Some bedding and clothes were saved but most personal property and furniture were destroyed.

DIMES FUND AIDS HARD LUCK TEXAN

Richard T. Churchill, native of Three Rivers Texas, has been accustomed to working his own way out of life's cruel crises. But he needed and got, some help recently thru the Texas March of Dimes.

Churchill, a U. of Texas law school student, was cut down by bullets in Germany late in 1944. He rejoined his outfit, the famed 104th Timberwolf Division, six weeks later. The dark haired handsome young Lieutenant, who was a platoon leader, was dropped from combat for good within two weeks. This time it was a land mine. They picked shrapnel out of him at a time over the agonizing months. After 3 years, Lt Churchill was medically discharged. He returned to Texas, began shaping his pre law program and got married. By the time little Michael arrived two years later, Churchill's dream of good health, a home, family, and a career brightened.

Then last fall Michael got polio. Twelve days later Mrs Churchill joined her son in polio ward maintained in Breckenridge Hospital by the National Foundation.

Churchill tried to carry on at home and at school. But his heart wasn't in it. "Our home was cheerless," he explained, "I kept going to classes, but nothing happened. I just sat there."

For Christmas both Michael and his mother returned home, the latter in a wheel chair. Churchill's training gained from self treatment after his own wounds enabled him to apply physical therapy at home.

In overcoming this family tragedy, spirit was a great factor — spirit of the parents and little Mike too. But Churchill credits March of Dimes financial treatment for expediting their recovery. And somehow, as he catches up on back studies and shares the physical therapy and household duties, he expects to get out and help actively with the current March of Dimes to prove his own gratitude.

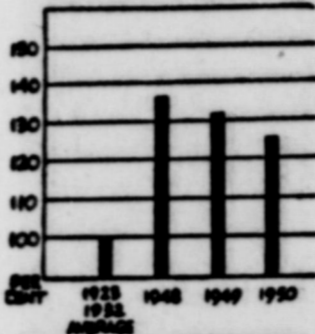

'50 Crop Production Is Near Record Peak Output Exceeds Average For Previous 8 Years

The United States department of agriculture reported crop production in 1950 was the third largest on record. This output exceeded the average of the previous eight years, the most productive period in American agriculture. Farmers attained this result despite reduction in acreage of several important crops and a growing season that had many unfavorable aspects. The composite yield per acre in 1950 was the second-best on record. A prolonged fall season for maturing and harvesting crops helped improve both quantity and quality. Few crops contributed record

outturns to this relatively large 1950 total—only soybeans, sorghum grain, sugar beets and red clover seed. The corn crop of 3,131 million bushels slightly exceeded forecasts. Others in this class of very large crops are oats, all hay, rice, potatoes, popcorn, tobacco, cranberries and alfalfa and sweet clover seeds. Cotton and cotton seed, peaches, and apricots were relatively small crops, while rye, buckwheat, sorghum forage, dry peas, velvetbeans, broomcorn, sergo and sugar cane strip were among those with small outturns.
