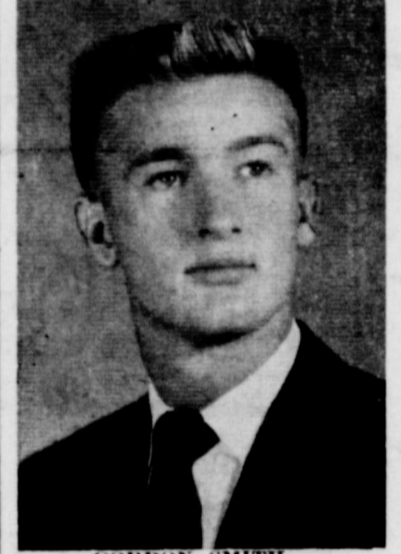
Virginia Sanders served the cake and Mrs. Rains poured the punch from a crystal bowl which was resting on a base entwined with green fern.

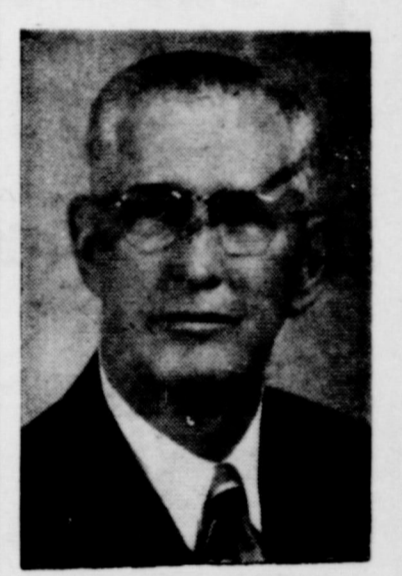

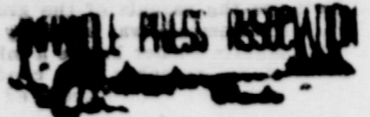

Soldier Goes Home AWOL to Read Bible
GROVE CITY, Pa.—A 23-year-old soldier went AWOL from his army post recently and took refuge in his hometown because he wanted to go to a Bible school.
The men seized him here recently and brought to an end his three-year armed holdout in his home.
Two Federal Bureau of Investigation agents and a military policeman persuaded the soldier to come from the house by posing as newspapermen and asking him to come out and pose for a picture. He left in the house the pistol and gun with which he had said he would resist arrest by shooting or kill.
The youth struggled with the agents for several minutes as his mother harangued the officers. He was overpowered, placed in the agents' automobile and taken away.
The soldier was Allen Keller, blond, soft-spoken boy who left Camp Kilmer, N.J., in an overnight pass.
Keller's mother said the officers who were dressed in civilian clothing, hustled her son into an automobile and drove away. She said she had learned shortly afterward that her son, who believed peace the only solution to the world's woes, may have been planning to kill himself.
She found a note in his clothing, she declared, saying the "laws made by the men in the government and their lack of understanding have caused me much pain and suffering, but forgive them." Mrs. Keller said her son wrote that he wished the note read at his funeral.

Happiness Is By-Product Of Living
CINCINNATI — Happiness is a bonus by-product of life, not a goal, says a University of Cincinnati psychologist.
From the psychological point of view, happiness can be attained by almost anyone, but not by chasing after it, according to Dr. Arthur G. Bills, head of the local university's department of psychology.
How To Be Happy?
For the many people who are perplexed by the question of "how to be happy," the Cincinnati professor points out this business of happiness can be reduced to a set of rules like other scientific problems—subject always to human interpretation.
"The pursuit of pleasure as a goal does not bring happiness, but there is happiness and pleasure in the pursuit of goals that are worthwhile," Dr. Bills states. As examples of chasing the wrong goal, he mentions those "lucky" persons who retire young "to enjoy themselves"—and rarely do.
"Happiness is the state of mind of the person who is in the process of achieving goals which are, to him, worthwhile," he continues. "When goals have been achieved or motives satisfied, we then become bored until we have again started in the pursuit of further goals which are worthwhile to us."
Process, Not Attainment
"It is the process, not the attainment, which gives happiness."
Fields of value enumerated by Dr. Bills are handy points against which a man can test himself. One of them should fit the predominant interests of everyone. These basic values are:
Theoretical: These people feel the greatest value is in science, philosophy, the promotion of better understanding of the universe.
Economic: Persons with this value predominant wish to add to the soundness of the economic structure, their own or the world's.
Aesthetic: As John Keats said, "beauty is truth, truth beauty—and that is all ye know on earth and all ye need to know."
Social: Betterment of oneself or the world, including welfare and community interests are found in this value.
Religion: A value for one to whom the mystical life or sense of oneness with the Creator is of importance.

