City Water Supt. Gets State Certificate

State health officials have awarded Bert Fritz of O'Donnell a Grade C "Certificate of Competency" in recognition of his skill and knowledge of water plant operation.

The certificate was awarded under Texas' general sanitation law that water plants furnishing the public must be under the supervision of an operator who has proved his talent for the job in a written examination and has been certified by the Texas State Department of Health.

O'Donnell's newly won certificate will be valid for three years. After meeting certain requirements of experience and training, he will be eligible to try for higher certification.

The examination for Grade C certification covers fundamental knowledge in quality requirements for a public water supply, interpretation of bacteriological analysis, selection of pumps, well or surface supply sanitation, distribution system sanitation and procedures involved in pipe laying and maintenance.

Grade C certification requires a minimum of one year of experience plus 40 credits earned by attendance at annual district and state water works schools.

Abundant supplies of pork, oranges and orange products are in prospect for February and are featured items on next month's plentiful foods list. Broiler-fryers, lamb, lard eggs and peanuts and peanut products are also on the list.

The use of liquid fertilizers is becoming widespread and they are proving to be a good source of plant nutrients. Liquid or dry fertilizers are generally of equal value for improving crop yields. The main considerations for making a determination of which type of plant food to use are cost and ease of handling and application.

Tree seedlings for planting farmstead windbreaks are available at a nominal price from the Texas Forest Service. Local county agents and Soil Conservation Service district offices can supply order forms and price lists. Windbreaks, says Bill Smith, extension forestry specialist, are an excellent means for preventing wind erosion and providing protection for farmsteads, especially in West Texas.

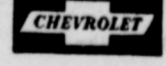

I believe in the future of farming, with a faith born not of words but of deeds — achievements won by the present and past generations of farmers, in the promise of better days thru better ways, even as the better things we now enjoy have come up to us from the struggle of former years.

I believe that to live and work on a good farm is pleasant as well as challenging; for I know the joys and discomforts of farm life and hold an inborn fondness for those associations which, even in hours of discouragement, I cannot deny.

I believe in leadership from ourselves and respect from others. I believe in my own ability to work efficiently and think clearly with such knowledge and skill as I can secure, and in the ability of organized farmers to serve our own and the public interest in marketing the product of our toil. I believe we can safeguard those rights against practices and policies that are unfair.

I believe in less dependence on begging and more power in bargaining; in the life abundant and enough honest wealth to help make it so — for others as well as myself; in less need for charity and more of it when needed; in being happy myself and playing square with those whose happiness depends upon me.

I believe that rural America can and will hold true to the best traditions in our national life and that I can influence in my home and community which will stand solid for my part in that inspiring task.

CENSUS TO START APRIL 1st

Establishment of a district office for the 1960 Census of Population and Housing at Lubbock County Court House, Lubbock, was announced today by Director James W. Stroud of the Census Bureau's regional office at Dallas. Earl E. Kerr will be the supervisor of the district office. He will direct a force of 24 crew leaders and 376 census takers in this area. The field canvass begins April 1st. Prior to the start of the census, all households will receive in the mail an advance census report form, a new census taking device which is designed to speed up the field canvass and provide more accurate statistics. Distribution of this form, which contains the basic population and housing questions, gives the family a chance to assemble information about each member in advance of the census taker's visit.

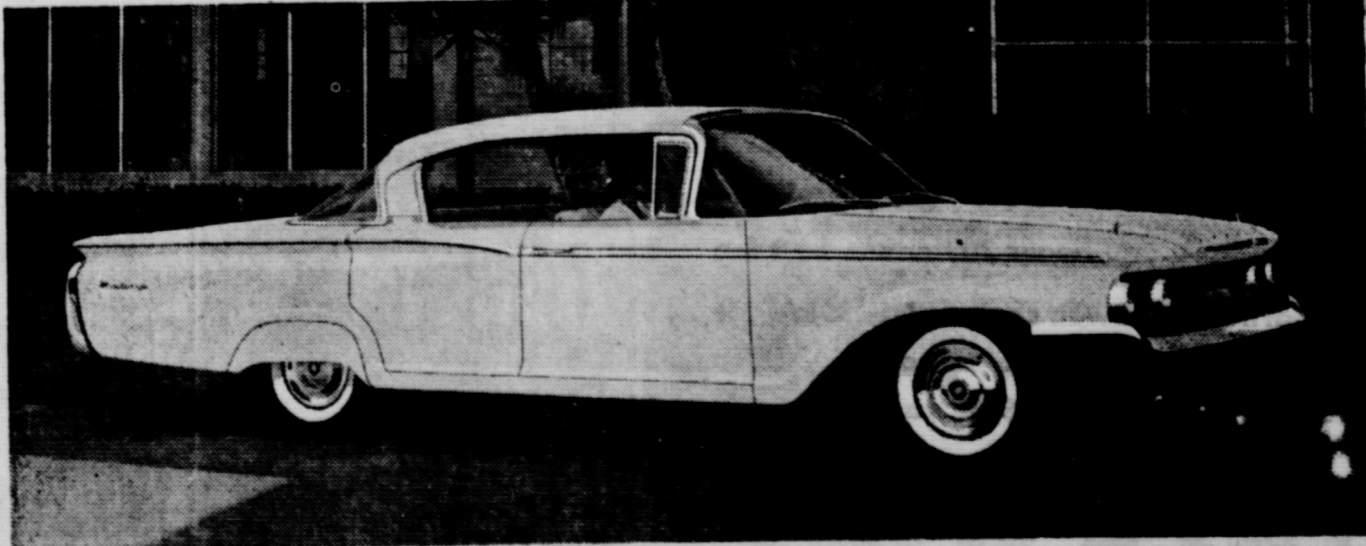
