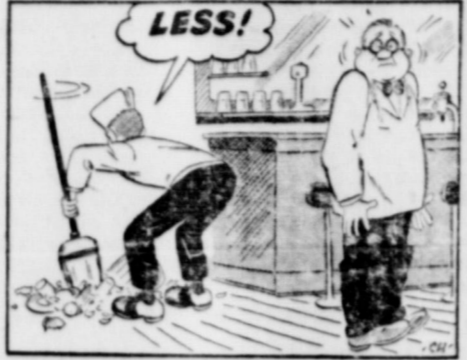

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Clean copper-bottom utensils easily by rubbing them with a cut lemon dipped in salt.

Wet colored garments, if wrapped in wax paper, can't discolor other damp clothing in the laundry basket.

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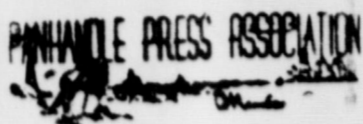

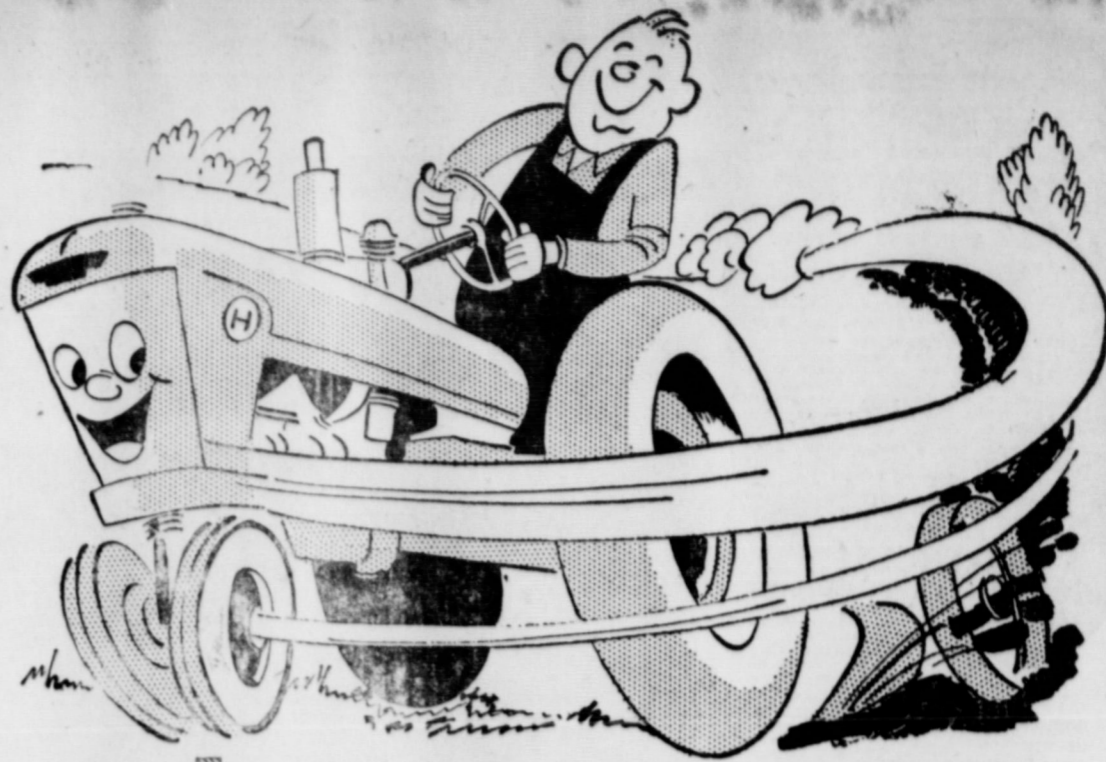

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Safety Shield May End Power Line Accidents

It is beginning to appear that the end of power line accidents may be approaching faster than anyone believed, for manufacturers of farm equipment are now producing power line safety shields that cannot be removed when the shaft is in operation.

