### GIVES YOU TEXAS

Here's a first handed bit of his family about Billy the Kid, the famous outlaw as related in the O'Donnell Index Press in 1944:

O'Donnell is blessed with a good number of elderly people; men and women score and ten in years; and three are native Texans who majored in the trails in Texas, making it possible for any of the enjoyments that are ours. Among the number is my good friend, W A Eaker, who next May will be 74 years old.

Mr. Eaker, who was born in Burleson County when the Comanches, Apaches and Texas, recalls many incidents. When he was 10 years old, his father moved to Llano County to the elder Eaker herd of steers overland in the new range, his family and household effects being conveyed in wagons. Arriving in the picturesque Lincoln County, he settled on the Ruidoso, George, well known rancher, being nearest neighbor. A year later he moved to Lincoln, ranching in the Honda.

In 1881 the elder Eaker and Rainbolt sold a bunch of horses to Pete Maxwell of Ft Sumner. They made delivery of the horses one afternoon. Our townsman, W A Eaker, a lad of 12 years, was the chuck wagon on the trip. His father and Rainbolt were told him and the lad who accompanied them on the trip that Sheriff Pat Garrett of Roswell had the noted Billy the Kid that he was at the Pete Maxwell ranch.

Mr. Eaker informs us that they camped in a cottonwood grove on the edge of the little town and the boys were asleep in the wagon when the elders came in with the story of the slaying of the noted gang outlaw. The next day they tended the funeral of Billy the Kid who was buried at Ft Sumner in a plain pine box. The burial was attended, the majority of the crowd being Mexicans among whom Billy had many friends. Before being lowered into the grave, the coffin was opened and all who were given a last look at the young man who had killed 21 men before reaching his majority. Mr. Eaker grew up, returned to Texas and has watched and helped the development of this section of the state. He has resided in the O'Donnell sector for over 30 years and has contributed his share in development. A first cousin of his, Ira Eaker, in command of the Red Air forces in the Mediterranean area, our townsman is well prepared for his years. And why not? When he rode the range there was no Bologna sausage and post parties. They had jerked beef and dough biscuits. There were no radios and every waddle could play. After Punch and Judy shows came along. There wasn't any jitterbugging; the old square dance was very good. Saddle horses carried swains 40 miles to an all night dance and California plaid pants and Hoyt's cologne was just the thing. There wasn't much money in the country but neighbors were

## Work Of Health Depart. Is Defined

Austin, Texas - Socialization has no place in either public health or the private practice of medicine. State Health Officer Geo. Cox has said in a statement aligning himself with the medical profession against socialized medicine. Health is a separate, distinct field from private medicine. Dr. Cox said. Both professions have their separate objectives, and distinctive methods of accomplishing them. He declared public health's objectives to be: 1. Public education as to how to avoid disease by such means as vaccination against smallpox and typhoid fever and immunization against diphtheria. 2. Investigation of disease outbreaks. 3. Quarantine and isolation of communicable disease cases, thus preventing its spread. 4. Inspection of water supplies, and control over the safe production and sale of milk, drugs and food products.

"But," the health officer added, "people get sick and accidents happen, and the job of curing and patching up is the business of the private practitioner of medicine, the family doctor and the specialist."

Doctors in private practice advocate public health principles when the urge mothers to have children protected against diphtheria and smallpox, and public health officials need their help in the vital work of maintaining a high level of well being for all Texans.

"We aren't in competition with doctors in private practice. Public health people deplore the idea of socialized medicine as unworkable, cumbersome and totally inefficient. There is no place on earth that has a better system of medical administration than the United States. Private doctors deserve the credit. And there is no place on earth with a higher standard of public health. Public health people deserve credit for that."

## Dr. Hicks To Speak On Methodist Hour

Dr. Guy M Hicks, pastor First Methodist Church, Shreveport, La., will be the featured speaker on the Methodist Hour, Sunday June 10th. This network radio program is sponsored by the Protestant Radio Conference and is presented by 149 radio stations over the South and Southwest.

