90 Yard Touchdown Highlight Of Game

A 90-yard run for a touchdown with Raymond Crouch, the ball-toter proved to be the highlight of last Friday night's Homecoming game between the Tahoka Bulldogs and the O'Donnell Eagles. The touchdown, which was the only score for the Eagles, came in the first two minutes of the second half, when he returned Tahoka's kick-off.

Though the Eagles failed to win the game, home fans were more than pleased with the showing made. Eligibility of three of the main string was protested Thursday, making it necessary for Coach Conger to use three substitutes. In spite of this setback, the Eagles played the game of their season, holding the far-famed Bulldogs to a standstill until a few seconds before the gun ended the first half, when Minor went over the line for a touchdown.

Both teams displayed remarkable versatility both in offense and defense, keeping the 2500 spectators on their feet cheering throughout the greater part of the game. The heart-breaking feature—for O'Donnell fans—occurred in the third quarter when the Eagles reached the Tahoka 2-yard line and were unable to score, the ball passing over to the Bulldogs on downs. Final score was 18-6. Last year's game ended with a 6-0 score in favor of the Eagles.

Queen Is Crowned

Coronation of Emma Jo Hinkle as 1939 Football Queen was a colorful part of between-halves entertainment. Her majesty was escorted onto the field by Eagle Captain Blewitt Davis, who placed the football helmet jauntily atop her curls and proclaimed her as queen. In the royal procession were Misses Anne Brewer, Wanda Crouch, Cassie Mae Newton, who were class candidates for the honor, and their escorts.

Previous to coronation ceremonies, the pep squad had gone through several intricate formations, climaxing the exhibition with a flag drill around a huge Maypole hung with black and gold streamers. When the drill ended, the squad quick-stepped into a semi-circle, and the royal procession was led by the rhythm band which fell into position immediately in front of the pep squad. The black and gold of the uniforms made a striking background for the coronation ceremony.

Final game of the 1939 season for the Eagles will be played Friday against Seagraves, when the boys go to that city. This is expected to be one of the hardest fought games of the year, and it is hoped that several carloads of fans will be able to go from here.
