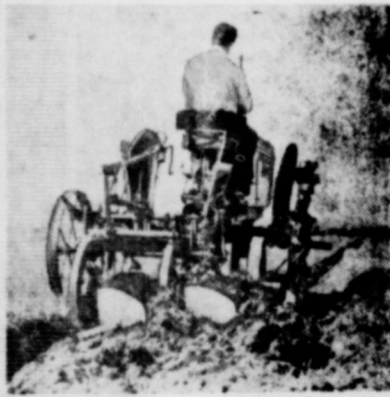
Farm Topics

Farmers Continuing To Buy Machinery Demand Backlog, Labor Costs Held as Factors

Although farm operators' net income and their purchases of agricultural machinery were both down in 1949, neither has slipped very far from their peak levels. Realized net income from agriculture in 1949 approximated 14 billion dollars, according to the latest estimate of the bureau of agricultural economics.

The bureau reported that no official figure of agricultural machinery purchases in 1949 is yet available, but informed trade and Washington sources expected the total to be down from last year by about the same percentage as farmers' net income. That would indicate a figure of about two 2.1 billion.

In the record year of 1948, purchasers reached 2.4 billion, an all-time high. If 1949 expectations ma-

terialize, farm machinery purchases would still be almost four times as large as the 1935-39 average.

Several factors besides high incomes have acted in recent years to help boost purchases of equipment. In some measure they were expected to add strength to the equipment market for some time.

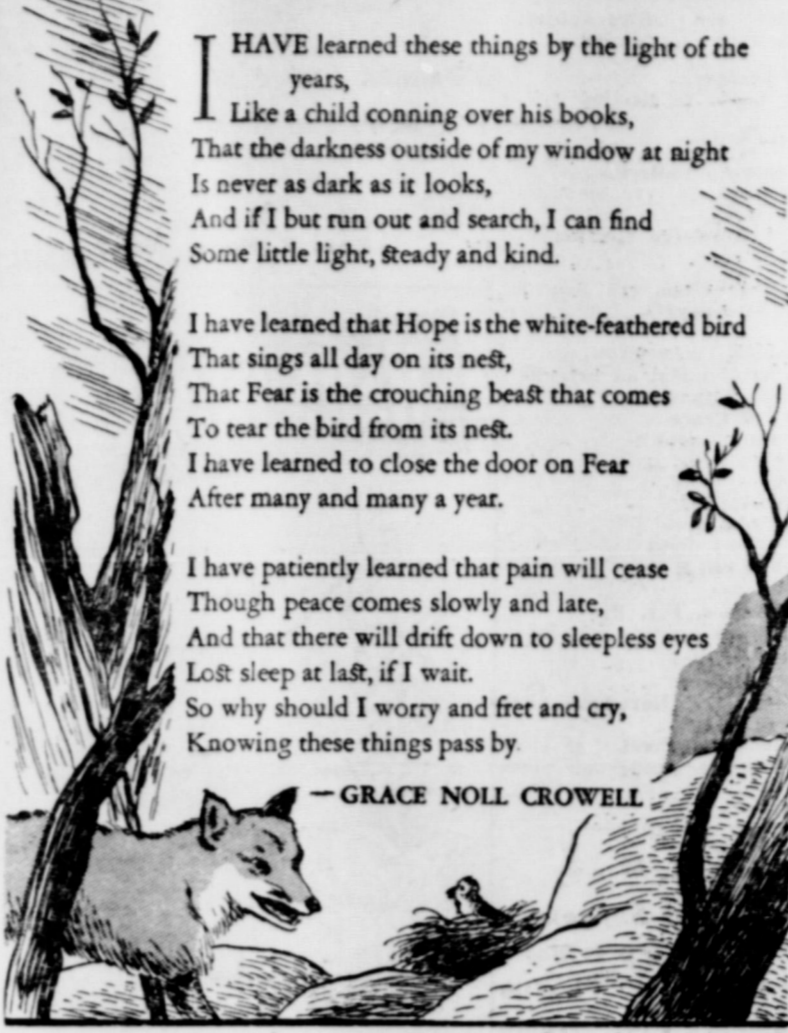

FIRST AID TO THE AILING HOUSE

BY ROGER C. WHITMAN

QUESTION: How would you remove a spot on an office floor about 2x4 feet, caused by dragging feet when spinning in chair from desk to typewriter, without sanding the whole floor? The floor has had a coat of stain and two coats of shellac.

ANSWER: Take off the remains of the shellac by quick wiping with denatured alcohol. Then apply one or two coats of fresh shellac, thinning them down with denatured alcohol, about one-half Feather out the strokes. Do not expect perfect results. If you intend to do over the whole floor at some time, you might consider a penetrating floor wax or penetrating floor seal. These finishes are not apt to show scratches.