Dr. Hicks, speaking on the subject, "God Available Through Prayer", gives specific accounts of God's answer to prayer and the power of prayer. He tells how "Even in Korea we may find God available through prayer as we seek Him together. A young doctor, my own son, gives first aid to his own brother in law, who has been hit by a round of mortar fire. No wonder he writes 'God was nearer to me than ever before in my life'. . . Even in the danger zone of battle God is near to give a young doctor and a young soldier strength to do their jobs."

Featured music on this program will be a medley of prayer hymns "In the Hour of Trial," "I Need Thee Every Hour", and the popular gospel song "I Am Praying For You" sung by the Methodist Hour Choir under the direction of the Rev. Hubert Vance Taylor.

Dr. Hicks, a native of Georgia and educated at Emory and Garrett Biblical Institute with graduate work at Union Seminary in New York, has been a member of the Louisiana Conference of the Methodist Church since 1925 and has been pastor of First Methodist Church in Shreveport, one of the largest churches of that denomination, for the past three years.

The Methodist Hour may be heard over radio station K G N C of Amarillo at 10:15 a m Sunday June 10.

## SOCIAL SECURITY NEW LAWS EXPLAINED

If you work for yourself and are planning to include your name on the quarterly Social Security tax return you will fill for your employees, don't so says John G. Hutton of the Lubbock Social Security office. Hutton says that many businessmen who come under Social Security as self employed are under the impression that they should report their net income quarterly in the same manner that their employees are reported. This assumption is incorrect. A self employed individual comes under Social Security only if the net income from his business is \$600 or more per year. In most cases, it is not possible to determine the amount of net income from a business until the end of the year, since profits in earlier months may be offset by losses occurring later. For that reason the self employed are required to report only once each year. This report will be made at the same time the annual income tax is filed. A form for this purpose will be furnished by the Collector of Internal Revenue along with the income tax forms.

## Freeze Foods Now for Later Use (See Recipes Below)

### Successful Freezing

ONE OF THE MOST satisfactory ways of preserving foods that has come into the limelight recently for home use is that of quick-freezing it. Compared with canning and dehydrating methods, freezing is easy.

There are, however, many misconceptions regarding the process of freezing and storing them in home freezer or locker, and one of the main ones is that you simply have to wash the food and store it.

Five essentials are necessary to the successful freezing of fruits, vegetables, poultry and meat. The variety used must be good for freezing; fruits and vegetables must have reached a certain degree of maturity, for like any other preserving process, freezing only keeps food until it's used and does not improve it.

Preparation for packaging must be done carefully, and proper packaging should be used to prevent a common ailment of frozen foods, namely, that of freezer burn. Storage must be at the recommended temperature 0°f., or below.

Equipment for freezing naturally includes a locker or a freezer to which you have ready access. If you rent a locker, then freeze only enough foods to fit into the refrigerator before you can take them to the locker. This must be within 24 hours of their packaging.

### High Flavor, Color Gives Good Frozen Product

Generally speaking, in the matter of fruits and vegetables, those with high color and excellent flavor should be used for freezing.

Those who freeze foods have already run into the term "optimum maturity." This means that fruits and vegetables suited for freezing should have reached their peak of ripeness to be ready for the freezer. Fruits and vegetables at this stage are sweetest, full of flavor and ripe. This is the flavor and appearance which you want to preserve.

Get fruits and vegetables into the freezer right after picking, if it's at all possible. If you wait for too long after picking or harvesting, the produce loses flavor and deteriorates in texture.

### Check These Varieties For Vegetables

If you're planning to freeze any of the following vegetables, check varieties to get the best results. In asparagus, for example, you'll find that both Mary Washington and Martha Washington rate high. The Dwarf Improved and Long Island Improved varieties of Brussels Sprouts are considered good.

Fordhook lima beans retain superior color and flavor when frozen, and so do the Kentucky Wonder green snap beans.

Italian green sprouting broccoli is superior because of its fresh flavor and color for freezing purposes, while the Thomas Laxton and Dark Podded Thomas Laxton peas give a superior frozen product.

Savoy type spinach is recommended for those freezing this vegetable in the Eastern part of the

Keep the flavor intact in these tender asparagus spears. Don't scrape, just brush it. Break, don't cut and tie with a string. Cook with the heads up, then served with browned butter and bread crumbs.

country. For those living West, broad leaf spinach gives the best results.

