The Medicare program has two parts: Part A (Hospital Care) and Part B (Physician's Services). If you are under Part B (for which you signed up and now pay \$3.00 a month to Social Security) you can collect from the federal government part of the payments you make to us for medical services.

This contract to pay is between you and the Social Security Administration. We still are in the private practice of medicine; we have no contractual relationship with the federal government. As your private physician we will continue to provide medical service to you in the same manner

we have in the past. We will continue to give you the medical treatment and advice we believe is best for you. We expect you to continue to exercise your freedom of choice of physician and to maintain responsibility for payment of fees.

The Medicare law states that no federal officer or employee shall exercise any supervision or control over the practice of medicine or the manner in which medical services are provided.

Under Part B, the Medicare Law provides that reimbursement will be made by the government to you for 80% of the covered medical care expenditures after the first \$50.00 in a calendar year. You must pay the first \$50.00 and 20% of all over \$50.00. You do not obtain reimbursement from the Social Security Administration directly, but from the fiscal agent that represents Social Security in this area. The agent in this area is Blue Cross-Blue Shield of Texas, P.O. Box 6184, Dallas, Texas.

To obtain reimbursement:

1. You must fill out and sign Part 1 of the "Request for Payment" form.
2. Answer "Yes" to question No. 3.
3. Answer "No" to question No. 4.
4. Leave Part 2 blank.
5. Send this completed form with a copy of your receipted (paid) medical service bills to the Fiscal agent's office. The bills must include a description of the services provided.

For your convenience one of these forms can be found as the last page in your Medicare handbook.

After January 1, 1967, the Medicare program will pay for a certain number of days of care in a nursing home, if your doctor decides you need such care. Payment that the Social Security Administration will make for hospital and nursing home care is under agreement between hospital or the nursing home and the Social Security Administration.

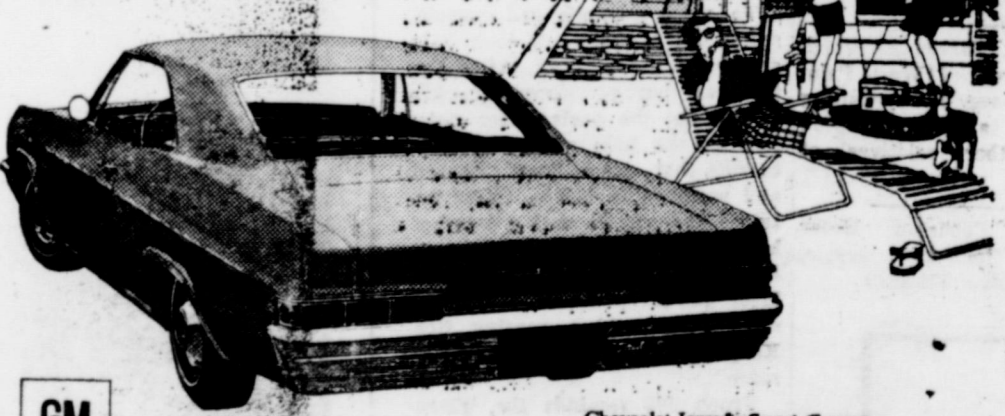

### Reports 14 Accidents For Month Of May

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 14 accidents in Lynn County during the month of May first five months of 1966 shows a total of 42 accidents resulting in 2 persons killed, 15 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$21,315.00.

The number of traffic deaths in Texas has risen steadily since 1960 with 2254 deaths to 3028 deaths in 1965. "For the first five months of 1966, 1137 persons have died in traffic compared to 1032 deaths for the same period of 1965," the Sergeant stated. This 10% increase is very alarming, and when you realize our heavy volume traffic months are still ahead, we must anticipate increasing problems in the accident picture.

The Sergeant appealed to the motoring public to assist in the reduction of this trend, otherwise, the death count at the end of the year will far exceed the record number of 3028 deaths in Texas during 1965.