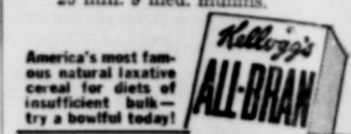

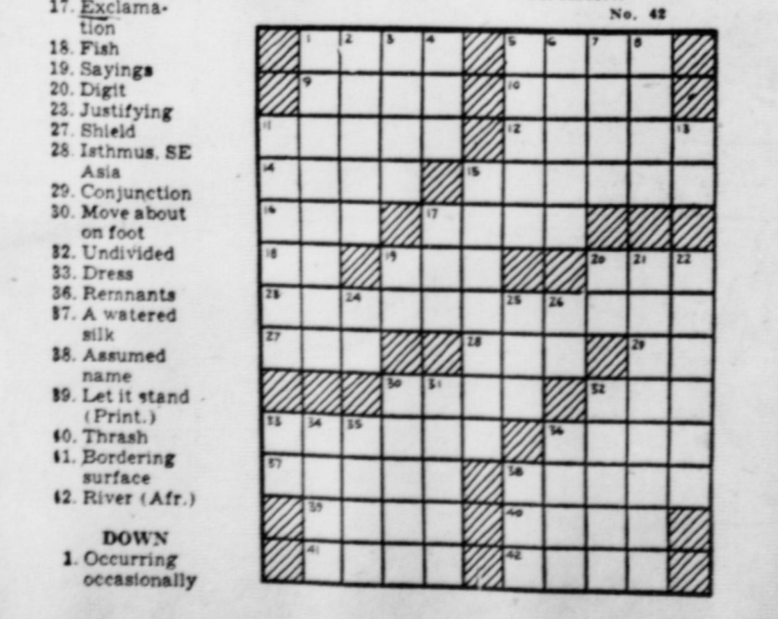

QUESTION: What would you recommend for putting into enamel and paint (gloss or flat) to keep it from showing lap marks?

ANSWER: Follow the manufacturer's instructions for the application of enamel or paint. Streamlining Slowed

IF YOU SHOULD ASK any congressman or senator, or if you should ask any citizen if he is against waste and extravagance in government, it would be like asking him if he is against sin. The answer would invariably be "of course we are against waste in government." But unfortunately, as in the case of sin, even though we are against it we do little or nothing about it.

Which is exactly what the congress is doing in the matter of the recommendations of the report of the Hoover commission for reorganization of the executive branch of the government. While congress only has the authority to reorganize the executive branch, it would appear that first somebody must reorganize congress before that body will act. Somebody must take the bull by the horns and wade in if we are to see any of the recommendations of the Hoover commission go into effect.

President Truman has sent to the congress seven reorganization plans based on the recommendations of the Hoover commission. Some of them have been in congressional pigeonholes for almost a year and yet no public hearings have ever been held on any of those suggested improvements in the federal government set-up.

Up to this time the folks running the Citizens' Committee for the Hoover Report have been using the shotgun method of creating wild public opinion behind their program. In other words they have been pointing out the defects in all the departments of government without pin-pointing in any one department.

Postal Agency Target

Now indications are that they are attempting to focus public opinion on reorganization of the post office department. There are several reasons for this. Everybody uses the post office department and in spite of the many charges of inefficiency, the post office department in the minds of many people is just about the most efficient here in Washington. But admittedly they have some old fashioned methods, upon which improvements might be made. But the Hoover attack, for instance, on the department of agriculture, has riled some farmers.

The proposed reorganization plans for the Veterans' administration has aroused the ire of the American Legion and other veterans' organizations. And so on down the line. But since everybody uses the post office, that department has no single powerful defender, so let's all jump on the postal department.

Last July President Truman sent two bills to congress. One to the house, which seeks to set up a more efficient accounting system and the other a senate measure which would place fourth class postmasters under civil service and thus eliminate the political appointment of these men. But no action, not even hearings on these bills.

Today the postoffice department is audited by the General Accounting Office located in Asheville, North Carolina. The office has about 800 employees and is from eight months to a year behind in its work.

If there is some question in the mind of GAO about the routine report of the postmaster at Oakland, Maryland, for instance, then they write to the Postmaster General, voicing the question. The PG then writes to the PM at Oakland. The PM at Oakland then writes to the PG in Washington in turn passes on the information to the GAO at Asheville and so on and so on.

