FALSE CLAIMANTS TO BE PROSECUTED
"Beginning immediately we will file criminal charges against claimants who make false statements to secure unemployment compensation," B. H. Thomson, District Supervising Examiner, said today as he served notice of the tightened enforcement of the fraud provisions of the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act.

Mr. Thomson said that he had received order today from Orville S. Carpenter, Executive Director of the Texas Commission.
"We will file criminal charges against any individual guilty of misrepresentation or non-disclosure of any fact resulting in payment of jobless benefits when such benefits are not due him," the Supervisor declared.

Executive Director Carpenter stated that the Texas Commission would be increasing in its efforts to uncover cases of misrepresentation. He informed Thomson that no exceptions were to be made and that charges were to be filed in every instance.

Notice will be given every unemployed individual claiming benefits of the provision of the Texas Act

for filing of criminal charges in cases of misrepresentation or non-disclosure.
"Failure to report pertinent facts is a positive violation of the Law, and prosecutions will be instigated immediately," Thomson said.
The supervisor advised claimants to report all their earnings while filing claims, to report any part-time or self-employment, to disclose receipt of Workmen's Compensation insurance, old age benefits, old age assistance, wages in lieu of notice, and vacation pay. Also, they should reveal and fact having a bearing on their availability for work or their ability to work.

THE "TAX RACKET"

A recent survey, reported to be among the most accurate ever made, concerned the proportion of income paid in taxes by a typical workman earning \$30 a week. The survey found that \$4 of this modest wage went to the tax collector.

That \$4 was not paid directly, of course—it is probable that the average worker doesn't know he is taxed at all. He isn't concerned with income tax blanks and the other

myriad and involved tax reports required by government of those in higher income brackets. His \$4 was paid indirectly, throughout the entire week. High taxes make a loaf of bread cost a penny more than it would otherwise, a pair of shoes cost fifty cents more, a ticket to a movie a dime more, the monthly electric bill sixty cents more. So it goes, down the endless list of purchases and payments we all make. The tax collector is always a year (about—a highly expensive if unseasoned) companion.

And here is the living proof of the fact that the real burden of taxation falls more heavily on the man of small means than the man of large. Four dollars a week taken out of a \$20 paycheck means that this typical worker's family must go without needed clothes, medical attention, entertainment, etc. It means less money for insurance or savings. It means poorer housing, poorer meals.

We've heard much of that proportion of the population which is "ill fed, ill housed, and ill clothed." What we don't hear often enough is that the burden of debt and taxation is largely responsible for that, and in two ways. First, it takes a percentage of the small wage earner's income which he obviously cannot afford if he is to maintain a decent standard of living. Second, it deprives him of jobs and opportuni-

New License Plates To Be Gold and Black

Austin, Texas, April 29—The State Highway Commission announced today that the order for 1941 License Plates has been placed with the State Prison System which manufactures the plates according to specifications prepared by the Highway Department.

Passenger car plates will be black with numerals of gold. Truck and other series of plates will be the reverse, gold with numerals of black. These color combinations were selected because of high visibility and proven durability.

The manufacture and distribution of three and a half million plates is a job of considerable magnitude, requiring careful preparation and constant inspection.