### Always Blanch Vegetables For Freezing

Prepare vegetables for freezing by washing them thoroughly. If you desire a uniform pack, try to sort them according to size as they are washed.

Scalding or blanching of vegetables should never be omitted in preparing vegetables for freezer use. Scalding retards enzymatic action and stops deterioration. It improves color and saves vitamins, and also softens the vegetable making packing easier. Scald a pound or so at a time, using steam preferably, or plunging the vegetable into hot water. Five minutes by steam is used for most vegetables except greens such as spinach which require only 2½ minutes and green peas which need 3 minutes.

Place the vegetable in water and ice until thoroughly cooled, then drain on a tray with absorbent paper or toweling. Package at once and refrigerate.

Only moisture and vapor-proof packages should be used for any type of freezing. The liners should be used only once although the carton may be re-used. Leave head space in all cartons as food always expands during freezing.

### Use Syrup for Fruits To Be Used For Sauce

If you're putting apples into sauce for freezing, use Baldwin, Greening, Northern Spy or Yellow Transparent varieties; for pie, use any high acid variety. In blueberries, use any small seeded variety.

Montmorency is a good variety in the sour red cherries, while in peaches of the yellow type, Hale Haven and J. H. Hale are excellent. For white peaches, choose Golden Jubilee or Georgia Belle. Any type pineapple is good.

Wash fruit carefully, but do not allow it to soak. Drain thoroughly on absorbent cloth or paper, and let stand in refrigerator, if possible, to permit fruit to become firm for packaging.

Stem and seed berries. Peel fruits such as apricots, apples, peaches and pears but place immediately after peeling into a solution made of one gallon of cold water with 3 tablespoons lemon juice, or 4½ teaspoons citric acid to a gallon of water to prevent discoloration. Let remain only a minute, then drain.

If using dry sugar, as for whole fruit, sift sugar with a flour sifter, right into the package. The minimum amount to use for freezing is one part sugar to eight parts of fruit. More may be added when fruit is thawed. Seal, label and freeze package at once.

To make medium syrup for fruit, use 1 cup sugar to 2 cups water. Cook for 5 minutes and let cool before using.

Those summer fruits and berries make wonderful fritters, and are tasty for dessert served with honey sauce. Make the sauce by cooking together a cup of honey with two tablespoons of heavy cream, the juice of a lemon and two tablespoons of butter.

Fry plenty of chicken next time you're making it, and serve the other half chilled well the following day. Put on the plate with cold, sliced tomatoes, black olives and bread, butter and lettuce sandwiches.

### PREPARING TO LAY ASPHALT FILES

## Committee's Proposed Tax Increase Hits Lower Income Groups Hardest

**TAXES ON THE LOCAL LEVEL**—By July 1, or shortly thereafter, the man on Main Street is going to find himself subject to increased individual income taxes if the house ways and means committee's proposals are carried out.

The committee voted to increase income taxes \$2,950,000,000 a year. This increase would raise taxes in every bracket by 3 percentage points.

### In The News



Defense Secretary Marshall (top picture) continued to be of top interest in the nation's press as he told senators the home-towners don't want to expand the war in Korea. Economic Stabilizer Eric Johnston (center) was in the news again with demands for extension of economic controls. Donald Dawson (lower picture) made front pages by swearing he never used pressure on RFC directors.

For instance, a single man with a net income of \$2,000 a year would pay \$322 in taxes instead of \$280. This would be an increase from 20 per cent to 23 per cent. In the second bracket (\$2,000 to \$4,000), the tax would go up from 22 to 25 per cent, and in the third bracket (\$4,000 to \$6,000), from 26 to 29 per cent.

In general, the increase in each person's tax would be about the same as the jump which took place under the first war-tax bill passed last year. This proposed taxation is tentative, however, and subject to possible changes by the house, the senate finance committee, and the full senate. But it is an indication of approximately what the small-towner can expect before the summer is over.

**WHAT DOES AMERICA THINK?**—From the time this nation was founded politicians have tried to keep in close contact with the home towns in an effort to know and understand what the average man is thinking. Very few of them, however, have succeeded.

