Handle your seed more carefully during harvesting and processing and you will have better plants. Make sure that all conditions of harvesting are the best and run your combine at a slower speed than used for grain. Be careful about the chemicals that you place on them and contact your county agent about the safe ones to use.

It is time to think about next year's cotton planting seed, says Fred C. Elliott, extension cotton specialist. Cotton planting seed should be stored only in bins which have been cleaned thoroughly and regular checks should be made to see that insect pests don't move in.

Harvest Is Slow

A roundup of local gins we go to press showed only 1475 bales being ginned here compared to 9,250 bales ginned this time last year.

The bulk of the crop is being held until a killing freeze and the cotton "dries" for machine harvesting. Peak ginning is not expected before early December and is expected to be completed within six weeks. Grain harvesting is estimated at 85 percent complete.

Retail business here to date has been far below that of last year at the same time. Much of the native labor has left and fewer than 300 Mexican Nationals are in the trade area compared to some 3,000 for this time last year. A factor decreasing the number nationals has been the Federal Government ruling of a minimum of 70 cents per hour. Prevailing wage rate is \$2 per hundred delivered to the gin or \$1.75 net to the puller.

Implement dealers here have been doing a brisk business in cotton strippers and repairs to old strippers. Cotton picking machines are used to a limited extent in the area.

"PACKAGE" HOSPITALS ARE A DEFENSE MEASURE

Texas has 90 "packaged" hospitals on hand, ready for almost instant use following enemy action or a major natural disaster. Most of them are located at least 15 miles from assumed strategic target areas.

The hospitals, costing \$21,000 apiece, were provided by the Federal Office of Civil and Defense Mobilization as part of a nationwide stockpile program. They are administered in Texas by the Office of Defense and Disaster Relief, with technical cooperation from the Texas State Department of Health.

Outgrowths of the mobile army hospitals developed and tested during the Korean War, they can be completely installed by 40 people in four hours. In one test exercise an installation was made in 70 minutes by experienced personnel. Local defense organizations in designated locations store and otherwise manage the hospitals and equipment. Emergency conditions such as the Cuban crisis are occasions for making sure the hospitals are in a high state of readiness. Each unit, already crated for instant shipment into stricken areas, is a complete 200 bed affair with facilities for three operating rooms, a pharmacy, x-ray service, clinical laboratory, sterilizing room, central supply room and electrical power supply.

Eagle QB Fen Taylor dived from the one capping a 47 yard drive in the second period. Tailback Fernando Lopez set up the TD with a 35 yard pass interception and kicked the extra point. Eagle guard Coy Mahurin brought down the Bulldog quarterback, Steve Green, in the end zone for a 2-point safety in the 3rd quarter. That ended the scoring but the two rivals battled furiously to the last play. Most of the play was in mid-field. The Eagles picked up 232 yards on the ground and none passing. Tahoka rushed for 107 yds. and had 62 yards passing.

Early Mailing Urged

The O'Donnell Post Office expressed its thanks to all for the fine cooperation during the year - especially last Christmas. The Office has several helpful hints about holiday mailing this year.

From Nov. 1 to Nov. 20th overseas shipments to Armed Forces should be completed. These parcels should contain a list of contents plus the address and your return address. Parcels and cards for distant states should be mailed no later than Dec. 10th to be delivered on time.

The use of 4c postage stamp on Christmas cards may contain written matter plus the priority of forwarding without additional charges. The use of a special delivery stamp will effect delivery on Christmas Day. The Post Office has issued a new 4c Christmas stamp that you may wish to place on your Christmas cards. The importance of a legible address is important since there was a heavy volume of Christmas mail in 1961 undelivered.

Your Post Office has had a number of inquiries about the new postal rates which will not go into effect until Jan 7th.

Fish Chowder Is Good 'Chow'


FOR A FAMILY SUPPER ON SUNDAY NIGHT . . . or any other night . . . a big bowl of Cod and Vegetable chowder is hard to beat. Here's one to stick to the ribs, its principal ingredients Birds Eye frozen cod filets and mixed garden vegetables and of course plenty of hot, heartening milk and cream. With a mixed salad and toasted English muffins this is a meal to remember.

COD AND VEGETABLE CHOWDER

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
- 1/2 cup finely chopped celery
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 2 1/2 teaspoons salt
- Dash of pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon thyme
- 1/2 cup water
- 4 cups milk
- 1 package (12 ounces) quick-frozen cod filets
- 1 package (10 ounces) quick-frozen mixed garden vegetables
- 1 cup light cream

Melt butter in large saucepan. Add onion and celery and saute until onion is transparent. Add flour, salt, pepper, and thyme; blend well. Gradually stir in water and milk. Cut fish filets in half. Add to milk mixture along with the mixed vegetables. Bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Then reduce heat and simmer 10 minutes, stirring occasionally to break up the fish. Just before serving, stir in cream and heat thoroughly. Makes 8 1/2 cups, enough for 8 servings, about 1 cup each or 12 servings, about 1/2 cup each.

