Hutton, manager of the Social Security Office in Lubbock, Texas. If you are a self-employed farmer and have earnings of \$400 or more a year, you must file a report of your self-employment farm income at the same time you file your in-

come tax return. The social scurity tax is 3 per cent of the self-employed farmer's earnings, up to a total of \$4200 in earnings. If you work, or have other types of self-employment income, earnings from these sources may be combined with your farm earnings up to a combined total of \$4200 according to Mr. Hutton.


