TAX MEET SET FEB. 7TH

At 7:30 p. m. Friday evening Feb. 7th there will be a public hear ing in the High School Auditorium of the benefits to be derived by voting Senate Bill 116 in the O'Donnell Independent School District.
Voting of this bill will allow certain
tax adjustments without altering
the present valuation of school taxable property.

The School Board has employed Ransom Galaway of Municipal Securities Co. from Lubbock to take care of the leal aspects in the voting of this bill. Mr. Gallaway will be here on the night of February 7 to explain how the bill effects you as a taxpayer and how it will help in providing more money for your schools. He will be here to answer questions concerning all angles of Senate bill 116. This bill has definite advantages over our present method of taxing. These advantages will be discussed at this meeting.

For some time our school board has been aware of the growing neels of our school. The continuous rise in cost of operation; an crease to the 20 percent contribut-ion to the Foundation Program; needed increase in staff and facilities to name only a few. Althou we have been able to meet bills in the past four years, the time is rapidly drawing near when our reserve will be depleted. It is quite possible that this year will throw our books in the red.

Soon our school is to be visited by an accrediting team from the Texas Education Agency in Austin. The purpose of the visit will be to determine whether our school measures up to certain standards required by our state accrediting agency. In the opinion of the superintendent at present our school does not measure up to these high standards. Many schools the size of ours in this area have been visited by this group and some of them placed on the WARNED LIST. This means that one year Ater the school will be again visited and, if improvements are not satisfactory, the school may have its credits taken away. Students from schools not accredited must take college trance examinations.

Last year the O'Donnell schools an average daily attendance of 542 From this attendance we were allot ed 22 classroom teachers with aid from the state in salary payments. We estimate an enrollment of about 625 for the present school year and employed teachers accord infly. At one time our enrollment was 780 pupils this year due large-ly to the transient laborers. These 150 extra pupils caused us to emfour extra teachers this year and payment of these teachers' salaries will have to come largely from our local funds.

At present our teachers are over more teachers to be paid from local frnds to remedy this situation In the past years and during the

present year we have made private contracts with Negro families to bring tseir children in from rural areas. We have also been sending Negro children in grades 7 thru 12 to Lamesa to school by private trans portation. The Texas Education Agency has advised us the beginning of next year year we must own and operate our own transportation for Negro children. The Lamesa schools also advise us that due to crowded conditions they will not be able to take our children in grades 7 and 8 next year. There are two items of urgency in this area. We must provide our own transportation purchase of buses and provide drivers for same and also we must em-ploy additional Negro teachers.

In this article we have attempted to briefly tell you something about Senate Bill 116 and the reasons why we need this bill voted. There are many other needs not mentioned in this article. These needs will be pointed out in our February 7th

Every citizen, whether you have a child in school or not should be present at this meeting. This community will have schools only as good as you are willing to pay for. Let's turn out to this meeting in goodly number and give support to our children, your school board and your faculy.