Note: For a richer chowder, reduce milk to 2 1/2 cups, increase cream to 2 cups, and reduce salt to 2 teaspoons.

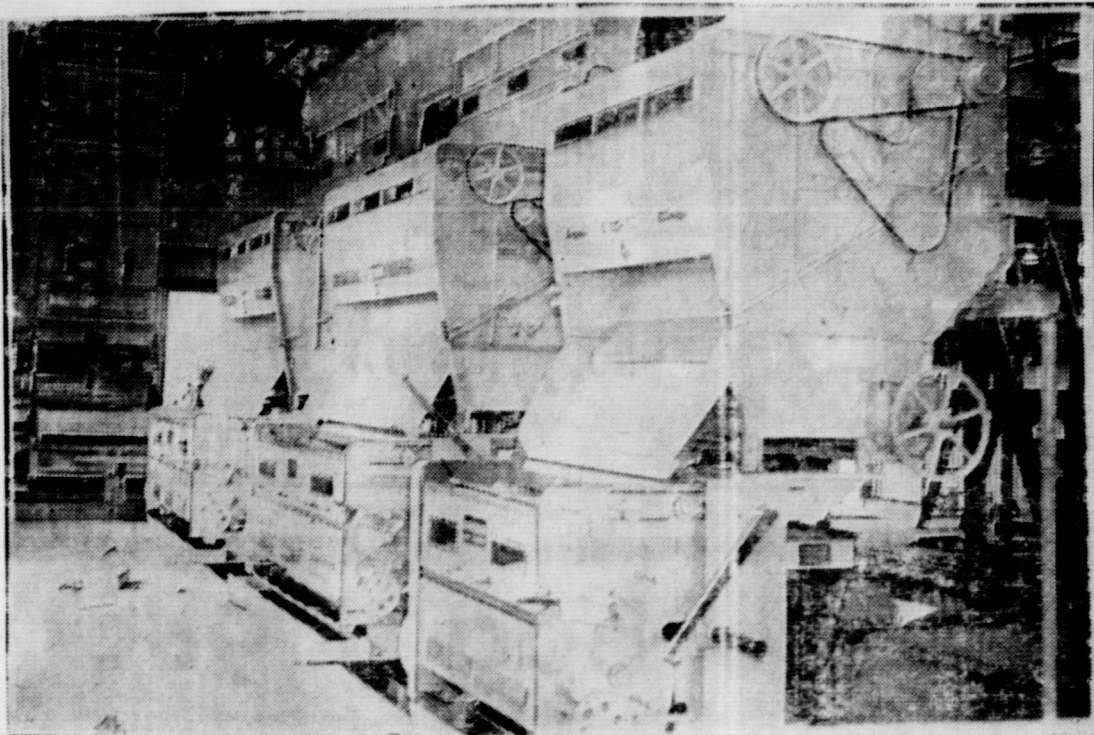

CAMERA CORNER

CAMERA TAKES PICTURES THAT TALK

The experience of having a new dimension-direct sound-in your 8mm home movies is in itself a wonderful thing. The actual voices of the family-older and younger members, added to their likenesses, in interesting situations, in full color, can only prove more valuable as time goes by and changes take place. This is something which all the resources of Hollywood cannot match.

The ease in which quality sound films can be made with the Fairchild Cinephonic-Eight is not only a credit to Fairchild engineers but has lifted 8mm motion pictures above the usual level of "home movies" and made them a serious contender for the professional field. Yet you need not be an expert to make good movies.

This single-system, self-contained, sound-on-film camera possesses qualities which professionals have long dreamed about but have never previously been able to obtain. On location, professionals must lug loads of heavy equipment. The Fairchild camera is compact, light-weight and everything is self-contained. "Single-system" sound-on-film refers to a camera that records the sound on the same film and at the same instant as the picture is being photographed. With this system "lip-synch", that is where the voice matches the performers lip movements, is positive.