With this in mind, Secretary of Defense Marshall made a bold statement during his testimony on the MacArthur-Truman controversy when he asserted the American people will stand with the administration on military policy in Korea.

Marshall believes the average home-towner has no desire to expand the war in Asia. He believes the American people "are on the side that the defense department, the joint chiefs of staff, and the civilian authority of the government favor."

This side, Marshall asserted, involved a settled conviction that the present policy of limited commitment of force in Korea must go on.

**TEAM WORK**—The first thing the American youngster learns, whether he is a city boy or a small town one, is that he has to be a member of the team. To play with the other kids he must cooperate. Americans carry this lesson with them through life.

It was with some relief, therefore, that home-towners heard the news that those free nations who have been trading with Communist China had finally agreed it was time to start playing with the home team and to cut off that trade completely.

Britain, dollar and dollar hungry, was possibly the worst offender. It could be that the senate vote to cut off economic aid to any nation which permits its citizens to trade with Communist areas had much to do with the sudden spurge of cooperation.

**FOR HUNGRY BEEF EATERS**—In an action entirely independent of the recent projected general rollback on beef prices scheduled by October 1, the government unexpectedly slashed approximately 12 cents a pound off ceiling prices of some chuck steaks and pot roasts. For the hungry beef eaters of the nation it was a welcome surprise. It is not likely to make relations between the administration and the nation's beef producers, packers and distributors any cosier, however.

After four full months, the 82nd congress has enacted only 28 public laws, a recent check revealed. None of the major platform planks on which Truman won election for a second term have been approved. Of 37 specific legislative recommendations by the President, only three have become effective as a result of congressional action since January. And two of them affect only soldiers or veterans of the war in Korea.

### FROM COW TO CAN

## New Milk Canning Process Is Reported

A new cow-to-can process that produces milk that tastes like bottled milk, but which can be shipped long distances without spoiling is being used by a dairy in East Stanswood, Wash., and being sent to Alaska, Japan and the armed forces.

The process was invented by Dr. Roy B. Graves, 64-year-old research scientist. Since March 30, 2,000 gal-

lons of milk have been canned daily.

The milk is never exposed to air. The canning is done in a bacteria-free atmosphere of steam. It differs from the standard pasteurization process in the amount of heat used.

In the new process the milk is exposed to 278-degree heat for only eight seconds, the 64-year-old scientist reported.

## JET INJECTIONS

## Future Draftees May Get Shots By High-Pressure Jet Apparatus

The plight of auto mechanics and others who work near hydraulic oil lines may have led to an invention that will be hailed by a great many United States army soldiers who face enemy gunfire unflinchingly, but who quail at the sight of a hypodermic needle.

This new device, now in the advanced experimental stages in the U.S. army medical service graduate school in Washington, D.C., is a multiple dose high-pressure injection apparatus which is shaped much like a pistol, and may be used in the future for rapidly inoculating groups of people with shots of vaccines, antibiotics, insulin and others.

Research has not yet revealed who first thought of using a high pressure jet to force medicaments through the skin, but Dr. Joel Warren, of Washington, D.C., chief of virus research at the army school, believes that automotive lubricants accidentally forced by pressure into mechanics' subcutaneous tissues probably first prompted the inspiration.

It was noted that fine jets of oil at high velocity, as from a leaking hydraulic line, could penetrate human skin and leave little or no mark. If this phenomena could be applied to inoculations, it was reasoned that besides doing away with the pain and psychological hazard of the unpopular hypodermic needle, jet injection would have several other important advantages:

1. With a multiple dose apparatus, large numbers of people could be given protective vaccines or medication in a short time. This consideration is particularly applicable to civilian defense efforts

in the event of atomic bombings or other disasters affecting entire communities.

2. In using hypodermic needles to inoculate large cross-sections of any community, there would be some danger of transmitting infections. Because the jet nozzle does not penetrate the tissues as the needle does, this danger is eliminated.

3. No special training is required for giving inoculations by the jet method.

4. When produced in quantity, jet injection apparatus will be relatively inexpensive.

It was some of these considerations, Doctor Warren believes, that prompted a diesel engineer named Lockhart to patent in 1946 the first instrument especially designed for parenteral jet injection.