Avoid Jitters

Remember, you folks in the home towns of the country, this is an election year. Don't get the jitters. Don't let politics, even irresponsible politicians on either side of the fence scare you. There is enough that is real danger in the world today to cause us to stop, look and listen without being stampeded by the speech or statement of some senator or congressman or other politician that this government is being taken over by Communists, that Russia has us hamstrung, that your government is being handed over to subversive interests, that our leaders are a bunch of stupid oafs, that the FBI and J. Edgar Hoover don't know the score.

The facts of the matter are that here in Washington, except for these very irresponsible politicians about whom we have spoken, the consensus from Democrats and Republicans alike is that there is probably no leader in the world today who is more conversant with the facts, who has better advisors and who has his two feet on the ground more solidly than that little man in the White House who has his hands full of problems. His efforts, though seldom 100 per cent liked, have been honest and effective.

They remembered "significantly better" in the relaxed state. Psychiatrists long ago discovered that their patients recall seemingly forgotten feelings and events more easily when physically relaxed, and use "the couch" partly for this reason.

Bond Voyage
PAUL EXPECTED to go to Rome a free man, his ticket (so to speak) reading on through Spain. Actually that was the end of his run. He went there under military guard, prisoner under sentence. The story is all there in Acts, how first he was jailed for protection from a blood-hungry mob, then kept in jail on general principles (which is to say, the governor kept hoping he would pay well for an acquittal), and finally appealed to Rome the highest court of the empire. Appeals were expensive and slow, then as now.

But Paul must have come to look at his imprisonment, false as it was, as a heaven-sent opportunity to make that journey to Rome. It was a gilt-edged accident insurance. Emotions and High Blood Pressure

By Dr. James W. Barton

NOW THAT MOST men and women know that high blood pressure is the commonest cause of heart strokes (coronary thrombosis), and brain stroke (apoplexy), blood pressure is the health subject most frequently discussed when old friends meet one another. One who claims his blood pressure is 200 or more thinks he is a "sicker" individual than one whose blood pressure is only 190.

While high blood pressure is a serious matter if due to organic disease, what physicians are trying to teach their patients is that a high blood pressure at a given time may be down to normal an hour from that time.

A boxer, whom I had examined before his bouts for several years, was driven to a city 250 miles away for a special bout. On the way, the car, in trying to avoid an accident, went into the ditch and rolled completely over. While the boxer was unhurt, his blood pressure was so high that the examining physician, refused to pass him. He pleaded with the physician

World-Wide Church
Lesson for March 26, 1950

GOD WORKS his purposes out in ways that not even the wisest of his servants can foresee. A beautiful example of this is the way Paul went to Rome. Long before he saw that city he wanted to preach there. All roads led to Rome, as they do to all world-capitals, and people went there from everywhere.

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But Paul must have come to look at his imprisonment, false as it was, as a heaven-sent opportunity to make that journey to Rome. It was a gilt-edged accident insurance. Free, he might never escape the plotters and reach Rome alive. Chained, the efficient Roman army would see that he arrived—and he did.

Four pairs of eyes were on him night and day. No plotters could stick him with a dagger or shove him overboard. So—after some hair-breadth escapes to be sure—he was delivered safe and sound in the very city of which he had been dreaming all these years.

The Church at the Hub Of The World
THERE IS NOTHING at all in the New Testament to indicate that the church at Rome was considered, by Paul or any one else, as The Church, or the Mother Church. There is no claim that it was founded by St. Paul, still less by St. Peter.

It grew, as other churches grew, by infiltration. Christians who moved to the big city would get together, and there the church would be. Yet, of course, the Roman church was important.

It was important because it was at the hub of the civilized world. Paul did not seem to mind it in the least, that he could work only inside his prison, or "confined to quarters."

Writing from his jail cell to the Philippians, he mentions converts from the army and from the imperial slaves. ("Caesar's household" in Phil. 4:22 does not refer to the retinue of palace slaves.) We know from the letter to Philemon that Paul converted at least one "jailbird" named Onesimus.

The True Church Is A Marching Church
PAUL KNEW that a soul is a soul, sitting in the emperor's chair or waiting at the emperor's table. God is no respecter of persons. But he also knew that these Christian soldiers would not always stay in Rome; that even Christian slaves would be sold down the river; that the restless feet which brought their owners to Rome would take them away again. Great cities are like that.

Putting down Christianity in Rome was not like putting a single seed into a sheltered corner of the garden. It was like scattering a handful of it to the breeze, to be carried far and wide. Paul's vision is still the vision of the church at its best. The true church marches on, along the high-roads and byroads of the world.

We shall never be content with a narrow, sheltered Christianity. We cannot be satisfied with half-world religion. Only world-Christianity matches the grandeur of the New Testament ideal.