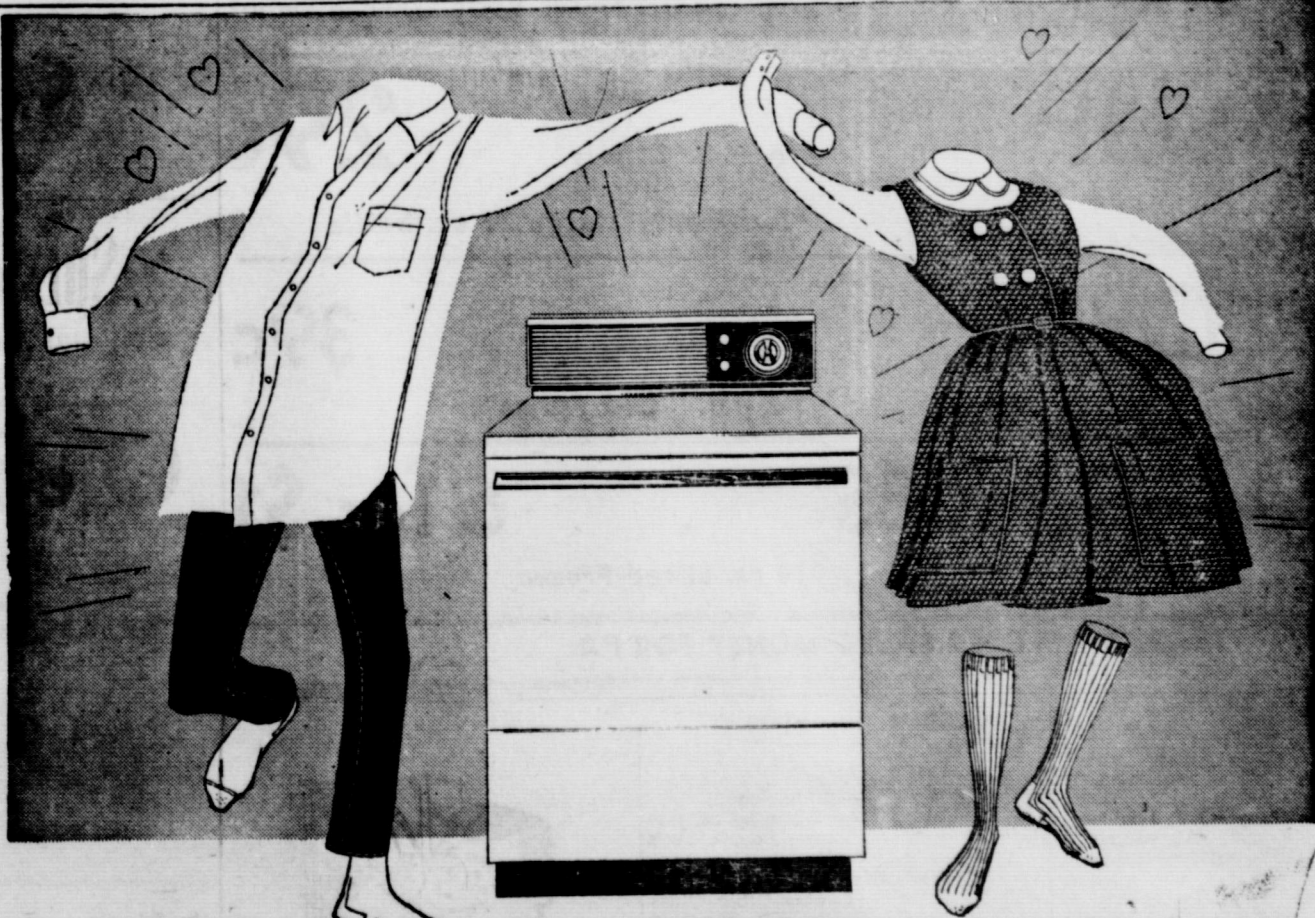
You'll find these hints useful when operating your Cinephonic-Eight. Try to include a vari-focal lens. Then you can change camera angle and "dolly" into and out of the scene without moving or halting the camera, economizing on film.

Every time you shoot a scene you should allow a couple of seconds to elapse before any wanted sound is recorded. Have a similar silent period at the end of the "take". This will aid future editing.

In every shot, keep the microphone as close to the subject as possible. When you are filming outdoors, drape a thin sock over the mike to help cut out wind noise. Microphone placement with regard to the camera is very important but because the new Fairchild camera is "self-blinded" the microphone will not pick up camera noise as long as it is kept facing away from it and at least three feet away.

Lighting for sound films is a bit more difficult than usual-because you are shooting at a faster frames-per-second rate. The roll of double-run film contains 54 feet. Allowing two feet of leader and two feet of trailer, at 24 frames per second the 50 feet will last two and three quarter minutes per side. Extra precaution must be taken to keep the sensitized film away from magnets or any other strong electromagnetic field, such as a loudspeaker or power transformer.

Every amateur should remember that the making of successful sound films requires some pre-planning and rehearsal. Many people, when surprised by a sound-on-film camera and asked to say something, simply freeze and find themselves at a loss for words. Meanwhile, the magnetically stripped color film is running through your Cinephonic-Eight at the rate of fifteen feet per minute! Rehearsals will help you economize on film costs.
