

At the regular April board meeting of trustees of the local school system, members selected J. W. Gardenhire as president, Dave McMillan, vice president, and Jake Burkett, secretary. Other board members president were N. S. Barker of New Moore, M. E. Greenlee of O. K., Wayland Taylor, and O. G. Smith, Jr. both of O'Donnell.

The annual tour of inspection of the school's physical plant was conducted by Supt. Skinner. School property was found to be in an unusually good condition and the usual paint-up, clean-up program will be conducted this summer.

After the tour, members of the board were guests for dinner in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Skinner. At the business session that night a 1955 Board of Equalization was named as follows: Ted Rogers of New Moore, Henry Smith of Harmony and John Earles of here. There will be no increase in taxes other than minor adjustments.

When the 1955-56 budget is available, a condensed account of it will be run in this paper.

Among other business Mrs. Ed Robertson, Mrs. Thelma Durbre, Mrs. Wilfred Almond, Miss Clarence Hambrick, Wayne Richie, Mrs. Geno Jones and Miss Moore were re-elected. Resigning at the meeting were Mrs. Almond, Miss Hambrick of Junior High and Miss Moore, commercial teacher of High School.

A very knotty problem of taking children slightly under the state age limit of six was resolved by a resolution fixing the time as set by the State (Sept. 1). Such ruling has been unofficial for past 18 years but is now official. The ruling is a distinct hardship to borderline births but the crowded elementary grades made the problem so very knotty that most members felt there was no choice. Borden Co. currently takes unders but few other caprock schools do.

Currently this year there are 39 students in each of the two 1st grade sections and a normal load is no more than 25.

Supt. Skinner spent more than one hour explaining the achievement tests conducted thru-out the system. According to the tests about one third of the students (at least in the 2nd grade of which we were especially interested) were doing high work in the next grade lower. This means that from a point of view of grades and measures these students mastered NO 2nd grade work. This number falling would be a peak load on the 2nd grade next year. In other grades the same results were the trend. By editorial comment, where lies the blame? It is our opinion too large a pupil load on teachers thru Junior High.

Not A Get-Rich Scheme — But Lots Of Work

Every farmer in this area is invited to attend — and if any of the O'Donnell merchants miss this meeting — well, we know they won't. Seating of such a crowd will probably be a problem so it is suggested that those who are definitely interested attend. In addition to farmers, the broiler deal is ideally suited to the small business man with extra time, the semi-retired yet active individual. All that is needed is at least an acre of land either leased or owned.

Mr. Clary said he would explain in detail the financial part of the proposal on May 12th. But the broiler producer will have an initial cash investment of only \$736 on a 4,000 chick deal and this sum will buy outright the needed brooders, founts, and feeders. The \$3,000 metal building to house the project will be a Federal Government Title 1 loan and feed purchases and chick purchases will be locally financed.

75,000 Broilers A Week

Currently 50 percent of Texas' consumption of broilers comes from out of state. Mr. Clary said he wanted O'Donnell to produce 75,000 broilers a week. In talking to L. G. Clark, who is in the cage-egg business as well as farming, he said the efficient broiler producer should realize \$200 to \$300 per month (depending of course on the capacity of the unit).

Drouth Insurance

The need for farmers to diversify (or living off the farm) is known to all as the consumer demand for cotton is slowly dropping. And the high dry climate of the Caprock is suited for the chicken — a semi-rapid bird originally.

Also drouth does not hit broiler crop as severe a blow as row crops.

250 broiler plants here in this wide area and a pay day every 16 weeks with NO marketing problems is the deal.

### Farmers To Meet May 12th

#### LOCAL BANKER TO SPARK PROJECT

For the first time in the history of this great area there is seemingly an ANSWER to the off-production period in this vast cotton-grain agricultural area — that is the BROILER INDUSTRY — now centered in Texas around Smiley and in parts of California and Arkansas.

#### O'Donnell Area Is Selected

O'Donnell has been selected as a pilot-plant site as Seagraves was selected last year for an experiment in cage-egg production. Everyone knows how successful the experiment proved to be as that story has been featured in area papers and in leading farm magazines.

#### Can Thank Mr. Smith Of Bank

Arthur Clary of the Clary Poultry and Egg Wholesale firm of Lubbock, and E. J. Smith, O'Donnell's local banker, are working on the project to give the necessary know-how and financial assistance.

#### Meeting Is May 12th

A meeting has been called for Thursday night at 8 p. m. May 12th in high school auditorium where Mr. Smith and Mr. Clary will explain the business end of the proposed project and Ken Looper of Purina Feed Co. will talk.

#### Mr. Smith's Answer

O'Donnell was selected as a pilot-plant site largely due to the efforts of Banker Smith who saw immediately upon moving here a need for an even distribution of farmer income every month in the year instead of a fat fall and a lean spring.
