County Plans Tax Rate Cut

County taxes are almost certain to be reduced this year and the tax rate may be cut as much as 70 cents on the \$100 valuation, members of Lynn County Commissioners' Court inform the Index-Press.

The rate reduction will become possible principally because final payment on the 1946 road bond issue of \$850,000 was made in March of this year.

For a number of years the county tax rate has been \$1.90. The Court hopes to cut this rate to \$1.30.

Exact amount will not be determined until the firm of tax equalization specialists who have been working on valuations for several months complete their figures.

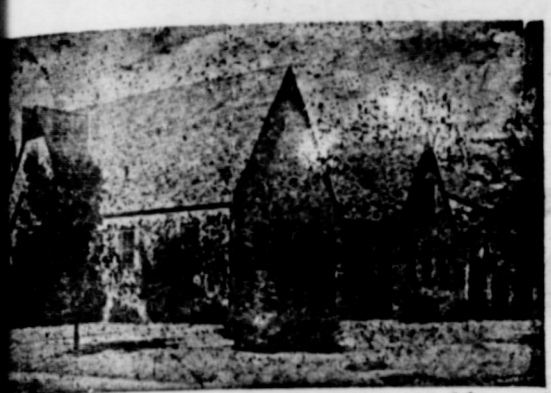
The number of traffic deaths in Texas has risen steadily since 1960 with 2254 deaths to 3028 deaths in 1965. "For the first five months of 1966, 1137 persons have died in traffic compared to 1032 deaths for the same period of 1965," the Sergeant stated. This 10% increase is very alarming, and when you realize our heavy volume traffic months are still ahead, we must anticipate increasing problems in the accident picture.

The Sergeant appealed to the motoring public to assist in the reduction of this trend, otherwise, the death count at the end of the year will far exceed the record number of 3028 deaths in Texas during 1965.

ASCS Report

Reporters will be contacting farmers who have paid for the measuring service within the next few days. The farmer or his representative should be there to assist the reporter in making the measurements. Your cooperation in this matter will be greatly appreciated.

Remember this office must be completely through with all compliance work by no later than August 15, 1966.

June 20, 1966, is the final date for farmers to sign up for measurement service. If you want the ASCS to measure your cotton, feed grain, or diverted acres, be sure to sign up by June 20, 1966; otherwise, you the farmer will certify your acres for the 1966 crop year. For the farmers who certify, at least 25% of the farms will be spot checked for accuracy.

Letters have been mailed to all cotton farmers in Lynn county requesting production records for 1965 crop year and where possible 1963 and 1964. Any records such as insurance claims, adjustor's estimates, dates, etc., that you may have which will help you to substantiate any abnormal year should be attached to these letters with an explanation. Lynn county farmers turned down the right to sell or lease cotton outside of Lynn county for 1967 by a vote of 218 for and 563 against.

Farmers are reminded that July 31, 1966, is the maturity date on cotton placed under loan for the 1965 crop year. These notes may be redeemed at the ASCS office by paying the face value of the notes plus interest, which is 30¢ per \$100 for each calendar month

with a sorghum or sudan cross, or other varieties will be classified as a feed grain. Remember that you must control the Russian Thistle or tumbleweed on your diverted acres under the Cotton and Feed Grain Programs.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" Under the laws of the land at present an illegitimate child is worth more than other children. This somewhat whimsical situation was recently highlighted by an editorial appearing in the Union County Leader in New Mexico. The editor pointed out that under the Aid to Dependent Children, the government will pay out more than \$800 per year for the upkeep on an illegitimate child. But for C. W. Harder, income tax purposes, only \$500 is allowed to a family for each legitimate child. The New Mexico editor also pointed out that under the Cuban refugee program a minimum of \$1200 per year is paid for each refugee child's upkeep, but if the child is attending school an extra \$1000 per year is allowed. In addition the editorial states that in the Federal Job Corp. the government spends \$7000 per year per child. And according to government figures, the VISTA program, (Volunteer in Service in America) spent \$3.1 million in the last fiscal year to turn out only 202 trainees, indicating that in this government agency the cost of training one child runs to more than \$15,000 per year. Thus, the editor asks "How many more children?"