The R. B. Scherer Corporation of Detroit, Michigan, developed Lockhart's device and arranged for anatomical and other studies with his "gun," the Hypo-Spray, a hand-cocking, single-shot instrument.

This first excursion into the field of jet inoculations was field tested for the United States army by Dr. Herbert Batson and Captain Robert Wall.

They found that the principle of jet injection was feasible for administering bacterial vaccines. The Hypo-Spray, they found, would do all that the hypodermic needle could do in this line, and do it without the possibility of cross-infection and virtually without pain.

While the automatic-loading jet "gun" is not yet ready for general Army use because of several minor engineering details which still remain to be worked out, it is already clear, according to Doctor Warren, that administration of vaccines, such as those for typhoid, typhus, tetanus, and diphtheria, antibiotics, such as penicillin and insulin, and other biologicals, is both feasible and highly desirable.

Those who volunteered for demonstration shots were dubious at first, but as the tests proceeded, eagerly began to ask:

"When can we get all our shots this way?"

There are some disadvantages to the jet method. One of these is the occasional failure of the jet to penetrate the skin when it is particularly thick, or is subsurfaced with layers of intradermal fat. A control that will enable the operator to vary the pressure within limits according to the individual being inoculated is being worked out.

The jet injection method applies only to subcutaneous and intradermal medication; intravenous injections cannot be given in this way. Nor is the "gun" designed to handle highly viscous material such as oil suspensions.

## How Will the Future Decide MacArthur Question?

**THE AMERICAN PEOPLE** have thoroughly demonstrated their appreciation of and belief in the abilities of General of the Army Douglas MacArthur. By their tremendous demonstrations they have expressed their love and gratitude for the services he has rendered for the nation. Unofficially, that includes the senators and representatives in congress. They, too, rendered their unqualified homage to a great man and their belief in his announced policies, when the general addressed their joint session.

Now there remains the official congressional verdict. Will that verdict, if and when it is rendered, support the President and his unpopular secretaries of state and defense, or will it support the judgement of the man in whom the people have so enthusiastically expressed their confidence and appreciation? At the time this is written, I need only one guess as to what the result will be.

There will be no definite verdict. Congress will constitute a hung jury, regardless of the wishes of the people. Congress, as such, is a partisan political organization.

A bare majority in both houses, senate and house, represents the party of the President, and the decidedly unpopular secretaries of state and defense whom the President appointed, and whom he refused to fire.

That bare majority of the President's party, controlling both senate and house, cannot afford to repudiate the leader of their party, nor will they censure or vote a lack of confidence in the members of his cabinet whom the people have so definitely denounced.

When it is all over, and Congress has had its official say, we will be right where it all started. Except Douglas MacArthur will know as definitely as wild enthusiasm across the nation can express the attitude of the people of the nation, just where he stands in the hearts of the American people. No action, or lack of action, on the part of congress can take that away from him. The President may, if he wishes, accept such a stalemate as a victory for his policies and those of his secretaries of state, and defense, rather than as a vote of partisan political expediency.

Such is the way of partisan politics in our United States. Such is the way of our republic of the people who are in control of the government at all times. The only way we can express our displeasure with a President, once he is elected, is to impeach him if he does something that goes beyond his constitutional authority.

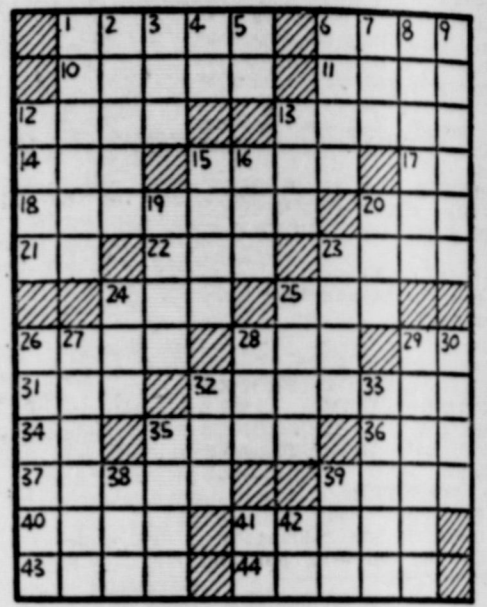