These shields may be opened for servicing and inspection of the power shaft, but they cannot be removed unless the operator goes to work on them with a blowtorch or a chisel—and nobody expects that to happen.

For many years the manufacturers of farm machinery have been providing shields for power lines, but many farmers have failed to place the standard shield in place despite the fact that rapidly-revolving power take-off shafts are a never-present hazard.

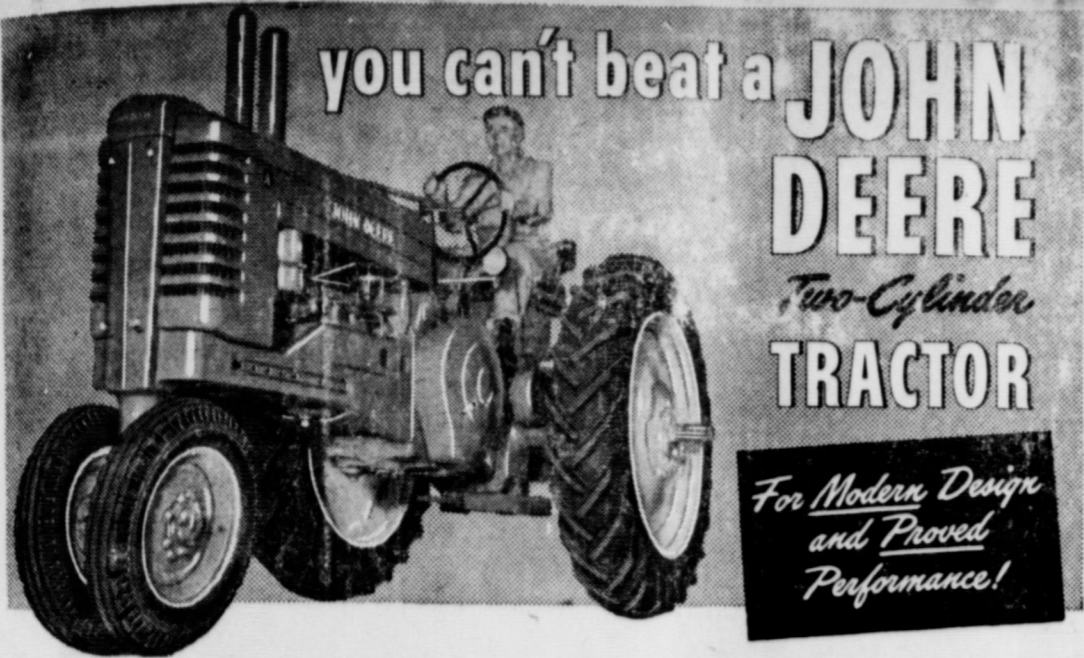
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Bovine 'Litter'

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WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

Truman Announces U.S. Will Add Hydrogen Bomb to Arms Program; Major Housing Plan Is Envisioned

BOMBS:

One of the most important decisions in world history had been put to Harry S. Truman. Should he permit construction of the hydrogen bomb?

When, after a respectable period of deliberation, he did make up his mind, the President expressed his decision in the most matter-of-fact manner possible.

The U. S. would continue its development and production of all types of military weapons, including atomic armaments and the so-called hydrogen bomb. That statement, probably intentionally cryptic, may or may not have meant that the U. S. already has begun work on the H-bomb.

Only one thing was sure—it was a highly important decision, not only to Mr. Truman but to every person in the world.

It wasn't the cost of the bomb that was a poser, even though that was expected to be in the neighborhood of four billion dollars. It wasn't a doubt as to whether it could be made, for science declared it could. It wasn't a hesitated to its effect, for if an enemy decided to, and could, construct the bomb, any experiments on the part of the U. S. to make its test would be justified.

