## Financial Statement of County Is Issued

County Judge Chester Connolly and the county commissioners are this week having a financial statement of the county published.

The Court recently had all the books of the County audited and this statement is compiled from the auditor's report.

This statement shows not only the receipts and disbursements during

the year 1940 but also the bonded indebtedness of the county, giving maturity dates, rates of interest, etc.

We believe that this statement will be of much interest to the taxpayers of the county. With one exception, it is the first time in many years that such a financial statement has been published, and we believe that Judge Connolly and the

commissioners court are doing a commendable thing in acquainting the people with the county's financial affairs.

Not only is the publication of financial statements at regular intervals due the tax-payers but it should be done in justice to the commissioners themselves. People like to know where and how their

money is being spent, and when a statement showing these things is published occasionally it tends to forestall criticism of the court.

If the Court will adopt the policy of publishing quarterly reports, we believe such a policy would be appreciated and approved by the public.

## Landscaping Of City Park Starts

Preparations for the landscaping of the proposed city park here northwest of town are now underway, and all fences and buildings formerly on the property are being removed.

**HALF MILLION MATTRESSES BY END OF THIS YEAR**

COLLEGE STATION, Feb. 27.—Rural low income families in Texas had made 205,138 cotton mattresses under the cooperative demonstration program late in February. Of this number 32,436 were made in January, according to Mildren Horton, vice director of the A. and M. College Extension Service.

Workers of the three cooperating groups, the Triple-A, Surplus Marketing Administration, and Extension Service, estimate that nearly half a million new mattresses will be in use in Texas by the end of 1941. Previously, estimates had been some-

what lower but a new regulation announced early this month by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration will increase the figures.

The new regulation provides that a certified family of three persons will be eligible to receive two mattresses.

Every family receiving one or more mattresses under the 1940 and 1941 programs will be entitled to receive materials for making the same number of cotton comforts under a supplemental provision. Making of the comforts in community centers likely will not begin until late March, Miss Horton says.

**NAVY RECRUITING SERVICE ESTABLISHED IN LUBBOCK**

C. L. Wylie, CWT., U. S. Navy Recruiting Service, with headquarters in Abilene, announces the establishment of a part-time recruiting station in Lubbock.

Representatives of the recruiting service will be at the Post Office on the first and third Wednesday of each month to interview and examine applicants for enlistment in the Navy. Age limits are 17 to 31 years. A birth or other authentic

proof of date of birth must be furnished. The Abilene office will continue to remain open as usual. 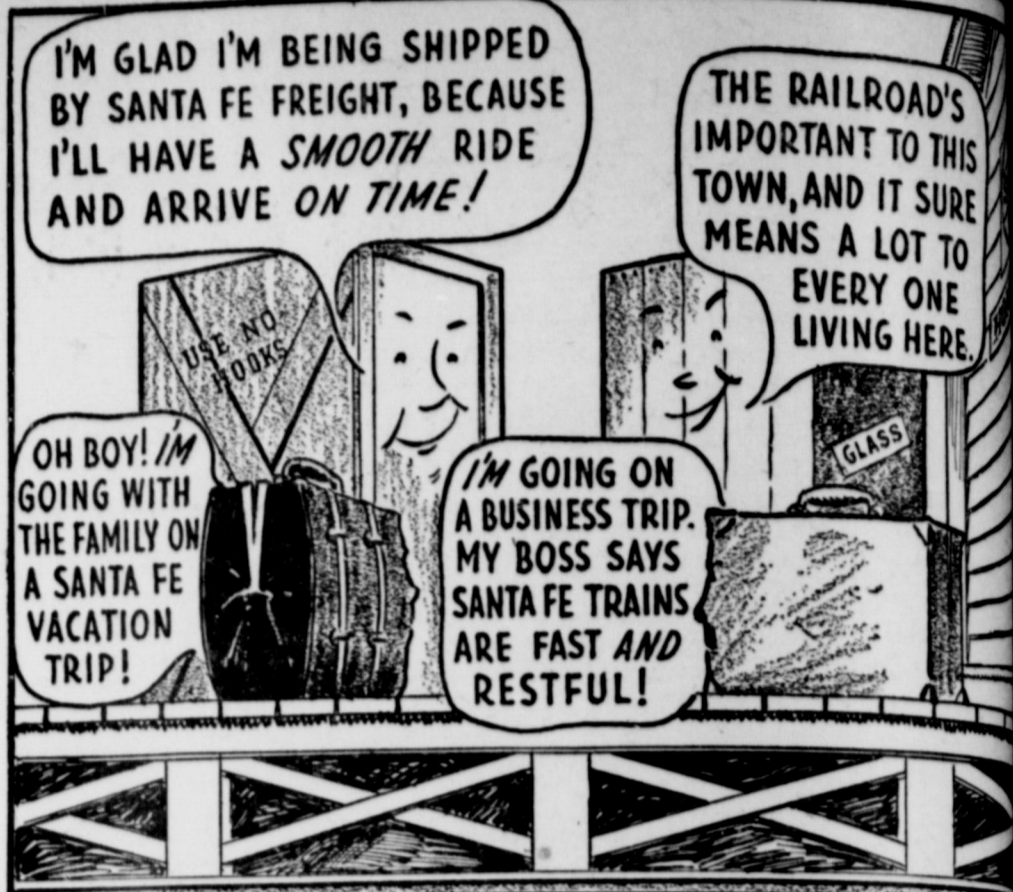

2. 10 qts. of fruit per person.
3. 1 hog to butcher for every 2 persons in the family over 10 years.

