150 Attend Broiler Meeting Here

30 Farmers Show Interest

About 100 farmers and their families heard the initial meeting of the proposed broiler industry explained at the school auditorium Friday night.

Lynn County Agent, introduced the first speaker, Ken Loper, area Purina agent of Lubbock, who in turn introduced Tom Buckingham, formerly of San Angelo, and now of Ft. Worth, who told of the broiler project in San Antonio. Others speaking included Winford Riley of the Western Hatcheries and Arthur Clary, a broiler processor of Lubbock. Local banker, E. J. Smith was largely instrumental in setting up the meeting.

Mr. Smith said about 30 indicated interest by signing cards and 7 farmers have signed formal applications.

Buckingham gave a detailed account of the operation in the San Angelo area, where he was instrumental in getting the program moving from its inception. He stated that the first house was erected in that area in 1951 and today that area produces 180,000 broilers every nine weeks. He added that since the start of the program four years ago, more than 2,000,000 birds have been processed showing a net profit of around ten cents per bird. He also warned that broiler raising is "no get rich quick scheme" and that it entails plain hard work on the part of the grower. It is said, "A supplement income better than anything else in West Texas."

Riley went through the hatchery problems, price and type of chicks that make the best broilers for market and the ways to raise these chicks at a profit. He stated that the best broiler produced today is a cross between a Delaware and a Nicholas New Hampshire, producing an Indian River broiler, big framed, wide breast and short legs.

Clary advised prospective growers that his plant would purchase every broiler raised in the area and that these broilers would be purchased at the time they are put down in the house. Market price at the time of maturity and shipping would be the final payment price to the grower, he added. These prices are determined by Department of Agriculture daily market reports.

It was estimated that the initial cost to raisers would be around \$3,000 which would purchase material for building a 20 X 170 feet broiler house, brooders, feeders and automatic watering troughs. This house would be capable of raising 4000 chicks with a required space of one square foot per bird. Cost of the chicks and feed would be financed by Clary where requested.

Each person attending the meeting signed an information card and at a later date, within the next week, a representative of Purina Feeds and the Clary plant, will call on these prospective raisers. Saturday afternoon the O'Donnell Bank will be open from noon to 3:00 p. m. to receive applications for loans from interested persons. The bank will also be open afternoons during the coming week to accept these applications.

Clary stated after the meeting that this was just one of several projects he has planned for the South Plains. He stated that is the project is well received in the O'Donnell area, his next move would be to Lamesa in an effort to get persons in this area interested in the broiler raising business.

Hope Held For
Child Disease

The outlook in the fight against rheumatic fever has improved, but this disease, which begins most often between the ages of five and fifteen, still results in serious heart damage in many cases, declared Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer.

Rheumatic fever usually strikes after a nose and throat infection caused by germs of the streptococcus family. An average of three out of one hundred of the commonly called "strep" infections are followed by rheumatic fever.

Sulfonamide and penicillin usually can overcome the infection. But if rheumatic fever develops, strict bed rest is the first resort to ease the load on the heart and to help the patient avoid added infection.

Sometimes sulpha or penicillin may be given to the convalescing patient to help avoid a recurrence of the disease. Repeated attacks of rheumatic fever are more likely to lead to heart damage.

The rheumatic heart condition can involve damage to one or more of the four valves of the heart or to the heart muscle itself. Rheumatic fever inflames the valves and muscles and when the inflammation subsides, it usually leaves a scar.

In about two out of three cases this fever leaves no heart damage, or cases so little injury that the victim can regain active, everyday living. In other cases, modern surgery may help.

No matter how slight an attack of rheumatic fever may seem, the first and most important thing to do is to follow your doctor's advice to the letter.

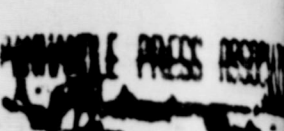

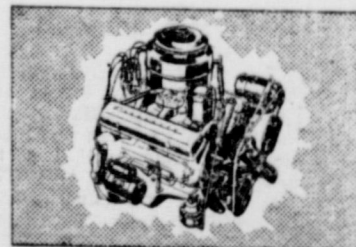

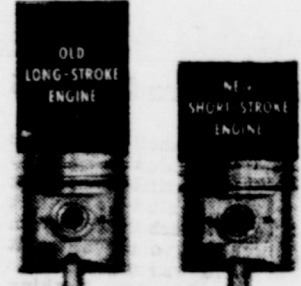