It was none of these that aggravated the responsibility and solemnity of the decision. Instead, it was the question of life and death involved and even more serious, might not man be unleashing a force which would destroy all mankind?

THE PREPONDERANCE of persuasion was by those advocating the bomb. Sen Millard Tydings, Md., chairman of the armed forces committee gave voice to the majority of presidential advisers was thinking.

BROTHERHOOD:

Brotherhood Week, sponsored by the National Conference of Christians and Jews, will be observed from February 19-26, marking the annual observance of an event that has grown into national significance.

In accepting the honorary chairmanship of Brotherhood Week, President Truman urged "all Americans to ponder well the true meaning of brotherhood."

HOMELESS:

Break for DP's

An amendment of the present law which limits entry of displaced persons into the United States to 205,000 in the two-year period ending June 30, this year, has been approved by the Senate judiciary committee.

That group voted to permit 320,000 homeless foreigners to enter this country by June 30, 1951. This includes the approximately 124,000 who already have entered.

The committee voted by 10 to 3 to approve a bill which would make other changes in the present DP law which President Truman has urged.

For example, it would shift the date by which displaced persons must have entered European DP camps to be eligible for entry into this country. The present law fixed the date for December, 1945. The bill which the committee approved would change that to January 1, 1949.

The ACTION came on the eve of the date which the senate had ordered the committee to report out a DP bill.

The house bill has been approved by the committee over the protests of Chairman McCarran (D., Nev.), who was in Europe at the time. After a heated floor fight, the senate sent the measure back to committee.

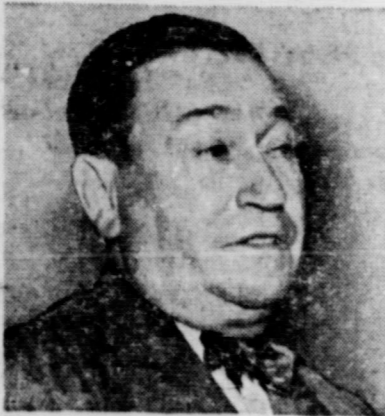
DRAFT LAW:

Bickering Starts

Atomic stockpiles . . . hydrogen bombs . . . billions for defense . . . incredible speed in the air . . . all these added up to a readily apparent conception that U.S. policy is committed to a course which believed that he is "best defended who is best armed."

The question was: Would the compulsory military service system be retained? The question of manpower remained an intangible factor.

Steel Defender



Benjamin Fairless, president of U. S. steel, testified before a joint congressional economic committee in defense of the recent increases in the price of steel. He called the rise "modest," laid the blame largely on union pensions.

HOUSING: \$8,000 Units

Could the American individual in search of a new home afford to pay \$8,000 for it? Federal housing officials believe that to be a fair figure and Raymond M. Foley, housing administrator, explained to the house banking committee a bill for federal housing aid based on that premise.

FOLEY STATED that the administration is considering construction, through cooperatives and other non-profit organizations, of some 250,000 housing units on an average cost of \$3,000 each.

The homes envisioned in the program would be for families with annual cash incomes of \$2,900 and \$4,000. One third of the urban families of the nation had incomes within that "middle-income" range in 1948.

The endeavor, even in the eyes of the severest critics, appeared laudable, but with the cost of living as it is and high income taxes for families without above-average exemptions, would still put the \$8,000 home out of reach of many.

AS AN INSTANCE of that supposition, Foley said average monthly payments would be about \$69. That's \$828 a year. Add a \$1,000 food, meat and milk bill, and the total outlay for the new home owner is \$1,828. This would leave the \$2,800 a year man \$972. Taking average figures, utilities, health costs, insurance, clothing, transportation (there would be nothing with which to pay for a car) recreation and incidentals would amount to about \$516. This would leave some \$400, or less than \$40 a month with which to meet emergencies or other needs.

So, it is easily apparent that the \$8,000 house, the \$69 monthly payment and cost-of-living items would run the \$2,800-a-year man so close to the edge, that he'd hardly have anything left for a pack of butts each week.