- I WILL keep faith with myself, my country and my God.



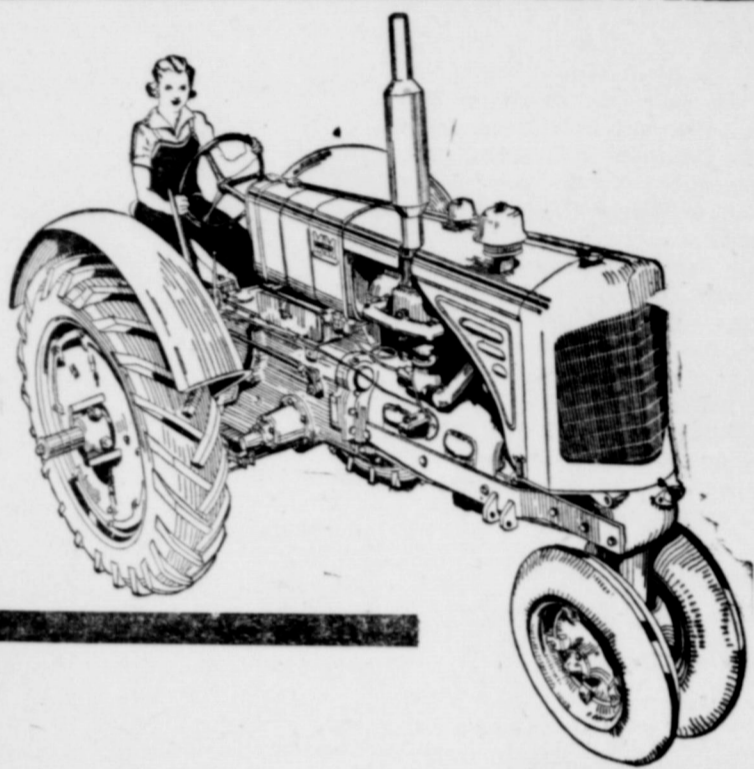

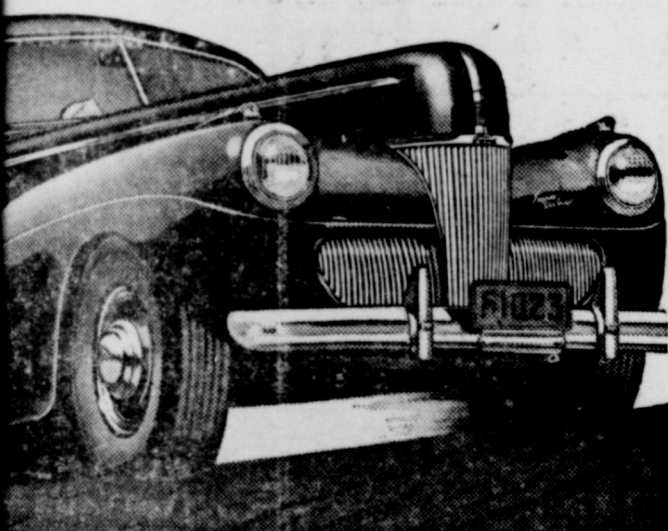

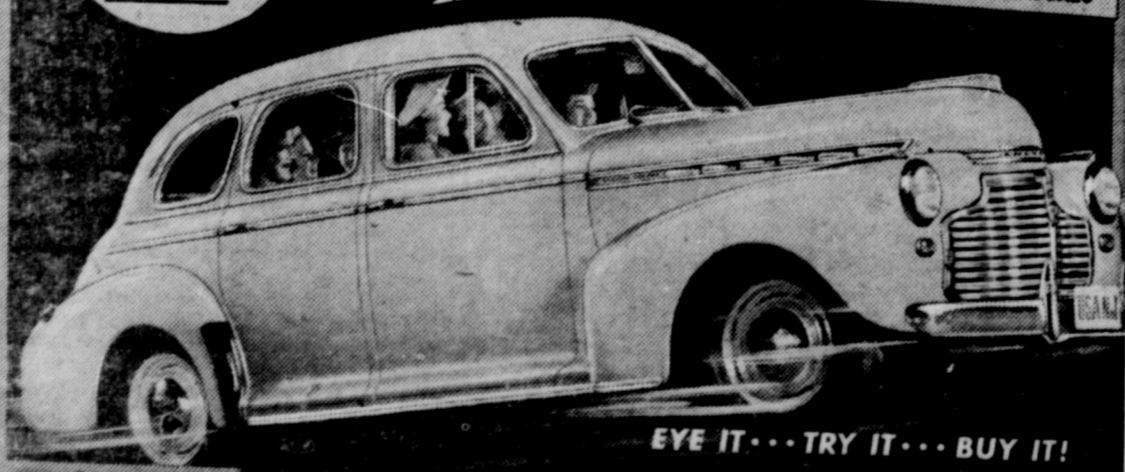
