NEW SOCIAL SECURITY RULES ARE GIVEN

Beginning in 1959 up to \$4800 of a worker's yearly earnings may be credited to his social security account. In making this announcement today, John G. Hutton, District Manager of the Lubbock social security office stated that this higher amount will result in increased benefits in years to come.

"Make sure that your employer doesn't stop taking out social security taxes when you earn more than \$4200 in the coming year," Hutton cautioned. "These were the top earnings on which a worker paid social security taxes in 1958 but the new limit is \$4800". Self-employed persons were also notified that the new maximum applies to them as well as to those who work for someone else. Since the self-employed pay their own social security taxes, they should make sure that for 1959 they pay on all earnings up to \$4800. (The 1958 tax return which is due by April 15, 1959, however, should not show social security earnings of more than \$4200.)

Hutton noted that the level of wages in the past few years has risen and that this new maximum amount that can be credited to social security accounts reflects this rise.

STATE MUST BUILD MOST OF HIGHWAYS

Austin — "Texans must not feel that Uncle Sam is going to solve all our highway needs with federal money. Texans still have a tremendous responsibility in solving their own traffic needs." These words of warning came from Marshall Formby, Chairman of the State Highway Commission.

Formby stated that two many people in Texas, after reading about the high amount of money which the federal government is going to spend on the interstate system of highways, believe that all Texas highway needs are solved.

"The 3,033 miles of interstate highway in Texas, when completed, will carry only about 16 percent, certainly never more than 20 percent of our Texas traffic. It is up to Texans to work out our own solution for this other 80 to 84 percent of traffic". Formby explained that the biggest problem in Texas highways is the 26,000 mile "primary" system which links most of state's major cities and towns.

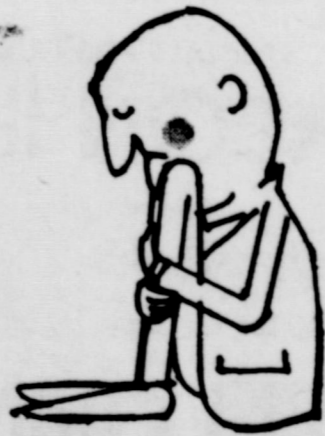
