### A LITTLE HURT MAY SAVE YOUR LIFE

The paradox that a "little hurt" can prevent a lot of sickness was demonstrated by scientists about a hundred years ago.

An English country doctor named Edward Jenner took a little serum from a cowpox pustule on the arm of a milkmaid and scratched it with a lancet into the arm of a naughty boy. A smallpox like sore appeared on his arm and he had other mild smallpox like symptoms.

Today, thanks to Dr. Jenner, we can have a smaller immunization and avoid the disfiguring and killing epidemics which once swept Europe.

Several years later in France Louis Pasteur made a startling discovery one morning. The discovery—a re-inoculation of some chickens with chicken cholera — set the wheels turning in Pasteur's creative mind.

"I've found a way to make a beast a little sick — inject some microbes into a chicken so that it gets the disease but only a little of it — and when it gets better — it can resist the disease. We can apply this to other diseases in man: we can save lives." These may have been some of the thoughts running thru Pasteur's mind.

Pasteur also explored and experimented until he found a way to protect man from the dread rabies thru a series of inoculations. Today we use about the same method to keep a man bitten by a rabid animal from developing the disease.

Another advance in immunology was made in 1923 when a toxin was developed to save hundreds of babies each year from gasping death of diphtheria.

In the last 10 to 15 years we have read and watched the drama of polio vaccine unfold. Princlal play area in that drama were Dr. Jonas Salk of the U. of Pittsburg and Dr. Albert Sabin of University of Cincinnati.

Dr. John Enders of the Children Hospital in Boston just recently developed a measles vaccine to save lives and impairment in hundreds of children.

These dedicated scientists did not conquer these diseases — smallpox, rabies, diphtheria, polio and measles — in the literal sense. They simply gave us a means of preventing them.

Back so many years I dare to remember I knew a most remarkable newsmen. He was Mr. Proske and published one of the few German language newspapers in the nation. (During World War I to be a German was to be a devil but the casualty list of Lee County of Germans drying for their country more than equals any similar tiny county in the nation.)

At the time I ran the D.B. paper, Mr. Proske published the Giddings Volksblatt. Albert Merchant (English spelling) was his printer. From Dime Box to Giddings and back I rode Elder Burtshell's ice truck with my precious type on top of many tons of ice.

So much for background which is a poor picture of two of my friends.

One nite as Albert was setting type Mr. Proke came into the shop and to the point in such broken English that I had to guess his meaning, said.

"Schmitt write what you feel. Write of your daily life and your fellow people fairly so you sleep the nite thru. But write with truth as you see it. Only in you lies your God". In a rare moment he kissed me on the cheek in European custom.

A few days later I was a pall-bearer and with bitter tears gave up for a moment of honey of a man of 85 years.

Like a man committing adultery and confessing to all the church — I say, yes I did. I bought the Hale property. I plan nothing other than admiring the view as a man would admire a beautiful horse. My bride tells me the pros and cons she hears of the deal. Why not worry about a person buying a car. It cost no more. But to be fair people would not talk about us UNLESS THEY LOVED US. And this I thank God.

A tale I always get a chuckle from is that of Dr. Farrington, now of Lubbock. With a mouth full of tools and spongers in my mouth he was kidding me about my stammer. He told this yarn (he swears it's true).

Back in his youth in a tiny East Texas town the community was having a union protracted meeting under a brush arbor.

Prior to the service the visiting "fire eating" preacher urged and urged the good people to stand up and testify what the Good Lord had done for them.

Time after time the good folks testified. Then an unfortunately hairlip man stood up and in such a hisp could hardly be understood, said:

"Everybody can see what Lord has done for me."

My dad was dead. My childhood friend from Jewett and now a dentist told me this as he visited with me at the time of my sorrow.

As a dentist, in the Armed Forces and stationed in the edge of London Vinny was riding a bus into Londer as he passed a house that seemed so very familiar.

