Individual farming programs have been the topic of discussion in the women class of vocational agriculture at O'Donnell High School during the past week.

To take vocational agriculture, a student must have a farming program. The farming program is a long-time program of coordinating farming activities of educational value carried on by the boy studying vocational agriculture and supervised by his parents and his instructor.

Since the farming program is a long-time operation, much time must be spent by freshmen students planning their individual programs. Such planning results in good farming programs. These programs then provide the basis upon which most of the instruction in vocational agriculture is conducted. Real problems are presented. This adds much interest and meaning for the students.

Detailed planning may include such things as ways of producing a crop or livestock project, financing the project, rental agreements between the boy and the person from whom he rents, and ways of marketing his product.

Students, in studying and discussing farming programs, have found that such programs afford several opportunities. An opportunity for the student to earn money is one important advantage. Money made on these programs may then be used by the student to pay for his schooling, or to increase his farming operations.

Students are given definite responsibilities. These projects, which are planned and managed by the student, afford an opportunity for the student to develop his managerial and farming abilities.

Many students in VAI class, according to Mr. James W. Reed, teacher of vocational agriculture, have planned programs for next year. Billy Russ has already made plans for next year. He plans to have 2 lambs, 5 acres of cotton, 5 acres of grain.

Sammy Anderson plans to have Duroc barrows, 1 South Down lamb, 1 Hampshire lamb. He will show the above animals at Dallas.

He plans to have 3 Duroc barrows, 3 South Down lambs, 3 Hampshire lambs. He will show these animals at the local shows and the Lubbock show.



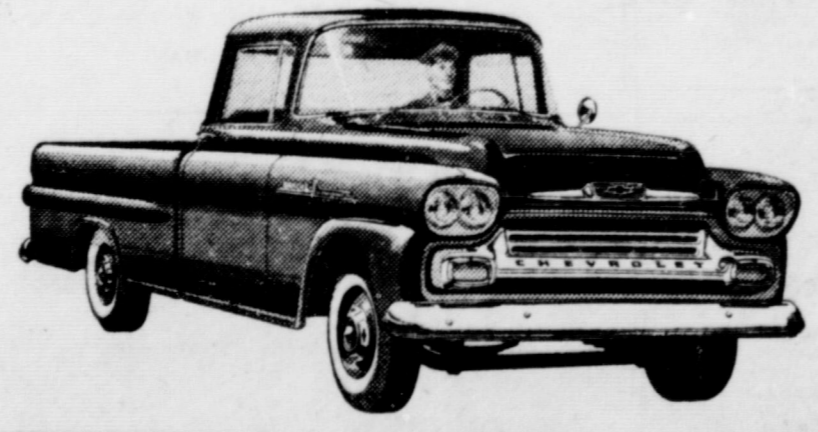
