NO WILL? WHO INHERITS PROPERTY?

What will happen if you should die without a legal and proper will? Who will inherit your property? Your husband, wife, mother, father, children, your wife's relatives? The best way you can say who will have it is to provide a will which will protect your rightful beneficiaries and dispose of your property in accordance with your wishes.

When a deceased has no will, or dies "intestate" as the law calls it, the property of that person is distributed according to a detailed formula fixed by law. In some cases this may be the way you yourself would divide it—but in many cases it is not.

The provisions of the law concerning the distribution of the property of a person who dies without a will are rather complicated, and all of the possibilities cannot be covered by a general statement. There are different rules for real estate and for personal property, for community property and for separate property, for homestead property, and for all of the many possible combinations of surviving relatives. Each situation must be carefully studied to determine the correct distribution of the property.

For example, here is a general idea of how the community property which you and your spouse have accumulated will be divided if you do not make a will prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and there are no children, the surviving spouse receives all of the property.

If, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of deceased children, they would divide one-half of the property, while the surviving spouse would receive the other one-half.

Of course, grandchildren do not share in the estate unless their parent who would inherit is deceased. And when descendants of previously deceased children do inherit, they receive only the portion that the child would have received, regardless of the number of such descendants.

An odd note, perhaps, is that the surviving spouse already owns one-half of the community estate prior to your death, and the law adds nothing to this share where there are children surviving.

When there are only children and their descendants surviving, they divide the entire community estate between them.

## AMISH CAPITAL This Town Has More Buggies Than Autos

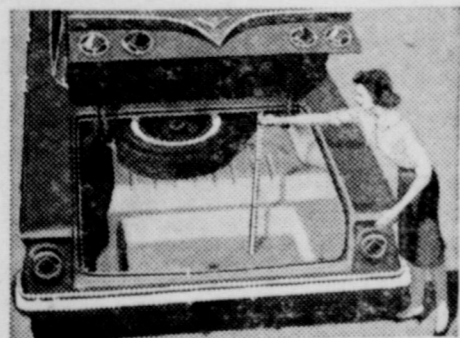
ARTHUR, III.—On the streets you'll find more horses and buggies than automobiles. The hitch-rack is used every day in the week except Sunday.  
For this is the home of one of the larger sects of Amish people in the country. Approximately 1,500 Amish live on the farms nearby. They are prosperous, friendly. They've never gotten in trouble, and mind their own business.  
But strangers stare at them because the men are whiskered, wear homemade clothing and flat black hats. The women dress just as severely, and keep their heads covered. They dislike the automobile, and use the horse exclusively.  
**Hitch Rack Rules**  
Arthur has entire streets where the hitch-rack reigns. Signs are posted, prohibiting autos to park in these areas. The highways near Arthur are filled with the black-topped buggies of the Amish farmers.  
Strangely the Amish have preserved many Old World traits, and yet form a harmonious segment in the area surrounding them. For although Arthur is known as "Capital of Amishland," there has never been any friction between these people and their non-Amish neighbors. They are extreme pacifists.  
**Make Own Clothes**  
Mention of the word Amish generally brings to mind a vague mental picture of queer, Quaker-looking people who ride in horse-drawn vehicles and wear plain clothes of their own making.

**Free Speech Issue In Court Proceeding**

LINCOLN, Ill.—Free speech was the issue here in a contempt of court case in which nearly 600 persons faced possible fines and jail sentences.

The defendants, many of them members of a reform group known as the "Good Government Council of Logan County," were cited for contempt for petitioning Circuit Judge Frank M. Bevan to replace a state's attorney in a case involving the prosecutor's friend.

Judge Bevan said the petition contained "odious, defamatory language concerning an official of this court," State's Attorney Edwin C. Mills.

Members of the Good Government Council contended Judge Bevan could not hold them in contempt and said if the prosecutor felt he was defamed by the petition he could sue them in a civil court.

The case arose when, as a result of action taken by the Good Government Council, Justice of the Peace Vincent Jones was charged with illegal diversion of funds collected in overweight trucking fines. Mr. Jones was charged with perjury, embezzlement and malfeasance.

The council followed up the case with a petition asking that Mr. Jones be replaced by a special or assistant prosecutor.

**Most Drinking Starts Before College Days**

NEW HAVEN, Conn.—Four out of every five college men who drink began their drinking before entering college, a researcher at Yale University's laboratory of applied physiology reported recently.

Robert Straus, research associate, disclosed for the first time preliminary results of a five-year study into the drinking habits of American college youth. This study was made by Mr. Straus and Selden D. Bacon, director of Yale's center of alcohol studies.

Of the American women students who drink, 65 per cent also started drinking before entering college, Mr. Straus said.

"The probability that a young person will drink at all," he continued, "is closely related to the practices of his or her parents."

"Of the men whose parents both drink, 90 per cent are themselves users. However, only half of the men (51 per cent) whose parents both abstain, drink."

"Where both parents are users, 83 per cent of the women drink on occasion. However, when both parents abstain, only 19 per cent of the women students drink."

He declared that parental advice on abstinence seems to be much stronger than advice from either church leaders or teachers.

Family income is a large factor "closely associated with the probability that one will use alcohol. Among those whose family income is under \$2,500, two thirds of the men and only 30 per cent of the women students drink."