In studies at the South Plains Research and Extension Center, north of Lubbock, a four year average cotton yield of 488 pounds per acre has been produced from June 21 planting and 257 pounds per acre has been produced by June 29-30 planting.

The average per acre yields for Hill soybeans planted at different dates at the Center are as follows: June 6—28.5 bushels; June 25—30.2 bushels; and July 16—22.4 bushels.

Lee soybeans produced almost

the same yields. Hinn soybeans produced slightly lower yields in all years.

24.5 bushels was produced by

scientists at the Center. Seibert says local conditions will alter these yields, but the data gives an indication of the yield trends to expect from late planting of cotton and soybeans.

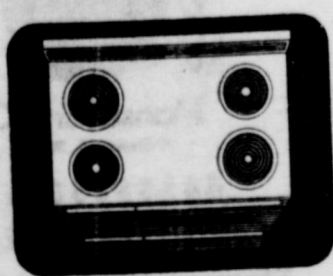

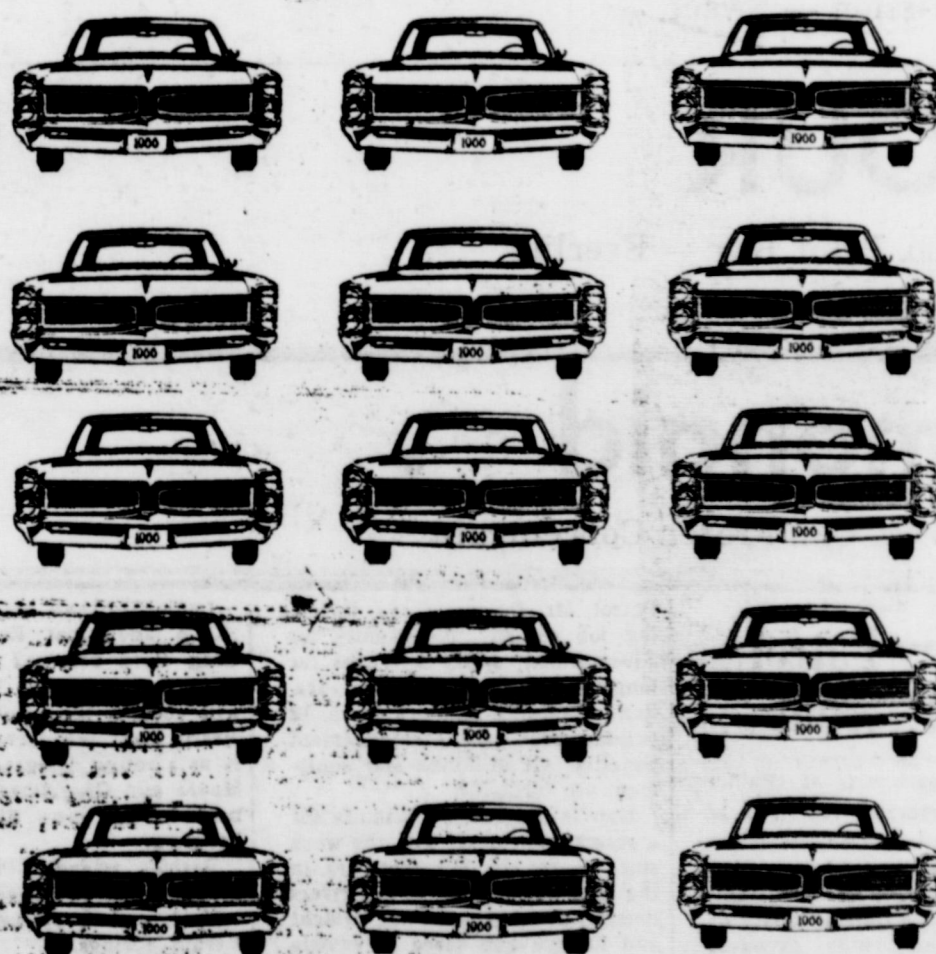