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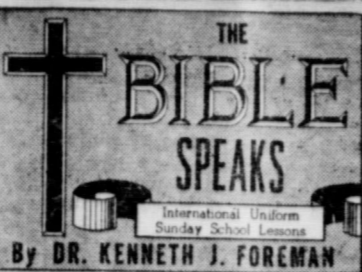

Fight for Freedom

Lesson for February 19, 1950.

THERE ARE TWO KINDS of problems with living things. One is the kind of problem caused by its growing too fast; the other is the problem caused by not growing fast enough. The early church had mostly the first kind of problem, at any rate it was taking in a lot of members.

But in Antioch, as we have seen, and even more so at the church spread westward around the edge of the Mediterranean, the Christian churches were filling up with non-Jewish members, just as they are today.

It is no secret that in the Masonic order there are 33 degrees. It is not possible for a new member to be taken right into the 33rd degree the first night. Everybody has to go through the lower degrees which are called the Blue Lodge.

Now many persons in that early church thought of the Jewish faith as a sort of Christian Blue Lodge.

All the very earliest Christians had been members of that lodge; why shouldn't every one else be the same? So when Paul and Barnabas came back from that historic missionary tour of Cyprus and points north, telling about the large number of new Christians, these old-style Christians shook their heads.

Paul was by-passing the Blue Lodge; he was taking in members who had not gone through the proper preliminaries, the first degrees.

What Makes a Man A Christian?

PAUL KNEW a real Christian when he saw one. So did Barnabas. And the two of them knew, right down in their souls, that they had seen real conversions, genuine cases of persons coming out of pagan darkness into Christian light, without being Jews at all, even for five seconds.

The vital question was simply this: What makes a Christian? The old-style Christians, who had been Jews themselves and still were, for all their Christian faith, said: Unless you are circumcised and keep all the laws of Moses, you cannot be saved—you cannot even begin to be a Christian. Paul and Barnabas—not alone, but as spokesman for many others in the church—said: You are saved by faith.

The Jerusalem Christian said: Yes, you are saved by faith, AND by keeping the law of Moses. Paul said: you are saved by faith, period.

How They Settled It

THE WAY that problem was settled is a model for all Christian churches with problems on their hands. First of all, the argument was brought out into the open; it was not a whispering campaign. Second, it was settled after giving both sides plenty of opportunity for full discussion in public. Third, it was settled not informally but by a church council, a group of representative leaders, not by a simple majority vote of all church members indiscriminately. Fourth, it was settled (as the reader of Acts 15 may see) by appeals to fact and to Scripture.

Finally, once the leaders had made up their minds, the church at large accepted their decision promptly, without further bickering. This has been the pattern for the Christian church ever since, though alas! it has not always been followed.

There would have been fewer church splits if the example of the early church had been more seriously taken.

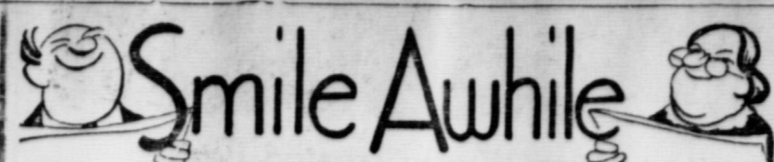
Faith and Obedience

ESSENTIALLY, that first great church council decided on the side of Paul and Barnabas. But they did not throw the Old Testament overboard. The moral law was as good as it ever was. But the council showed, once and for all, the true relations between Christian faith and obedience to the law of God.

There is just one doorway to the Father's house, the doorway of faith. We do not have to keep the law of Moses, or any set of laws, first. We are saved BY obedience.

We are not saved FROM obedience. But we are saved FOR obedience. A Christian's obedience to God is not a way of earning God's good-will. It is a grateful response to God's grace. And that makes all the difference in the world.