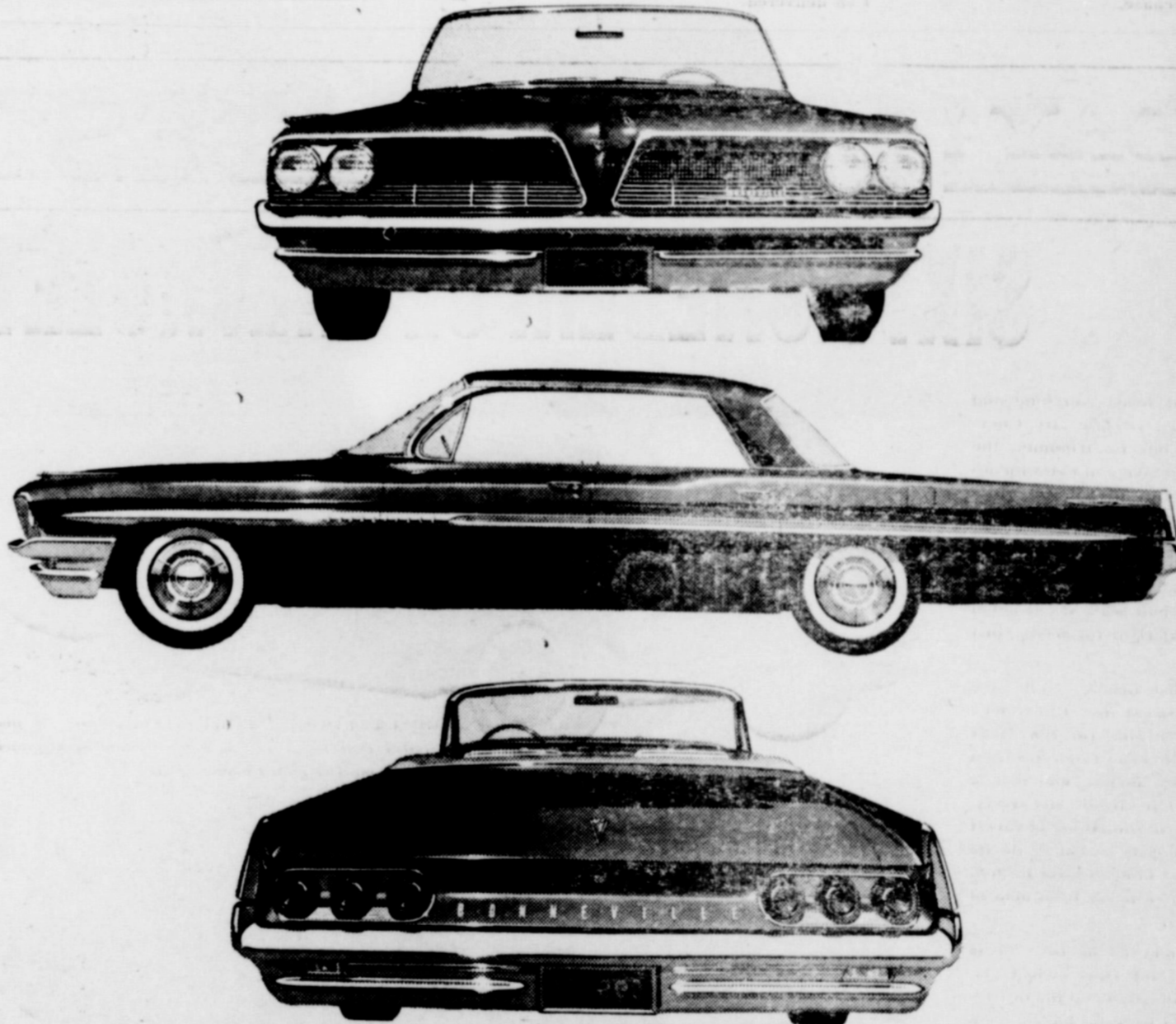

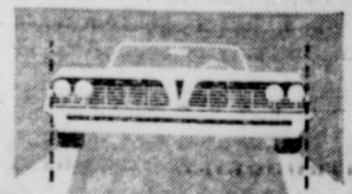

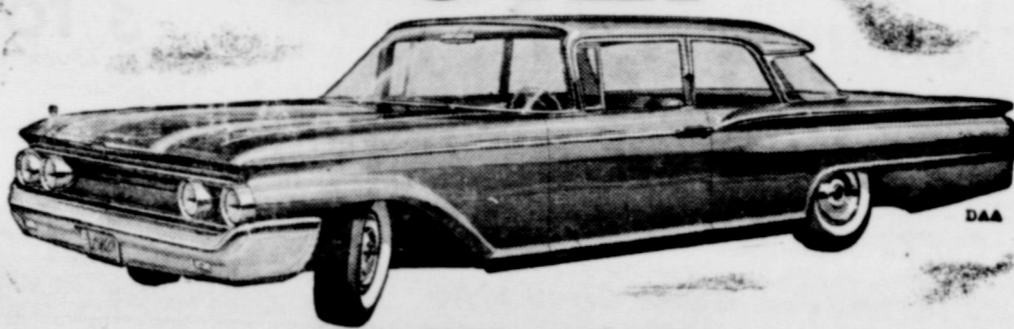