During his leave in the city Vinny backtracked to the house and asked if he could enter—after introducing himself he entered the two story brick house on the edge of the London slums. By instinct Dr. Smith went to a room and asked the owner if there was a trap door in the area. The owner said "No, not to his knowledge."

Vinny moved a chest of drawers and pulled back the carpet — to find a trap door.

Had my friend lived before. In the weeks to come I have many instances to tell that can be backed up with sworn statements.

I am greatly in love with my native Latin Americans. Their thinking is so different from mine that I am constantly fascinated.

A day or so ago I bought some choice loin steaks for my bride to cook with mushroom sauce. I told the child to take it to the house—he did—his house. How the Latins mix up "his" and "hers" is a constant joy to me. So many of you are missing a blessing by not enjoying our Latin brothers and sisters.

Next week we have a true story how the Ed. fell in love with a married woman — the tale has quite a punch line afforded by my dad.

The Old Ed has kittens running all over the office. Our buddy Fuzzy Moore has the five critters named with clouds of London.

### RATES CUT

The Texas Electric Co serving O'Donnell recently made a voluntary reduction in electric service rates here.

The principle changes being proposed are a reduction in the rate applicable to residential customers additional promotional features to encourage increased residential use in the winter months and the addition of a new rate for all electric homes. All residential customers using more than 65 kilowatt hours in a month will be benefited. These changes will result in a reduction in excess of 5 percent in the annual revenue from customers of the company on residential rates.

The rate adjustment made by the company in 1963 was proportionally larger for the below average residential user. The benefits under the new rates are proportionally larger to the above average user residential customer such as those with summer air conditioning in their homes.

Other proposed changes in rates will reduce the minimum bills under the large general service rate and bills for some public schools. The firm propose to update the adjustment clauses in rates by changing the date in the tax clause from Jan. 1 1963 to Jan. 1, 1965 and changing the 20 cents in the fuel clause to 21 cents to be increased by the revised schedule of rates.

The proposed rate reduction is a continuation of the long established policy if Texas Electric Service Co. to voluntarily reduce electric rates from time to time as conditions permit.

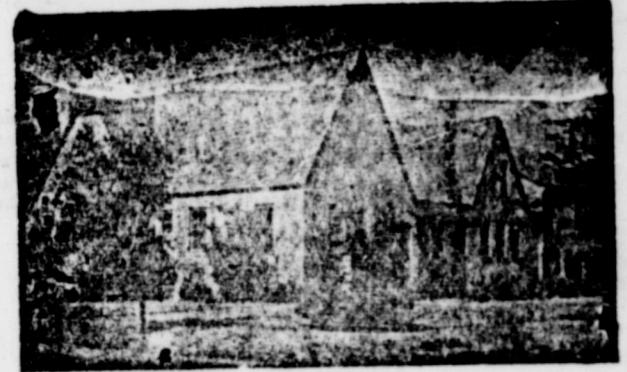

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**NATIONAL POISON PREVENTION WEEK SET**

Dallas - Poison used to be prominent in intrigue, punishment, and assassination but nowadays children under five are the main victims and many such innocent victims owe their agony to careless parents. To reduce such needless suffering this has been set at National Poison Prevention Week.

The idea is to help people understand that many common household products are dangerous, especially if swallowed. These included certain bleaches, cleaners, furniture polishes, kerosene and other fuels, paints, paint thinners and removers and the like. While Federal law requires labels on such products to indicate their dangerous or harmful nature, experience indicates that many adults ignore such warnings - even those which plainly say "Caution, Danger, warning" - keep out the reach of children.

But keeping things "out of the reach of children" is not easy. Young children, especially toddlers, are naturally curious and inquisitive. Keeping them from harm requires cautious parents.

The awful enemies of children include items usually stored under the sink, aspirin and other medicines left on a bedside table or in an unlocked medicine cabinet and handy man cleaners and fuels left in the garage.

Removing hazardous items from their original containers to soft drink bottles and the like is a common and dangerous habit which traps many an unsuspecting child.