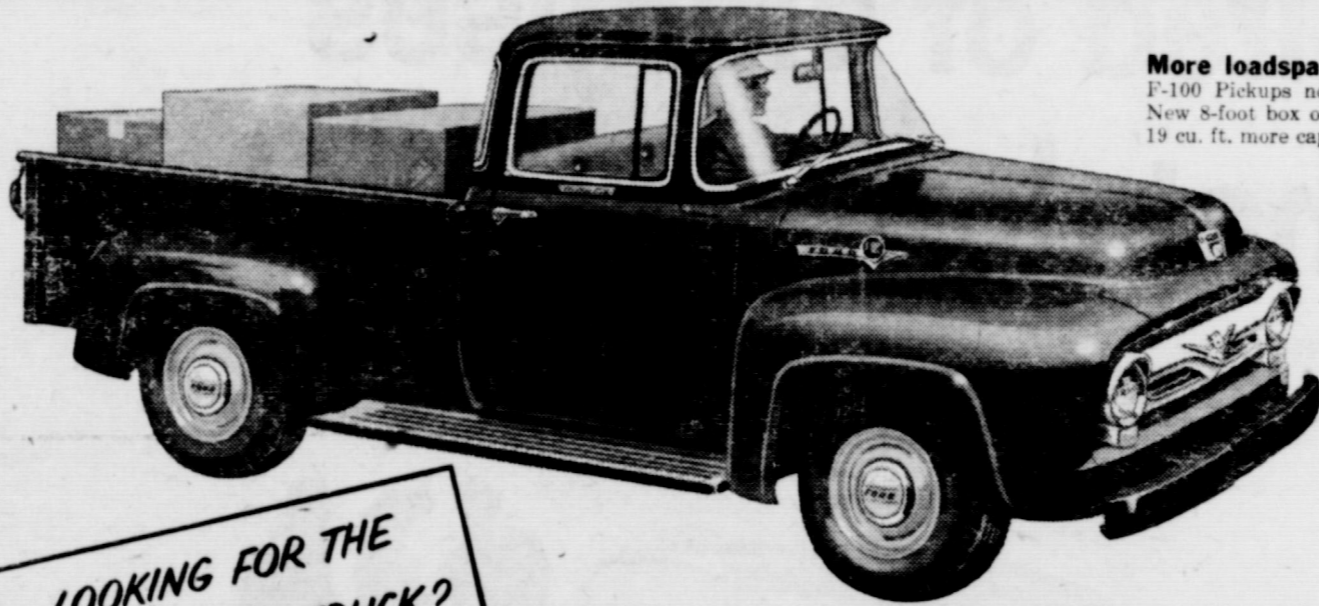

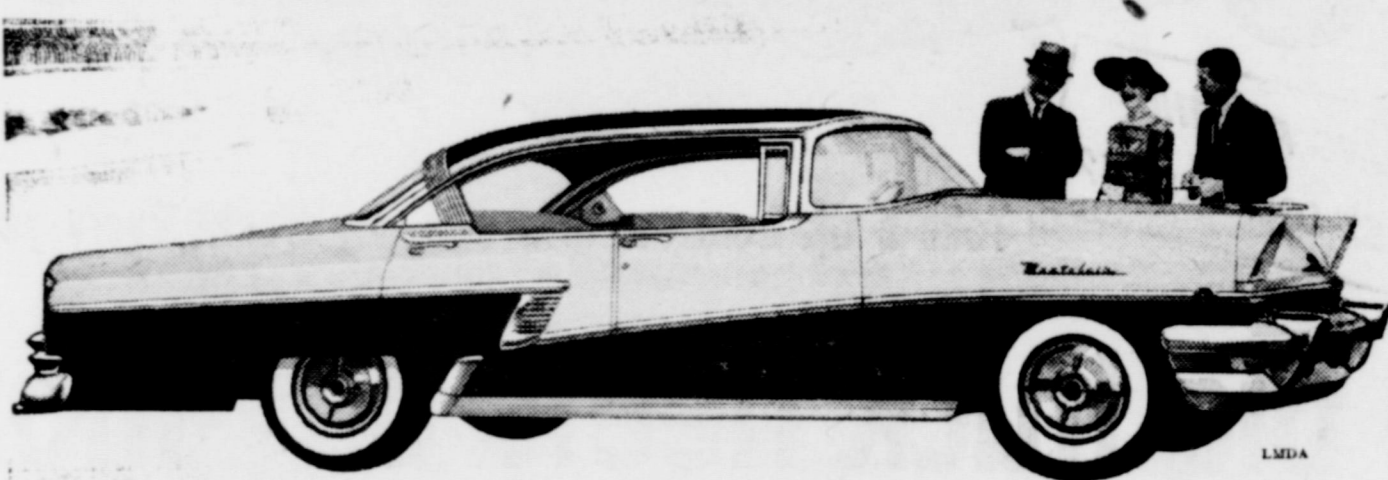

Now, lay out the supply of curlers, hair net and contents of your kit. Read the directions thoroughly. Next, block off the hair in the regular home permanent wave blocking pattern.

While the hair is still damp, start rolling the curls. Set each strand with waving lotion. Slip on end papers and curlers. Once wound, you can forget about the hair for 30 minutes and go to breakfast for the family.

Half an hour later, find your rinsing the curls briefly with water and towel blotting to remove law dripping. Slip a scarf or head until your husband leaves. Substitute a hair net in place.
